## North Dakota State Genealogical Society Minutes

John Hallberg, Archives Associate from the Institute of Regional Studies, NDSU was our speaker for the October 14, 2022 meeting.

The NDSU Archives are located in the West Building, 3551 7th Avenue North, Room 123, Fargo, ND. They are open Monday - Friday from 8 to 4. Their catalog is online so patrons can search and locate the collections before going to the Archives.

The archives was located in the basement of the NDSU Library until the flood of 2000. There have been lots of moves to different locations since then. The Archives was founded in 1950 by the Professors of the ND Agricultural College now known as NDSU. In 2011 all of the archives collections were consolidated.

The NDSU Archives has a printed 4 page handout which covers most of the major collections. Some of their online databases are the North Dakota Biography Index, Dakota Territory 1885 Census, North Dakota Naturalization Records Index, Fargo Forum Obituaries Index, Cass County Divorce & Civil Cases Index, Cass

County Probate Records, Cass County Marriage Licenses.

Some of the items that John covered in his talk were that Fargo was the Divorce Capitol because you only had to be a resident for 90 days to obtain a divorce. In 2022 lots of records from the Cass County Courthouse such as Civil Court Cases up to 1965 were moved to the Archives.

Some special collections are the Lawrence Welk Music Collection and scrapbooks which were donated to the Archives at his death. The H. Elaine Lindgren collection was given to the archives and contains many items including photographs and manuscripts. The ND Homemaker's Council Oral History Projects where interviews were edited into 3 books. The GAR records for one post in Fargo. The inventory of Melvina Massey's "Crystal Palace" is included in her probate records. This brothel was located where the Fargo City Hall is now.

Lots of interesting items are at the NDSU Archives. Go and visit sometime to explore all that they have to offer.

#### **Citation Corner**

Newspaper articles can be very useful in our research, but what if we inherited a newspaper clipping with no newspaper or date recorded on them? How do we cite them? The lack of a newspaper name or date should be noted along with the provenance. The provenance will usually include the current owner and how that owner acquired the clipping.

#### Online Resources for Genealogical Research

Sometimes in the State Archives, we get phone calls or emails from individuals seeking advice who are trying to do genealogical research but are unable to come to Bismarck in person. Luckily due to the increased digitization of archival records, we can still help by suggesting the many digital resources available to anyone with a computer. The following are some Archives-recommended resources for the remote researcher.

Two websites that will get you a lot of bang for your search are Ancestry.com and FamilySearch.org. These websites provide access to census, naturalization, military, and vital records (e.g., birth, death, and marriage). A helpful aspect is their ability to filter the results to fit your search parameters. One can search for specific names, geographic locations, and dates, making large collections, such as the census, easier to navigate. That these sites contain records from the entire United States as well as foreign countries makes genealogy research so

much more accessible, especially if your ancestor moved states or emigrated from elsewhere. While we use Ancestry.com for all our federal and state census searches at the State Archives, it's also available free of charge through the many local libraries that have subscriptions to Ancestry.com.

Another site that we recommend for people conducting personal research is <u>Digital Horizons</u>. Digital Horizons contains digitized materials from archives across North Dakota. You can find so much information in the site's different collections, but for genealogy research we recommend the <u>North Dakota Histories collection</u> of digitized county and town centennial, jubilee, and other anniversary history books. There is also a selection of <u>North Dakota atlases and plat maps</u> that can be helpful when researching the land ownership of your ancestors. Additionally, Digital Horizons has a lot of digitized photographs from across the state, including from

the <u>State Historical Society of North Dakota</u>, <u>NDSU Institute for Regional Studies</u>, and the <u>Bismarck Public Library</u>.

In my opinion, the land patents from the <u>Bureau</u> of <u>Land Management's General Land Office</u>
Records are a hidden gem among digitized records. These patents show the transfer of land ownership from the federal government to individuals, which is particularly helpful if your ancestor took advantage of the 1862 Homestead Act. Aside from the searchable database and digitized documents, this website has a lot of other cool features for researchers. There is an interactive map showing land descriptions on a contemporary map and also transcriptions of land patent contents. The information on this site as well as the State Archives' collection of county

<u>plat maps</u> can resolve many genealogical questions related to land and land ownership.

As more records are digitized, it becomes easier to do genealogical research without having to travel to the individual state or country to access those records. The growing number of historical newspapers online at sites such as <a href="Chronicling America">Chronicling America</a> and <a href="Advantage Archives">Advantage Archives</a> is another great resource. (Check out this <a href="blog post">blog post</a> for inspiration as to how Chronicling America can assist with researching your family history.)

Genealogy and archival research are more approachable for every type of researcher than ever before, making roadblocks and frustrations less common. #### **Digitized Newspapers**

The State Historical Society of North Dakota, in partnership with the North Dakota Genealogy Society, has added more than 50,000 pages of newspapers online at <a href="mailto:ndarchives.advantage-preservation.com">ndarchives.advantage-preservation.com</a>.

The following newspapers have been added: McClusky Gazette (1909-1931) Mott Pioneer Press (1907-1928) LaMoure County Chronicle (1888-1926) Hettinger County Herald (1907-1927) New Rockford Transcript (1883-1920)

The State Archives, a department of the State Historical Society, digitized the newspapers for Advantage Archives to host.

"It's great to see organizations like the North Dakota Genealogy Society help fund this important project," said State Archives Director Shane Molander. "The ability to do specific searches, using keywords or names, across enormous numbers of newspapers makes researching fun and fast. Whether an individual is doing family history or working on a school paper, the newspapers are a great primary source and full of information not found elsewhere."

Over 1.4 million pages of newspaper are freely available for access and searching on Advantage Archives. The State Archives works with local libraries, historical societies, and other entities interested in getting newspapers online and word searchable. #### **Using Advantage Archives**

Access the site at <u>ndarchives.advantage-preservation.com</u> and type in your search term. I searched on "William Witte" and the dates from the beginning to 12/31/1920. The results were in 27 newspapers on 3 pages. The results can be filtered by newspaper, decade and year.

I picked the *Hettinger County Herald* for 21 July 1910 Page 4. Click on the title of the newspaper.

You can crop and save the article or download the whole page.

Or you could go to the newspaper title and search just within that newspaper. Since I was searching for a William Witte who lived in Hettinger County I would pick the *Hettinger County Herald* and the *Mott Pioneer Press* as the most likely newspapers to have information about him but there could be articles in the other newspapers also so a check of the previews is a good idea.

The National Genealogical Society library holdings are housed in the St. Louis County Library in St. Louis Missouri. These books are available for interlibrary loan (ILL) through your local library. ## National Archives Allocates \$600,000 to Transfer Digitized Veterans' Records from the VA

The U.S. National Archives and Records Administration has allocated \$600,000 to transfer digitized veterans' records from the Department of Veterans Affairs as it continues to work through a backlog of document requests, according to details set out in a strategic plan.

The funding will be used to move files to NARA's cloud workspace from the VA, which the Archives says will allow staff to access images and conduct day-to-day processing of veteran requests.

Details of the funding were included in a strategic plan, revealed through a Freedom of Information Act Request, and follow sustained scrutiny of the backlog by lawmakers.

NARA last May received a \$9.1 million loan from the Technology Modernization Fund to update two systems that are key for furnishing veterans with documents.

According to plan documents, as of Feb. 13, the backlog of unanswered requests had fallen to 404,000 down from a peak of 604,000 at the

height of the pandemic.

"NARA has allocated funding for several initiatives that will transform paper-based processes for fulfilling customer requests for paper records into fully electronic processes that rapidly deliver digitized copies to customers through secure, accessible web portals," the agency said in the plan.

The strategic plan also allocates \$400,000 to support the electronic processing of record requests, which includes the purchase of laptop computers and other technology to allow NARA staff to fulfill requests electronically.

During fiscal 2023, NARA has allocated \$7.1 million to the modernization of its Case Management Reporting System (CMRS), one of the two systems at the center of the agency's plan for furnishing veterans with documents.

NARA added also that it will allocate "additional funds" to implement secure user authentication for the public using the governmentwide authentication service Login.gov.
