NEW BUSINESS

A motion was made by John Beving and seconded by Norma Dooley to place a quarter page ad at the cost of \$25.00 in the Moorhead Workshop syllabus. Motion carried. The workshop is on September 23rd and the speaker is Paula Stewart-Warren

Shane Molander, Deputy State Archivist talked about what is happening at the archives, collections etc.

The pre-1925 Marriage Records Project is going well. Of the 53 counties there are only 17 counties records left to microfilm. Fifteen counties are on FamilySearch.org with more being added all the time.

He mentioned the Oral Histories and the Veterans Oral History Project which has between 1400 and 1500 histories. The 1976 oral histories are organized by county and are digitized.

They are switching to a new database system which will have more finding aids to make locating information easier. Don't forget about Digital Horizons for county and town histories.

The Chronicling America project is now in the third round and is covering newspapers through 1922. The archives has applied for the fourth round. The coverage can extend through 1963 if the newspaper is not copyrighted. This round might see the *Bismarck Tribune* coverage extended. It may also include some of the foreign language newspapers. People from around the US meet once a year to review the newspapers and how to change or enhance this website.

The archives would like to eventually have their own program to digitize newspapers and to place them online. They may partner with other ND newspapers and raise funds to do this.

The archives has some film and video and home movies.

Minnkota Genealogical Society by Michael Swanson

The Minnkota Genealogical Society (MGS) is composed of members from northeast North Dakota and northwest Minnesota. We meet the second Tuesday of each month, usually at the Campbell Library in East Grand Forks, MN. MGS officers for 2017 are Mike Swanson (President), Nancy Larson (Vice-President), Lenore Anderson (Secretary), and Ron Baker (Treasurer).

For our March program, two MGS members reported on the annual RootsTech conference in Salt Lake City. This conference has developed into the largest genealogical conference in the world with more than 30,000 onsite and virtual registrants. Not surprisingly, DNA and genetic genealogy were very popular topics at RootsTech 2017. Other RootsTech sessions highlighted at our March meeting included a comparison of the big four genealogy websites (Ancestry, FamilySearch, Findmypast, and MyHeritage), WWI and WWII military records, the new Find A Grave website, and Scandinavian research.

In April, we were pleased to be joined by Rose Green,


who has much experience researching German and Czech genealogical records. She showed examples of how to locate records at the local level of the Czech Republic. Many of these records are available digitally. In addition, Rose provided links to Czech genealogy blogs and word lists for Czech and Latin terms found in church records.

Our May meeting was on the theme of storytelling with Kristina Gray, instructor at the University of Minnesota Crookston. Besides her teaching experience, Kristina has researched Crookston, publishing a couple of books on this topic. Her presentation centered on strategies to put our projects (personal memories, genealogical research, etc.) into printed form. She also provided pointers to overcome barriers to writing. Her session was interactive with MGS members sharing their own writing experiences.

Our upcoming program calendar features presentations on Polish genealogy and Canadian records. Visitors are always welcome at our monthly meetings.

Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps Now Online by Dick Eastman from Eastman's Online Genealogy Newsletter, http://www.eogn.com

Many experienced genealogists can tell you that using the Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps is a great way to learn more about the lives of your U.S. ancestors, especially if they owned their own homes or rented homes or their places of business.

The Library of Congress has placed online nearly 25,000 Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps, which depict the structure and use of buildings in U.S. cities and towns. Maps will be added monthly until 2020, for a total of approximately 500,000.



The online collection now features maps published

prior to 1900. The states available include Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Delaware, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, Nebraska, Nevada, North Dakota, South Dakota, Vermont, Wisconsin and Wyoming. Alaska is also online, with maps published through the early 1960s. By 2020, all the states will be online, showing maps from the late 1880s through the early 1960s.

The Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps are a valuable resource for genealogists, historians, urban planners, teachers or anyone with a personal connection to a community, street or building. The maps depict more than 12,000 American towns and cities. They show the size, shape and construction materials of dwellings, commercial buildings, factories and other structures. They indicate both the names and width of streets, and show property boundaries and how individual buildings were used. House and block numbers are identified. They also show the location of water mains, fire alarm boxes and fire hydrants.

Stump the Genealogist

The answer: Newspapers, especially the newspapers on microfilm at the North Dakota State Archives. The *Chronicling America* website (http://

<u>chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/</u>) also has some North Dakota newspapers from 1873 to 1922.

Our new question is: How would you find the street address of St. John's Episcopal Church of Dickinson, ND in 1898?

Citation Corner

Genealogical education is a continuous process. Reading journal and magazine articles provides us with research tips, case studies, how-to articles, book reviews and record abstracts. They can provide vital clues in finding our ancestors, provide background information or even an article on our ancestor. But how do we cite them? These citations are much like books, with an author, title, and page number, with

the addition of the title of the journal or magazine and volume number (if it is a journal). So a citation would look like this:

Victor S. Dunn, "Determining Origin with Negative and Indirect Evidence: Cylus H. Feagans of Virginia and West Virginia," *National Genealogical Society Quarterly* 105 (March 2017): 5-18.
