### President's Letter

We will have a full meeting with the tour and continued planning for a small workshop next April.

State Archives news: The fall and winter were quiet, as visitation has been down since the closure of the State Museum in mid October. We are anticipating that the summer is going to be down too (except during the middle and end of July surrounding the Germans from Russia Heritage Society convention) because of the closed museum, poor economy and high gas prices, so there will be ample opportunity for people to get into the archives to work on some family history. If you can't come to the archives, now is a good time to write for paid searches for naturalization records, obits and biographies before we get busier in the spring. The open Saturdays continue to be very slow. When the archives started opening one Saturday a month 10 years ago we had the family history community in mind, and we wonder why more people do not take advantage of this resource as visitation has declined steadily.

Also concerning both our open Saturday and the 2013 GRHS convention, we will again be switching the Saturday in July from the second Saturday (July 13) to the third (July 20) to allow convention attendees to come to the archives if they wish. The change last year was an overwhelming success as we had one of our busiest Saturdays ever. Please make note of this if you were planning a visit around that time and also let others in your local societies know of the change.

## North Dakota Genealogical Society Honorees

Beth Bauman was always interested in family history. She served as a volunteer and was the first Director of the Family History Center in Bismarck for many years and has



helped many people with their family history. She spearheaded the extensive research materials collection that is available at the center.

She was a charter member of the Bismarck Mandan Historical and Genealogical Society and has served in many offices within this organization. She has been instrumental in many of the workshops that they have held and has taught classes and volunteered for many other jobs within this group.

She was also a charter member of the North Dakota State Genealogical Society.

Beth was one of the principal people involved in the compilation of Burleigh County Prairie Trails to Hi-Ways and the Burleigh County Book of Remembrances. Other books and indexes include the Mandan, ND Newspapers 1882-1924, Index of Marriage Records, Pre-1925 Burleigh County, Kennelly Funeral Home Records 1906-1953 and St. John's Cemetery.

She was involved with Random Act of Genealogical Kindness. Beth enjoyed teaching genealogy classes at Bismarck State College and to senior groups and at workshops. She was called to serve a mission for her church and was sent to Ricks College in Rexburg, Idaho to work in the family history center there.

Beth was instrumental in the set up of the North Dakota Death Index computers at the State Archives and was on the committee that worked to place the North Dakota Death Index online.

She was involved with the State Archives when they indexed the 1885 Dakota Territory census and spent many hours researching for the compilation of the various cemetery indexes, newspaper indexes and books.

Beth got her pilot's license before her driver's license and while attending Utah State College at Logan she taught flower arranging classes (her parents were florists). During World War II she drove army trucks and was also a driver for officers.

We honor Beth and her extensive contributions to gene-

alogists in North Dakota and other states.

Don Smith has enjoyed family history for many years. He was an early member of the Bismarck Mandan Historical and Genealogical Society and served as the

Treasurer for many years. He was a member of the Publication committee, where he spent most of his time printing and researching for publications. He also worked on compiling the newsletter and has done most of the



copying and mailing for many years.

The copier for the Bismarck Mandan Historical and Genealogical Society was kept in Beth Bauman's basement and when the day care kids came home from school and saw his car parked at the house they would run in and yell "Don's home" and then go down and tell him what was happening in their lives. He always patiently listened to them.

Don was a founding member of the North Dakota State Genealogical Society and served as Treasurer for 16 years. Don also volunteered to copy and mail the newsletter three times a year.

Don spent many hours helping the State Archives index the 1885 Dakota Territory Census.

Don has been involved in many aspects of both of these organizations and has volunteered for many jobs with the workshops they have presented.

Don enjoys being involved and worked on many of the indexing projects of the Bismarck Mandan Historical and Genealogical Society over the years.

He was involved in the committee to place the North Dakota Death index online.

We honor Don for his many years of service to the North Dakota State Genealogical Society and for his contributions to genealogists in North Dakota and other states.

George Barron began his career in Jamestown ND as a science and chemistry teacher for Jamestown Public High School for 36 years beginning in the fall of 1951. He had previously taught for one year at Cleveland,

ND. George retired from teaching in 1986. In approximately 1988 at the request of his daughter, George started helping her with their family's history project. That was all it took, George was "hooked."



George's first genealogical projects compiled

and published included: The Berner Book – for a mini reunion of the cousins of his wife, Jewel. Each family was given a copy at the reunion. In addition George created a self guided tour of family sites in the Jamestown and rural area for the cousins during the weekend reunion in 1994; *The Barron Family from Banffshire, Scotland to Moody County, Dakota Territory, USA Book* in 1995 with his cousin Norma Johnson of New Mexico. This book details their two lines of the Barron clan. Their book won 1st Prize at the Family History Workshop in Moorhead, MN.

George has belonged to the James River Genealogy Club since his conception in 1991 in Carrington, ND. George continues to serve as its first and only vice president. He began doing searching for Stutsman County in 1991 and continues to provide this service today for a donation to the James River Genealogy Club, along with other searchers in Foster, Wells and Eddy counties. These searches include seeking out and obtaining copies of as many of the records as available for each request.

His summer projects included reading tombstones in cemeteries of Stutsman County Supplement 1 in 1991 and Supplement 2 in 1992 aided by his wife, Jewel, and their "cemetery" Golden Retriever dog. Various cemeteries in Logan County and Kidder County in 1996; Foster County-1997; Sheridan County and Eddy County-1998; did field work on revision of Cemeteries of ND Wells County-1986-1998; Rural and Village Cemeteries of Stutsman County-1999; Most Cemeteries of Jamestown, Stutsman County-2000; Morton County cemeteries, 2001, Rural and Village Cemeteries in Barnes County-2002; Cemeteries of Valley City-Barnes County-2003; Sioux County cemeteries-2004; Northern and Southern LaMoure County cemeteries in 2005; Highland Home Cemetery of Jamestown ND along with Griggs County cemeteries in 2007. He was aided by his traveling cemetery buddy, Daphne Drewello, of Jamestown and his ever faithful cemetery Golden Retriever. Together they traveled thousands of miles, read thousands of tombstones and collected thousands of records to aid in getting the most correct information. Following the collection process, George created books for each of these cemeteries which can still be obtained today through a donation to the James River Genealogy Club.

George's winter projects included creating many indexes and creating a book for each project along with data bases that he maintains on a daily or annually basis: Obituary index to Stutsman County Record, 1930-1941 and 1942 to January 1961 (closing); Newspaper Obituary Indexes for Cleveland, ND 1914-1925, Courtenay 1901-1922, Kensal 1903-1942, Medina 1905-1920 & 1929-1934, Montpelier 1914-1934, Pingree 1908-1930, Streeter 1908-1930, Woodworth 1912-1935.

Published Marriage Indexes – Stutsman County records 1884-1975, Stutsman County records 1975-2002, pre 1925 marriage index on Stutsman County is on the internet at usgenweb.org

Daily, George still enters obituaries from the Jamestown Sun and entries to his Murder and Unusual Death databases.

This article falls far short of listing all of the contribution George Barron has made to genealogy buffs searching for information on their ancestors in Stutsman County and its area. When George gets "stuck" he will call his family and friends to try to gleam out any clues as to where he should go next. One of his daughters usually ends the call with "Good Luck, Sherlock."

### **Citation Corner**

Census records can yield lots of potential clues for locating your ancestors. Remember to search for variant surname spellings for each of your ancestors or search by using just their first name. Sometimes page by page searches in a specific location are necessary to locate the family or person of interest. Search both federal and state census entries, agricultural schedules, mortality schedules, veterans schedules and other types of schedules.

Scan the pages both before and after your family of interest to determine if there are any other family members or neighbors listed. Compare handwriting to verify spellings of names and places. Try to locate your family in each of the available census years to locate missing children or in

laws, spouses who may have died etc.

Check the 1880 census schedule for defective, dependent and delinquent classes. This schedule is now on ancestry.com but only for 17 states.

The following is a source citation for an entry in the 1880 Dakota Territory census.

The War of 1812 Pension Digitization Project is making progress but needs our help. The War of 1812 pension records are among the most requested documents at the National Archives. But these fragile documents are in urgent need of digitization. Of the 7.2 million pages to be digitized nearly half a million have

been preserved. Ancestry.com is now providing a dollar for dollar matching grant, so every dollar you contribute will make four more pages accessible and free for everyone. Please visit
