PROGRAM

Carolyn Twingley, the Serials/ILL/Archives Librarian at Bismarck State College (BSC) gave a tour of the archives and presented information about their collection.

The mission of the Bismarck State College Library Archives is to collect, preserve, arrange and make available important historical and social records of the College and to keep a primary source record of the events of preceding years and thoughts of past generations.

The Archives is specifically concerned with the administrative and historical records of Bismarck State College from its start in 1939 to the present day. Among the materials collected are: Yearbooks, college newspaper, photographs, letters, posters, publications, 3-D objects.

Bismarck State College began in 1939 in the Bismarck High School building. The tuition at that time was \$125 for one year. The first catalog was published in 1940. The first annual was published in 1942 and was entitled the "Markota." In 1944 the title of the annual was changed to the Jay-cee-an. The first newspaper was published on 20 December 1946 and was later called the "Mystician".

The Legislature approved the agency's request for another position for an archives specialist and that person will start sometime in July. The Archives hired four summer interns: Cassandra Stangeland (Northern State University, Aberdeen) is the reading room intern and she'll be here into August. We also have 2 Digital Projects interns, Alyssa Gerszewski (College of St. Benedict, St. Joseph, MN) and Amy Bellefeuille (NDSU), who will be working with local historical societies and other organizations in identifying and scanning photos and documents for uploading to CONTENTdm. This year's "Dakota Datebook" intern is Carol Wilson (Ohio Northern University, Ada). We also hired a parttime Reprographics Assistant, Patricia Jennings, to help our microfilming and scanning specialist with his work.

I have also been busy cataloging the Genealogy files from the archives (the 90000 collections). People can search for those in ODIN just by doing a Keyword Anywhere search using a family name. I have nearly 140 finished and many left to go.

I have also caught up with manuscript collection cataloging of collections received up to December 2008. Some collections of interest:

That's What I've Been Reading

THE OFFICIAL GUIDE TO FAMILY TREE MAKER, (2009) by Tana L. Pedersen, 420 pages

Recently I was contacted by Ancestry Publication asking if I would be interested in doing book reviews. So here is my second review on the book they sent me.

Tana L. Pedersen has written the guide to help you navigate through the 2009 Family Tree Maker (FTM). Most of the members of our genealogy society use FTM as the program of choice for recording their family history. I sense that many of us were disappointed with the changes in the 2009 program and I know some have reverted to using their older programs. I was accustomed to the "user friendly" and "cleaner" look from my older edition and suddenly with the 2009 edition I had this very different look.

I welcomed the opportunity to review The Official Guide to Family Tree Maker 2009, in hopes that it would help become more comfortable (and satisfied) with the newer edition. The book does provide detailed instructions on using the various features of the program and she also has included illustrations. It seems most of us while we don't like the new look of FTM we do like some of the new features in this edition. The book is helpful in understanding the various boxes, icons or symbols. In fact, the book serves as a form of encouragement to explore the program. The seven major categories that a user sees when they open the program are explained in detail. The same difficulty we continue to face in this world of ever changing technology exists, in that just when we have our comfort level high there is a change in the program. This book is helpful to facilitate a comfort level as skills increase by moving around on the 2009 edition of FTM. I think if I were new to genealogy and this was my first exposure to FTM, I'd be more excited about the 2009 edition. So while I am not real excited about FTM 2009, I would say the book is helpful in navigating the 2009 edition.
