Unique Record at State Archives

North Dakota, Cavalier County, "Prohibition Minute book or Journal", 1890-1893. MS 41192, State Historical Society of North Dakota State Archives, Bismarck.

I wasn't quite sure what I would find in this record as the title is somewhat confusing. Basically it is a list of Druggist's Permits to sell intoxicating Liquors for medical, medicinal, scientific mechanical and sacramental purposes under the laws of the state of North Dakota.

The book has 144 pages with an index at the end. Only the first 69 pages have data inscribed on them. Then the index is on page 144. Only the years of 1890 to 1893 are listed in this book.

I will begin with the index to show the names of the Druggists that are listed in the book.

E. J. Donovan Pg. 1-5, 29, 55 to 58, 62-65

John F. Anderson Pg. 6-10, 35, 52-54, 65-69

A. B. Chalmers Pg. 11-14, 39

James J. Reilly Pg. 16, 40-41, 43-47

N. E. McGruer Pg. 48-51, 59-62

Pg. 1. Langdon, N.D. May 31,1890. Each druggist had to file a petition to sell intoxicating liquor. Then there

would be a hearing and a bond in the sume of \$1000. He had to be of good moral character and indicate where his business was located. The permit was for one year.

E. J. Donovan had his store on Lot 3 of Block 22 on Third Street in Langdon.

Pg. 6. John F. Anderson filed for a permit on June 13, 1890. His business was on Lot 13 of Block 10 on Oakland Avenue in Milton.

Pg. 14. Alexander B. Chalmers business was on Lot 6 of Block 27 on Third Street in Langdon.

Pg. 16. James J. Reilly filed for a permit on July 22, 1890 for a business on Lot 10 of Block 14 on Broad Street in the Village of Osnabrock.

Pg. 29. E. J. Donovan filed a permit on June 18, 1891 for a business on Lot 3 of Block 22 on Third Street in Langdon.

Pg. 48. N. E. McGruer filed a permit on March 16, 1892 for a business in Langdon and later on Pg. 59 in 1893 for a business on Third Street in Langdon.

So if your ancestor was a druggist this would help to determine where he lived during a specific time period and where his business was located.

Our March program was given by Herb Schwede, who has placed more than 70,000 entries in the www.findagrave.com website. This free resource is an important tool for genealogists and history buffs seeking information on the final resting place of family and friends. He provided information on locating cemeteries by states and counties; finding relatives by given and/or surname; and finding birth and death information. He reviewed the registration process, and showed us how to add or edit information. Following recent updates to this site, it is now also possible to add photos, obituaries, family links and other such information to graves which are listed. Herb definitely illustrated what a tremendous source this website can be. It's obvious that Herb is a committed contributor to this site - and an enthusiastic member of our group!

Greg Wysk, president of the North Dakota State Genealogical Society and Reference Specialist at the North Dakota Heritage Center joined us in April — especially appreciated since this was on Easter weekend. He distributed information on the state society, answered questions, and encouraged us to become members. After providing several pages of details on web links, archival records, manuscripts, newspapers, photos, and information on what can/can not be done by researchers

at the Heritage Center, Greg described specific resources available in OUR area. The suggestions he gave illustrating ways to approach a research problem using the various sources were particularly helpful. He obviously has excellent knowledge not only of the available source information, but also of the ways in which it can be used for problem resolution. This session could have lasted hours!

Our program for May was presented by Elizabeth Miller, a senior at the Magic City High School Campus.

She won first place in the Senior Individual Performance category and the "Best Senior Entry Prize" at the Minot "History Day" completion, and took First Place at the North Dakota state history competition held in April at the North Dakota Heritage Center. Elizabeth came to our meeting with a few small props, and was dressed in mid-1800's attire. For twenty minutes we were spell-bound as she did an individual skit which was titled "Five Dakota Moons: Sarah Wakefield's Memoirs of the Sioux Uprising."

Her "passion for history" was obvious — and her enthusiasm was catching! A spirited question and answer period followed, made more interesting because several members of our group have ancestors from that part of Minnesota. What a breath of fresh air she was!

Indexing the 1940 Census

Wow! That is all I can say. As of May 30th the state of North Dakota is completely indexed. Less than 2 months from when it was released for the indexing to begin. And is now available for searching. Thank you to all who have helped with the indexing and arbitration. There are many other states that still need to be indexed so keep up the good work.

Indexing is a fascinating experience and a bit challenging at times. Keep checking the updates and project helps and field helps as you index. Remember you can

return a batch if you are unable to complete it or if there are problems with it. There is a United States map that is continually updated to show where each state is in their indexing percentage. Go to:

https://www.familysearch.org/1940census/.

As of June 20th FamilySearch indexing has reached about 71%. FamilySearch has released indexes for 24 states **including North Dakota**. These represent about 21% of the total index size. Ancestry.com and MyHeritage also have some indexes online.

Minnkota Genealogical Society by George Freeman and Mike Swanson

The Minnkota Genealogical Society (MGS) holds their regular meetings on the second Tuesday evening of each month, usually at the Campbell Library in East Grand Forks, Minnesota. The coverage area includes northeast North Dakota and northwest Minnesota. We aim for a mix of programming with ample time to socialize and share our genealogical finds. MGS is a member of the Federation of Genealogical Societies.

Highlights for the year:

In January, in lieu of a program, we instead had a planning meeting to discuss some objectives and obtain programming ideas from members. Individual nametags were created by society member Wanda Seyler, who also published the first installment of our newsletter a couple months later. Members who were present were asked to record a genealogy resolution for 2012. These resolutions will be reviewed at our summer picnic and again later in the year. Our February meeting featured our own technology expert, Michael Harvey, who spoke on the topic of "Preserving Your Family Legacy on DVD." He showed attendees how to create a digital family archive incorporating still images, video, text, and music by using free software available on a PC (Windows). He also created demo DVDs containing step-by-step instructions and a

guide for getting started for each attendee. For our March meeting, MGS members Denyse Sturges and Michael Swanson presented on the topic of "Preserving your Family Archive." Denyse discussed how to preserve textiles, while Michael talked about caring for family documents and photographs. A list of relevant online resources on this topic was distributed to members. At the end of March, several MGS members attended the genealogy symposium by the Red River Valley Genealogical Society in Fargo.

April brought an obvious discussion topic with the debut of the 1940 census earlier in the month. We talked about each of the columns of information recorded on the census and the significance of this information. Online tools to determine the enumeration districts were also demonstrated. Once indexing of the census is complete, these tools won't be quite as popular. Several MGS members have volunteered to be involved in indexing of the 1940 census, performing this work in affiliation with the NDSGS. We continue to monitor the indexing progress for North Dakota and Minnesota and are very happy with the progress.

Citation Corner

Estate records, wills or probate records can be potential gold mines of information. Particularly if the person owned property and did not have any descendants. Many times siblings, nieces or nephews are named as next of kin or heirs. Also if there was a dispute over who was to inherit more documents would be filed as part of the process. Sometimes these records are hard to locate so check for the surrogates office, register of wills, clerk of court etc. Also remember to check for court order books or indexes and devisor or devisee indexes. Estate packets might be filed in separate files from the administrations or wills.

Elements of these citations include the name of the estate, where the estate records were located, name of the book or file and page number, date and the type of record and the office they were filed in.

For a will if the copies are obtained from the Courthouse:

Clermont County, Ohio, Will Book A:26-28, William South, 1811; Probate Court, Batavia.

If it was on microfilm it would be:

Clermont County, Ohio, Will Book A:26-28, William South, 1811; FHL microfilm 327,599.

Other documents for this probate were located in the Minutes of the Court of Common Pleas.

Clermont County, Ohio, Court of Common Pleas Minute book A: 216, William South, 1811; FHL microfilm 1,763,560.

Remember to search for probates, wills, administrations and orphans court records for all of your ancestors, their relatives and the members of their FAN club. FAN means friends, associates and neighbors whose records might mention or identify your ancestors.

The Internet Archive

Is this the world's largest library?

The Internet Archive, a 501(c)(3) non-profit, is building a digital library of books, papers, recordings, movies, Internet sites, and much more. Like many other libraries, this digital library provides free access to researchers, historians, scholars, and the general public. This is a great resource for genealogists and many, many others.

The Internet Archive is attempting to store more than just the Internet. In fact, the organization hopes to store either an original or a copy of every book ever published, every movie, every video, every newspaper, every sound recording (and it has some great recordings of Grateful Dead concerts that were never released previously), old time radio shows, and even a broad range of software-related materials including shareware, freeware, video news releases about software titles, speed runs of actual software game play, previews and promos for software games, high-score and skill replays of various game genres, and the art of filmmaking with real-time computer game engines. Whew!

In fact, The Internet Archive has thousands of documents of interest to genealogists, including every surviving page of the U.S. Census records from 1790 through 1940. These census records are all available free of charge, as is everything else in The Internet Archive. The census records are not indexed, however, and can only be searched in The Internet Archive by manually going through the records, one page at a time. Thousands of other records of genealogy interest are also available, including many military records, local, state, and federal records, and much more. Many of these documents do not exist elsewhere online and, again, access to everything on The Internet Archive is always free of charge.

Like the aforementioned census records, these records are not indexed, and there is no central search capability. You find information in The Internet Archive in the same manner as most any other traditional library: you search the catalog of items available, find the item you seek, and then search through that item manually. Most of us have done this for years in traditional libraries but have become "spoiled" in recent years by online databases that index every word. The Internet Archive still uses the old-fashioned method.
