Spring Trail Ride Highlights

It was all about the weather! Our Annual Spring Trail Ride took place on Saturday, May 11th this year. Thirty-seven riders enjoyed multiple trails including a new trail offering that came about due to months of work by several Board Members who have been hard at work with the Ware River Watershed Advisory Committee Trails Sub-Committed and DCR. The trail offered beautiful views from Crown Hill, the former estate of Jacob Riis (see article in this newsletter). All the folks who tried out the new trail reported that although one small area was gravelly, for the most part the trail was fabulous! We had about an equal number of members and non-members who participated in the ride.



Some folks arrived on Friday and camped out at Felton Field for the weekend. On Friday, folks enjoyed a potluck dinner at the Red Food Booth, followed by chatting around a relaxing camp fire and trying to

catch glimpses of the Northern Lights. Saturday dawned cool but sunny. Riders were provided a full hot breakfast of egg "McFeltons" (English muffin with egg, ham, cheese), hash brown potatoes, and hot coffee/tea which was included with the ride fee. As temperatures warmed to the mid-50s/low 60s with a slight breeze and sunny









skies, riders headed out onto the trails.

Returning riders were provided with dozens of hot lunch options including split pea soup, pulled pork from a Board Member's own home-raised pigs, chicken

ranch casserole, chicken chili, vegetarian minestrone soup, beef stew, and meatball sliders. Along with the hot entrees BRDC offered egg salad, ham and cheese, tossed salad, pasta salad, specialty salads, and PB&J. The dessert table offered multiple types of cookies, brownies, and cupcakes. Riders were also offered water, soda, and of course hot tea/coffee. The lunch options were all included in the ride fee. Many thanks to all the members who contributed toward the impressive lunch options! Many folks opted to camp over on Saturday night as well, extending the fun and making a lovely Mother's Day Weekend complete.



Equine Emergency First Aid Clinic Highlights



On Sunday, June 2nd, Barre Riding and Driving Club hosted a clinic on Equine Health and Emergency First Aid with Bettyann Cernese in Sterling, MA. Thirteen participants learned about equine first aid, exchanged best practices for horse care in an emergency and conducted hands-on practice in groups with four horse-volunteers. Bettyann was a wonderful presenter: calm, knowledgeable, and engaging. Her pacing for delivering information allowed participants to thoroughly absorb the detailed information and review procedures. She shared information about the practice of SULIS, a time-honored approach of partnering with your horse to develop a trusting

relationship that can be relied upon, especially during times of stress or anxiety such as if an injury were to happen. Taking vital signs was the first part of the session and after watching Bettyann demonstrate, participants practiced these skills on the horses.

After a lunch break, additional lessons covered when to call the vet, types of wounds, colic, collapse, cast horses, choke, poisoning, burns, and respatory and lameness issues. Participants practiced applying their new knowledge during a series of "emergency scenarios", in which the horse's injury was attended to with bandaging. After eight scenarios each horse was provided with a treat for their patience. Indeed, the more participants worked with each horse, the calmer and more relaxed each horse became, neatly supporting the concept of SULIS. Participants each



received a completion certificate and a spiral-bound equine first aid manual. Thanks to Rocky, Mickey, Justice, and Libby for their patience while we practiced equine first aid on them. Many thanks to Bettyann Cernese for her wonderful presentation and teaching and for her generous donation of \$130 to our club (\$10 for each participant)!

Trail Ride to Jacob Riis Farm

Many of our Spring Trail Riders were excited to ride a new trail this year. A little history of this trail is in order to increase our enjoyment of this experience. The trail led to spectacular views from Crown Hill, once the country estate of social pioneer, Jacob Riis.



trouble and advised to seek a more peaceful lifestyle. As soon as Riis and his second wife, Mary, looked at the farm at Crown Hill, they fell in love with it. The house then on the property was over 100 years old and was in need of repair, as were the barn and other outbuildings. However, the hill behind the house boasted slopes ideal for fruit trees. The Riis' planted apples, pears, peaches, and cherries and raised chickens, cows, and pigs. They renamed the farm "Pine Hill Farm". The Riis' faced the ordinary challenges of rebuilding the farm with good humor which Riis wrote

Before moving to Barre and falling so in love with the town that he requested burial in Riverside Cemetery off Granger Road where he rests by his request under an unmarked boulder, Riis was a pioneer social reformer and investigative reporter known for his time spent studying life in the slums of New York City. He wrote the book "How the Other Half Lives: Studies Among the Tenements of New York" detailing the terrible living conditions in the late 1800s and accompanying his writing with stark photographs showing young children living on the streets, apartment buildings carved up into such small spaces that some "apartments" had no windows.

Riis advocated for public housing, curtailing the greed of landlords who took advantage of immigrants and folks moving from the countryside to the city to find work. Riis, an immigrant himself, had suffered this type of abuse when he first arrived in New York City at age 21 in 1870. His work attracted the attention of the city's police commissioner, Theodore Roosevelt, and led to the 1901 Tenement House Act which included new regulations for housing construction, sanitation, and fire escapes. New York City began purchasing land around the city to create reservoirs to protect water quality just as DCR which now owns the Riis property in Barre does today.

In 1911, a now aging Riis was diagnosed with heart



about in a booklet called "Our Happy Valley" in reference to the Burnshirt River Valley between

Hubbardston and Barre. Riis died in 1914. His wife continued to farm the property for many years. The Commonwealth of Massachusetts took the property to become part of the Ware River Watershed which



protects the greater watershed that provides drinking water to metropolitan Boston. The farm buildings were demolished in 1941, but foundation ruins can still be seen on the trail our Spring Trail Riders traversed from Felton Field.
