Is That Book Still Under Copyright?

Genealogists use old books more often than most other people. Indeed, we also want to take excerpts from an old book and publish those excerpts as part of our own family's genealogy. However, is that legal? Does the book still enjoy copyright protection?

Under U.S. laws, the answer is simple for books published prior to 1924: the book is now in the public domain (not copyrighted). For books, films, and other works published in 1924 or later, however, the question quickly becomes complicated.

Anything published in 1924 will remain under copyright until the year 2020, anything published in 1925 will remain under copyright until the year 2021, and so on.

The U.S. Constitution gives Congress the right to be-

stow exclusive rights to a creator for "limited times."



Unfortunately, the words "limited times" were not precisely defined in the Constitution and politicians since then have specified longer and longer periods of copyright protection.

In the first copyright act in 1790, copyright protec-

tion was limited to 14 years, with the option to apply for an automatically granted 14-year renewal. By 1909, copyright protection was increased to 28 years, with the option to apply for an automatically granted 28 year renewal.

Is there a story in your family of someone in trouble or serving time? How do you locate these records and where might they be found?

Search online indexes to penitentiary records or local newspapers for articles or local or state archives. Some records may also be found at the courthouse.

I found a newspaper article that mentioned my ancestor had served time in the Nebraska State Penitentiary.

At the time I had thought he did not have a criminal record before 1899 when he was accused of assault with the intent to kill. I did some more checking and found a court case in Thurston County, Nebraska which is in the relative vicinity of where he had previously lived in Harrison County, Iowa. Then I contacted the Nebraska State Historical Society and they found a prison record for him from 1895. The elements for a prison record citation are the name, where the record was located, the book and page number or file number and who originally created the record if different than where it was located.

So this citation would be completed as shown.

Nebraska Department of Correctional Services, State Penitentiary Inmate Record 2879, Volume 2: 126, Robt. S. Donnelson, 1895; Nebraska State Historical Society, Lincoln.

Next of kin were listed on the record so I knew for sure that this was my ancestor.

This record even included a physical description of the prisoner down to scars and blemishes. It listed the term served and when released and who he was released to. It did not include a photograph but some of the records in this collection did.

Unfortunately the application is not available online yet as that portion of our new site is still under construction. You may request a paper copy of the application from our library. There was a further complication: copyrights back then had to be renewed, and often the rightsholder wouldn't bother filing the paperwork. If they did, the paperwork could be lost. There is no single computer database listing the copyright dates of every publication. Indeed, there isn't even a single office or other location where anyone can look at paper records listing copyright expiration dates. In short, you cannot easily find the copyright expiration date of any of the older publications.

The cost of figuring out who owns the rights to a given book can end up being greater than the market value of the book itself.

The State Historical Society of North Dakota features articles from their *North Dakota History: Journal of the Northern Plains* on its website. About 40 articles are free to the public with topics ranging from frontier photography to buffalo bone commerce, to a collection of Harris Family letters from 1882-1888. The Harris family moved from Iowa to Dickey County, Dakota In 1976, the U.S. copyright laws were radically changed to agree with the Berne Convention, an international agreement originally signed in 1886. All new books were switched to an expiration date of the author's life plus 50 years. In 1998, an act named for Sonny Bono, who was recently deceased and always was a defender of Hollywood's expansive rights, bumped that to 70 years. These new restrictions applied only to books published on or after the date of the new laws. Older books were not impacted.

So the originally question was, "Is That Book Still Under Copyright?" The only accurate answer for books published in 1924 or later is: "Maybe."
