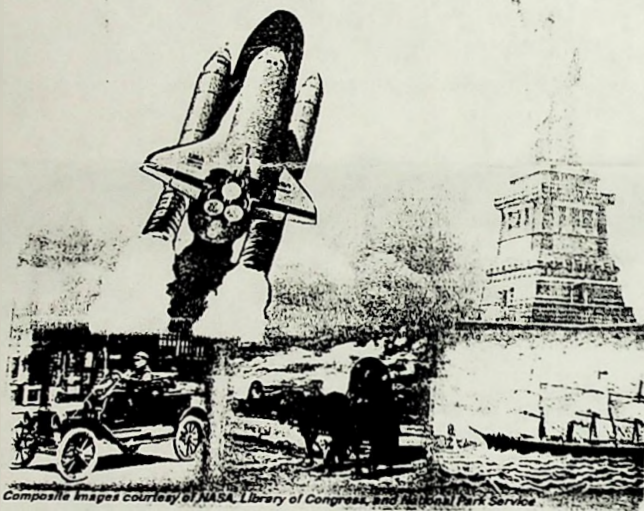

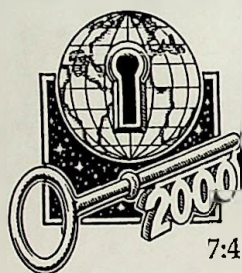
If you are ever in Minot on the first Saturday of the month, we welcome you to attend our meeting.

PROJECT TURNS INTO 'ADOPTION' FOR JOHNSONS

[Exerpts from an article by Sue Neft, Lifestyles Editor, in
"Williston Daily Herald," Sunday, August 27, 2000, p.1]

"This started out as simple A-Z fact-gathering ...but there is so much history out there. You become a part of it, it gets to be like family," said Gloria Johnson of Williston.

As a member of the Williams County Genealogical Society, Johnson has been working with other members for the last three years to document rural cemeteries in Williams County.

"Getting involved in history" has led Johnson and her husband, Roger, to "adopt" the St. George Syrian Cemetery in Cow Creek Township.

With the help of Billy Owan and Merle and Mary Lund, the Johnsons burned the grass last fall. "Billy brought out a payloader and leveled the mounds of dirt and we have been working by hand to fill in the badger holes and clean up the individual graves and mark them."

There are about 30 graves of Syrians from Lebanon within the fenced acre of land. Four graves have headstones and Johnson and her husband have marked other graves with pieces of pipe.

"A Syrian hall was located about half a mile away from the cemetery," explained Johnson. A priest came out from St. Paul, Minn., about twice a year for services, baptisms and weddings. She contacted the Syrian Antiochian Orthodox Church in St. Paul to request information from its archives, but they had no records.

"The only resource we have had is what local people can remember."

Retired Jamestown teacher is county's people 'searcher'

Jamestown, N.D. (AP)

When it comes to genealogical information, George Barron might be compared to Sherlock Holmes.

"I'm more or less the searcher for Stutsman County," Barron said.

Barron's research has led him to chronicle marriages and deaths and to document burial plots. It began as a project for his family, but it grew into a hobby that will benefit many other families as well.

Barron, a retired Jamestown High School chemistry and aviation teacher, began his "second career" by searching for information for a family photo album in 1988.

His daughter, Mary Kuhn, was putting together the album. He set out to help her and later, with the help of cousin Norma M. Johnson, published "The Barron Family: From Banffshire, Scotland, to Moody County, Dakota Territory, USA."

The book traces the family back to the 1700s.

"We got hung up on William Barron. There were two, and we didn't know which one was ours," Barron remembered.

Since establishing that record of his family tree, Barron has volun-

teered countless hours to help others find information on their family members.

"I don't do much of my own stuff anymore — mostly working for other people, for free," Barron said.

Almost an entire wall at Alfred Dickey Public Library is filled with index books he completed.

"Along the way, I got sucked into working on other indexing projects," Barron said.

The projects include the "Rural and Village Cemeteries of Stutsman County, North Dakota," published by the James River Genealogy Club. Barron got help from Daphne Drewello, the library director.

The 280-page book contains information on more than 8,000 burials from 73 of the 80 known cemeteries in the county.

This summer, Barron has been documenting burials in Jamestown's city cemeteries, including two cemeteries at the State Hospital.

"It's like getting a virus or something. Once you get it, you can't get rid of it," he said.

Barron decided in 1990 he could glean more information about people from obituaries and began taking them out of The

Jamestown Sun, starting with the then "Jamestown Alert" in 1878. By 1995, Barron had recorded information on everyone who had any record of death in Stutsman County. He continues to record obituary information from the area.

"I've gotten them all indexed from 1878 until this (Friday) morning," Barron said.

The work can be depressing at times.

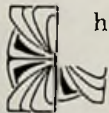
"Pretty soon you discover all your buddies are dead," he said.

But Barron presses on for the benefit of providing a decent record. He said he has indexed more than 60,000 obituaries.

Last winter, Barron began indexing school censuses. The earliest records he could find for indexing date back to 1901. He is currently working on the year 1917 for the project.

He also has compiled databases on all the teachers who have taught in Stutsman County since about 1902. Another database records all the eighth-grade and 12th-grade graduates from Stutsman County since the late 1800s.

Barron acknowledges his hobby can be demanding. But, he says with a grin, "It keeps me off the street in the wintertime."

The Elwyn B. Robinson Department of Special Collections at UND's Chester Fritz Library has recently completed a LSTA grant-sponsored project that cataloged womens' papers and organizational records contained in over 100 manuscript collections preserved by the Department. The Department has mounted the inventory to its microfilm collection of North Dakota American Lutheran Church Records on the web at:

The inventory indicates the post office and county location of each church, congregational name, and inclusive dates of church registers and minutes of congregational minutes. The majority of the records are written in Norwegian and then in English sometime in the 1930's or so.

Also of interest to family historians may be the newly acquired records of Grand Forks County World War II Service Record Books. The finding aid is located at:

The record books, arranged alphabetically, contain personal information about soldiers both born and raised in the county, as well as those residing in Grand Forks County at the time of entry into the military. They offer information in excess of that provided in the Register of North Dakota Veterans: World War II, 1941-1945, and Korean Conflict, 1950-1953. In addition, two books of newspaper clippings contain notices of missing-in-action and deceased veterans.

- 4) Send Query: press Enter or Click on box

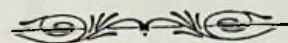

Dear Ancestor

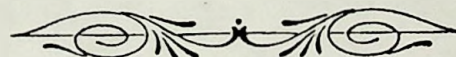
Your tombstone stands among the rest;



Williams County Rural Cemetery Records Index
