MINUTES OF LAST MEETING

President Patrice Hartman called meeting to order at 1:00 on June 15, 2001.

The meeting was held in the Project Room of the North Dakota State HeritageCenter.

President Patrice gave a welcome. It was decided to hold the business meeting following the speaker. Patrice welcomed Alice Ellingsberg, C.L.S. As secretary Dorothy Pearson was absent, John Mogren was appointed to take minutes of the meeting.

PROGRAM

Alice Ellingsberg provided information on becoming an accredited orcertified genealogist. Certification and accreditation are both processesthat were developed to protect the consumer.

1. Accreditation is achieved by taking an examination through the Family History Center. There is no charge for taking the test

but the individual must travel to Salt Lake City to take the examination.

2. Certification is achieved by completing a portfolio, which evaluates the individual's knowledge of genealogy through a series of genealogical problems. The portfolio also includes documentation on the individual. This is submitted to the Board for Certification of Genealogists. Cost is \$50.00 for the initial application, \$150.00 fee when the portfolio is submitted. Every five years there is a recertification and a \$150.00 fee.

Certification

- 1. Certified genealogists take and sign a Genealogical Code of Ethics.
- 2. They are required to maintain the standards of professionalism.
- 3. When you apply for certification you receive:

A. The Board for Certification of Genealogical Application Guide

- 3. Explain reason for seeking certification
- 4. Research facilities where you normally work & relevant holdings there.
- 5. Records you have accessed from a distance
- 6. Frequency of genealogical trips.
- 7. Publication samples
 - a. Articles or books you have published including (WEB publications)
- 8. Document work
 - a. The B.C.G. sends you 2 documents to translate and propose a research plan.
- 9. Complete a critique of printed materials.
- 10. Research report you do genealogical research for someone else and submit findings.

Application process

- 1. Once you have completed your initial application you have 12 months to complete it.
- 2. Once you have submitted your portfolio, the B.C.G. will act on it within 5 months.
- 3. Three judges evaluate your portfolio.

Mentor: Alice Ellingsberg is willing to serve as a mentor for others interested in becoming certified.

The program concluded at 2:00 and appreciation was expressed to Alice Ellingsberg for her presentation.

QLD BUSINESS

They have visited with the Burleigh County Clerk of Court and plan to start indexing these early marriage records. There is a State Historical Advisory Board in place of which Gerry Newborg chairs.
- 5. Patrice Hartman gave a report on the Cemetery Workshop that was sponsored by the South West Genealogical Society and held in April in Dickinson. Everyone who attended deemed the workshop a success. George Barron was commended for his presentation.

Canadian Marriage Registers Available @ UND

The Elwyn B. Robinson Department of Special Collections has recently acquired and cataloged two sets of Canadian marriage registers, one set for the Province of Ontario, Upper Canada and Canada West, and the other for Quebec.

Sixteen volumes for Upper Canada/Canada West, some divided into parts, are available. During Ontario's settlement period, each District Clerk of the Peace recorded marriages from returns submitted by Clergy. Even though all Districts were abolished in 1850, Ontario's administrative unit changed unevenly from district to county, and some County Clerks of Peace continued to record marriages in District registers after county formation. Therefore, the time frame covered for each District varies, the earliest 1795 and the latest 1865. Each volume contains returns transcribed exactly as they appeared in the register, and an alphabetical surname index.

Twenty-six volumes index Quebec marriages for eight counties. Champlain, Nicolet, and Portneuf are covered extensively; the counties of Bastican, Iles de la Madeleine, Kamouraska, Lotbiniere, and Saint Maurice less so. Each volume indexes a particular church parish and contains an alphabetical surname index. A parish name and a town name may be one and the same within a particular county in Quebec. In contrast with the registers for Ontario, the Quebec indexes list only the name of the husband, maiden name of the wife and date of marriage.

Each volume may also contain a brief history of the parish. Most list marriages dating from the 1700's to the early 1900's, the earliest 1654 and the latest 1973.



If records are not available, we call and meet with individuals who have some history of the cemetery or private grave burials. Then if dates are missing on headstones, we consult with Township records, obituaries on microfilm at the libraries or sometimes old newspapers.

So, I feel we are doing a very thorough job on this Cemetery Index. Even so, we know there will be errors. But it takes time and it is down to three of us working on the project. We have been working on this all spring and summer and hope the weather holds up through October and November. We need time to try and finish the field work.

Our daughter regarded us both thoughtfully for a moment, then asked "So, was he a Viking?"

Stordahl Cemetery & Church (Big Meadow Township, Williams County) By Gloria Johnson (for Williston Herald)

Located approx. 4 miles SE of Wildrose, ND, the Stordahl Church was organized the 29 May 1904 and it was named for a Norwegian County in Norway. The church was built in 1914 and was later dissolved in 31 Dec 1961. The original Stordahl Church burned down and this congregation merged with Grace Lutheran Church of Wildrose, ND.

At the site of the original Stordahl Church is also the Stordahl Cemetery. The bell on display at the cemetery is from the church. The land for building was donated in 1908 as was the bell in 1915, by C.J. Helle. The memorial built here

in 1994 is in memory of all interred in this cemetery.

A cornerstone was built in the foundation of the church in 1915. The foundation was made of stones & cement. The cornerstone was found in the 1990's by Gerald Olson & Vern Halverson, in what was left of the foundation after the church burned. Vern built the small replica of the original church on a scale of I" = I foot. Materials used to build the

small replica were from the original church. It, too, is on display at the cemetery.

The time capsule found in the foundation cornerstone was a small metal box which was handmade to fit around the books, newspapers, etc. They say it is possible that C.J. Helle, a blacksmith, made the small galvanized box. When found the lid was off partially and some smoke had reached the newspapers and a letter on top. Inside also were a bible, 2 catechisms and devotional books. All are in Norwegian. The newspapers are dated 1915. A handwritten letter survived the smoke and is encased in a glass-covered frame showing all 6 pages and is written in Norwegian. The 1915 newspaper has today been laminated in plastic which allows all pages to be read.

They say the bell which was on top of the church weighs over 1000 lbs. and is one of the oldest and rarest of church

bells in American History.

The large boulder in the cemetery was uncovered by C.J. Helle while looking for suitable stones for the church foundation. He liked this particular stone and moved it to the road in front of his house and at one time put it to use as a hitching post. The date on the stone signified when C.J. Helle filed his claim - 1902. This stone was later moved in 1970 to the present cemetery. Since the cemetery plot of land was part of C.J. Helle's homestead quarter and given by him for a churchyard, his surviving families thought it should stand in this area of the cemetery.

66 individuals are buried in the cemetery dating from early 1910 to the latest in 1996.


