North Dakota State Genealogical Society Minutes

We had a wonderful tour 7 July 2023 at the SHSND collections area. We saw items that would be of interest to those searching for 3D objects that belonged to their ancestors. Lori Nohner, Assistant Curator, showed us a family bible with names and dates, a pocket watch from Norway that had a photo locket attached to it, a fiddle case also from Norway, a wreath made of yarn with two photos in a shadow box, a quilt

with names and a date on it. We also viewed many other items in the collection such as immigrant trunks, clothing, furniture, uniforms, paintings. In the recent acquisitions exhibit we viewed the fiddle that was handmade with hardanger designs and other items from Norway. Citation Corner

It's back to the basics again for this article. As genealogists or family history researchers we utilize local county histories, published family histories and other books in our research. Concepts for book citations can be utilized to draft citations for other sources.

Book citations typically include the author's name, title of the book, place of publication, publisher, year of publication and page number. All of these elements are usually found on the title page of the book.

The title should be copied exactly from the title page, not the spine of the book. If a book was a compilation or had an editor, that name would replace the author's name with comp. or editor following the name. In cases where there is no author Anonymous may be substituted for the author's name or the field may simply be left

blank. If it is a revised edition that would be noted. If there is no publication place or publisher n.p. or no place or no publisher should be inserted in the proper place. For no publication date insert n.d.

So a citation for a book we consulted in our research would look like this:

Cass County Historical Society, *Rural Cass County: The Land and the People* (Dallas, Texas: Taylor Publishing Co., 1976), 901.

The format changes a bit in a list of sources or a bibliography. See the list of new books on page 3 for that style.

Citation details allow anyone, including yourself, to locate that resource again and analyze the information it contains.

Scrapbook Preservation

Melissa Barker, aka the Archive Lady, outlines how to preserve scrapbooks.

- 1. Digitize every page using a flatbed or overhead scanner, or a digital camera.
- 2. Purchase archival tissue paper slightly larger than the scrapbook page from an online archival materials store.
- 3. Place the tissue paper in between each page of the scrapbook.
- 4. Purchase an archival box that is flat with a

separate lid.

5. Label the box for easy retrieval.

1975. Data includes age, religion, occupation, height, weight, etc. The ledgers are currently being digitized by the Milwaukee County Historical Society.
