#### **NEW BUSINESS**

The meeting schedule for the next few years was discussed. In July 2016 we will meet in Dickinson, July 2017 in Fargo, July 2018 in Minot, and July 2019 in Grand Forks.

A discussion of using Skype at our meetings was tabled until Alfred Buchholz gets more information on whether it would be feasible.

NDSGS will return to having a program prior to the business meeting. Alfred Buchholz will arrange the programs in Bismarck and will leave it up to the individual societies for the meetings in their areas.

Twenty three databases are included in this free offer including Abstracts of Will, Administrations and Guardianships, 1787-1835, and Albany County Deeds Index 1630-1894.

# Minnkota Genealogical Society by Michael Swanson

The Minnkota Genealogical Society meets monthly throughout the year on the second Tuesday of each month. Meetings are generally held at the Campbell Library in East Grand Forks, Minnesota, though other meeting locations are used on occasion. Our society began the year with our annual planning meeting in January. Through suggestions from members, we were able to create a tentative program schedule with suggested speakers. The program in February was by member Daniel Sauerwein, who spoke on the topic of "Blogging Your Past." Daniel discussed different reasons for blogging, demonstrated several blogging platforms, and provided tips and tricks. Examples of genealogy blogs were shown and discussed.

Our March program featured Marsha Gunderson, a longtime member of the Grand Forks Historic Preservation Commission (GFHPC). Marsha explained the mission of the GFHPC and clarified what historic status entails for a house or neighborhood. She continued with a discussion of sources that can be used to research the "genealogy" of a house. April was a busy month for our society. Our regular monthly program began with a discussion on the implications of the sale of *Family Tree Maker* by Ancestry. Member and Vice-President Nancy Larson then gave a presentation on Ellis Island, including a video she purchased after recently touring the site. Minnkota, along with the local LDS Family History Center, sponsored Family Discovery Day on April 16 in Grand Forks. This free family history event consisted of a variety of live and recorded presentations on assorted topics. More than one hundred people attended.

In May, our presenter was Luana Gilstrap from Fargo who spoke on "Genealogy Nuts and Bolts." Through various examples, she highlighted basic points of genealogical research that we all need to keep in mind. Utilizing some of her strategies can also be used to overcome brick walls in our research. Luana will be returning in the fall with part two of this presentation. In addition to the varied programs, our monthly meetings include delicious treats provided by members, sharing of genealogical information, and assisting fellow members in their research. Visitors are always welcome to attend one of our regular meetings.





## **Citation Corner**

Church records can be difficult to locate but well worth the effort. Consider the fact that they might contain the names of grandparents or relatives who were witnesses. They should at least give the date of the event, parties involved and where the event took place. Sometimes the record will verify a cemetery record or place of death and age of the deceased. The record might list that an ancestor was disciplined for not attending church or for loose behavior.

You may have to hire a researcher to view the records for you if they are in a private repository. Search for church records in church archives, university libraries, state or local archives or the church itself. Some church records have been microfilmed by other organizations.

To cite church records you would list the church as the author, then the church location, record and book title, repository and repository location. So for a record found at a church the citation would be as follows.

Orleans Church of Christ (Moulton, Iowa), "Minutes-Journal," p. 18, T. B. Asby death (1866); parish, Moulton.

This church is located in Washington Township, Appanoose County, Iowa and these minutes listed that my ancestor T.B. Asby died August 1, 1866 aged 84 years on page 18. I spent several months tracking down this particular church record but it was well worth the time and effort.
