HURRAY! We have plans for a meeting in July which is already next month. I hope many of you can join in the conversations at the Bismarck State Historical Society building. We will have a short business meeting and as much time as needed for exchange of ideas and the highlight will be a presentation by Shane Molander, State Archivist, on what the Archives has in its collection.

I just became aware that one of the items that are judged and displayed at the North Dakota State Fair are articles gathered in "The Heritage Contest." These stories are about what life was like in North Dakota in the early years. They will be displayed in the 4-H Hall in the ND State Fair Center during the fair which runs July 23-31. The contest is sponsored by the North Dakota State Fair. Additional support comes from Minot State University and the Northern Plains Writing Project.

Each North Dakota resident may enter up to three works which illustrate aspects of North Dakota's culture and heritage. Maximum length for a work is 2,500 words. Judges will look for quality of writing, relevance to the history and culture of North Dakota and human interest when judging works entered.

There are two categories of entrance: writers 20 years of age or younger and writers 21 years of age and older. Complete rules and suggestions are found on page 61 of the Exhibitor Handbook and by going online to <u>www.NDSTATEFAIR.COM</u>.

New York Family Connection

I recently made a breakthrough on a family I have researched over the years. I found a connection from Illinois to a specific county in New York where the family originated from. The New York land deed appears to be a distribution of sorts to the heirs of the father. No probate or other documents have been found or online family trees to indicate who the parents of this individual are. The deed names the person in question, his wife and where they lived at the time so I know that it is the correct family. It also names other individuals who I assume are siblings and where they lived at the time. I have been able to find lots of information about this group of individuals and hopefully will be able to put

I found this New York land deed from an index that is online at <u>https://</u> <u>www.familysearch.org.</u> A regular check of this website is important to locate new records that are being indexed and digitized at a fast pace. Millions of new images are added every week through a new process called Explore Historical Images. Some have no name indexes yet but you can check this system to locate the images. Go to the website, then search and then images. Search by place, date or life event to locate the data.

IN MEMORIAM

Erling Olsen, NDSGS Vice President, died 9 June, 2021 at Bismarck. He was born in 1937 at Maddock, North Dakota, to Earl and Laura (Lageson) Olson. Erling was very interested in his heritage and also served as President of the North Dakota State Genealogical Society. He was a member of the Sons of Norway Lodge and traced his ancestry back to King Harald

Hårfager of Norway. As a proud Norwegian he was also a member of several Bygdelags (Tronderlag Valdres Samband and Vestlandet) that seek to preserve and strengthen bonds with the community of origin. Erling always enjoyed sharing his knowledge of Norwegian genealogy with others at our meetings.

Citation Corner

Historically orphanages were viewed as a place to teach values to disadvantaged children and prepare them to be independent adults. A large number of these children were not fully orphaned. Seventy percent of the children placed in a St. Louis, Missouri, orphanage had one parent still living. Many of these children were institutionalized for less than a year and most returned to their family or friends.¹ These records can offer a wealth of genealogical and family information. The elements needed to cite these items, include the name of the record, child's name, date, orphanage and location. If the record is held at a different repository that should be noted.

A citation for an entry record may look like this:

Nomination Paper for Grace Bishop, 31 July 1925, Royal Albert Orphanage, Henwick, Worcester; Worcestershire County Council, Worcester, England.
