Montana genealogists influence Legislature
 [from Dawson County Tree Branches Genealogy Society]

In March 2001 Tree Branches members took an active part in promoting the passage of SB443 in the Montana State Legislature. This bill would prohibit the disposal of public records without first offering the public the opportunity to view and possibly save the records. The thought was that local historical societies, museums, and genealogy clubs would transfer records important to family history research (such as birth, death, marriage, and land) to alternative sites as county government officials determine they no longer have sufficient storage space. Rep Ralph Lenhart of Glendive had initially voted against this bil. In committee, a tie vote was recorded, and there was a definite probability the bill would die in committee. Upon being notified of this several Tree Branches members called and e-mailed Rep. Lenhart expressing our support of the bill. Rep. Lenhart indicated he had only negative comments until we contacted him. He subsequently changed his vote and supported the bill.

SB443 was eventually aproved almost unanimously in both the Montana House and the Senate and on April 11th was sent to the Governor for final approval.

- FreeREG Project Looking for Volunteers

FreeREG http://freereg.rootsweb.com/ FreeREG stands for Free REGisters. The FreeREG Project's objective is to provide free Internet searches of baptism, marriage, and burial records, which have been extracted from parish registers and non-conformist church records in the United Kingdom. The recording of baptisms, marriages and burials in parish registers began in England in 1538.

FreeREG is a part of the FreeUKGEN Project and companion project to FreeBMD http://freebmd.rootsweb.com/, which is a database of the GRO birth, marriage and death indexes from 1837 forward. Records are to be made freely available through a search engine only, not as complete sets of data for a church. For complete transcriptions, where available, refer to the local County Records Offices, or Family History Societies.

The FreeREG database is a finding tool. It should not be considered to be proof, or that it is always 100% accurate, or contains all of the information in the actual register. Once you have found a record, then write to the relevant Family History Society or County Record Office, which for a small fee will provide a print from the register for you. In many cases you can also purchase a full transcript of the register from the FHS.

There are three FreeREG databases, one each for baptisms, marriages, and burials. Because FreeREG is a relatively new project, there are now only a few million records in the database, so you should not expect to find all your ancestors in the database yet.

FreeREG is looking for volunteer transcribers and for those who have already made transcriptions. If you would like to become involved in the project, visit http://freereg.rootsweb.com/ and please subscribe to FREEREG-L-request@rootsweb.com .
