Mary Lou Bueling gave a report on the Family History Workshop in Moorhead that occurred September 24. D. Joshua Taylor was the featured speaker, giving four presentations. Taylor appears on the PBS series *Genealogy Roadshow*. DNA was the subject of presentations by a scientist and a lay person to give different perspectives. Jon Beving gave a presentation on Civil War records.

The Heritage Education Commission awards several book and research awards each year at the Family History Workshop. Mary won this year's Audrey Zube Jones Award for her book *Katherine Baumstark Fergel Family Tree 1725-2016*. The Audrey Zube Jones Award takes into consideration the "future usefulness to family, local or regional historians as well as to family descendants."

Mary Bueling encouraged everyone to attend next year's Family History Workshop in Moorhead as well as the Germans from Russia convention to be held in Bismarck July 12-16, 2017.

These concoctions were frequently used by our ancestors for a variety of ailments at a time when there was uncertainty about the medical profession. Despite outrageous claims by the manufacturers of these medicines, they were quite popular and various kinds were often kept in households. Many of these elixirs were nothing more

than alcohol mixtures laced with narcotics and sometimes with trace amounts of poisons. In addition to his interesting presentation, Dr. Iseminger brought an array of patent medicine bottles that he obtained from an abandoned home north of Grand Forks.

Upcoming programs will feature reports from the RootsTech conference in Salt Lake City, German genealogical research, and storytelling. Visitors are always welcome at our monthly meetings.

I just finished filming Griggs county and have to ask the Clerk about allowing Family Search and/or Ancestry access to the film.

We received a digital copy of the Williams County marriages and our IT person is working on extracting the index. The dates are not included.

North Dakota Marriage Index

I am pleased to share the following news about ND Marriage Records that are online:

Familysearch.org has an index of North Dakota County Marriages 1882-1925 with the images. You can also browse the images but have to figure out which number corresponds to each county. You can go through the catalog to find a particular counties records.

I believe they have the following counties online: Adams, Bowman, Burke, Cass, Eddy, LaMoure, McHenry, McKenzie, McLean, Mountrail, Ransom, Richland, Steele, Sargent and Sioux.

Ancestry.com also has an index of North Dakota, Marriage Records, 1877-1929 with images. You can also search by county and by date range. I believe they have the following counties online: Bottineau, Burke, Cass, Dickey, Eddy, McHenry, McKenzie, McLean, Mountrail, Ransom, Richland, Sargent and Sioux.

Thank you to the State Historical Society of ND for microfilming these records and for coordinating with these companies to place these records online. We are hoping more counties will become available as time goes by. Thank you also to those who helped with indexing these records through the State Historical Society of ND.

The North Dakota State Genealogical Society started this project many years ago to index the pre 1925 marriage records and to place them online so it is great to see this happen.

Iowa Newspapers to be Digitized

The State Historical Society of Iowa plans to preserve more than 12 million pages of newspapers, representing more than 300 titles, and dating to the 1830s. A 5-year

contract with Advantage Companies will be at no cost to the state, and ownership of the physical newspapers will remain with the State Historical Society of Iowa.

World War I: Online

The Library of Congress has launched a portal to its World War I holdings as part of a commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the U. S. involvement in the war.

The collection includes recruitment and wartime information posters, photos, manuscripts and papers of prominent figures, newspapers, maps of campaigns and battle lines, sound recordings of prominent leaders of the era, war-related sheet music and early films.

The portal will include links to the online version of the Library's new exhibition "Echoes of the Great War: American Experiences of World War I" which opens April 4.

Articles from the Library blogs, written by curators, will offer insight into the collections and highlight stories and materials.

There is also WWI-related content for teachers, a guide for on-site visitors to the Library in Washington and details on lectures, programs, concerts and symposia related to the conflict.

Iceland's Entire Family Tree is Online

Iceland has everyone's family tree, complete with original source citations, online and available for all the country's citizens to see. The islendingabok is website hosts the online registry Íslendingabók ("The Book of Icelanders") with information about the families of approximately

720,000 individuals who were born in Iceland. The database is in Icelandic and access is limited to Icelandic citizens and legal residents of Iceland.

Chronicling America

Fifty five African American newspapers from across the U. S. are now available online. Included is Frederick Douglass' newspaper, the *New National Era. Chronicling America* is a valuable resource that can be searched by state, newspaper, date, keyword, or any combination of the above. *Chronicling America*

is produced by the National Digital Newspaper Program, a partnership between the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Library of Congress.

Stump the Genealogist

How would you find the death of someone who was rumoured to have been shot and killed in North Dakota in 1884?

The answer: Newspapers, especially the North Dakota newspapers on the *Chronicling America* website (http://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/) which has some North Dakota newspapers from 1873 to 1922. The search can also be expanded to cover newspapers in the surrounding

states. Because the death occurred in 1884 and probably was recorded in several newspapers it would most likely show up on this free newspaper website.

Our new question is: How can I find out if my ancestor from Illinois visited her brother in North Dakota in the early 1900's?

Citation Corner

Have you ever wondered what kind of grades your ancestors received in school? Where can you find this type of information? Did your parents or grandparents keep their school records? There can be individual records or the teacher's records. If these teacher's records can be found they may provide grades, ages, parents names and how many days the student was in school. They may also contain a list of subjects taught, how the school day was organized and information about the school property.

School records might be found at the county courthouse, libraries, museums, Historical Societies,

archives or in someone's home. I found local school records at the Superintendent of Schools office in Mott, ND.

These records were organized by year and by the location of the school.

The citation for this record would contain the location of the record, title of the record, name of the school, date and the repository location.
