History Spotlight – BRDC Roots – 1950s

The 1950s were busy transition years for the Barre Riding and Driving Club. Paraphrasing from the "History of the Barre Riding and Driving Club" speech given before the club's birthday buffet on August 7th, 1970, the Club grew the horse shows and added challenging trail rides. In 1950 a joint trail ride was held inviting Rutland to join us. In this same year permanent lighting was installed at the Field by the Commissioners. In 1951, the club added INC. to its title for the sum of \$75. The same year the party for the Barre Horse Show guests and workers was held at the

Apparently, the Club didn't think this was a worthwhile venture because it was not done again after that.

In the Spring of 1956 Margaret Cabell Self (a nationally renowned riding instructor from Virginia) delivered a lecture for the Barre Riding and Driving Club. This was one of the Club's public relations activities which was well received. This same year the Barre Thieves and Rogues were activated and many of our Riding Club members joined. The Barre Thieves and Rogues was a revival of an older group of the same name:

Also, that year (1956) the "new Callahan Trophy" was offered, and in an article written that year for the upcoming show, it states that "the new challenge trophy gives many of the old-timers a feeling of reviving a bit of the old Barre Fair". A fund, established by the late John A. Callahan, originally for the Barre

Fair for the purpose of promoting the interest in horses was

turned over to the Riding Club. With this fund a sterling silver tray was purchased and suitably inscribed. This trophy was retained by Robert Bangs in 1958, and in turn he offered another similar trophy. Instead of Callahan the name was in honor of the horse that won the trophy. After that, the trophy was given to the winner of the 35-mile Competitive Trail Ride, which has

since been discontinued. The trophy was won two consecutive times and one other time by Rebecca Spinney and was given to her after the 35-mile trail ride event was dropped.



1957 saw action beginning on the stables at the field. In January \$350 was voted for this use, but it was not used for the investigating committee recommended otherwise. In May of the same year \$500 was voted for partial payment for the new stalls at the field. If anyone was there, he will well remember our old taskmaster, Harry Rice, supervising as Club members removed nails from old stall boards and also slapped

paint on the new stalls before mother nature had the chance to bless it in any way. More members pounded thumbs and budding carpenters were the result of this venture. A true testimonial to Harry Rice.



The Club was well known for its generosity. The fees in the New England Hack Classes went to the New England Horsemen's Council and for many years the proceeds from the Knock, Down and Out

Class in the Show was sent to the U.S. Olympic Team. Also, in the year 1956 many Club members were first introduced to the Morgan Horse Magazine by Marion Zuretti. The Magazine, as a promotional venture, offered a Morgan weanling to the person selling the most

subscriptions. She won the weanling which she showed for many years. In this year the Juniors were first introduced in Barre by the name the Galloping Hooves, a name that was fondly recalled by Margaret Marshall when Hoof Prints Newsletter editors, Dave and Kat Marsh, visited the Barre Historical Society earlier this year. In May of 1956 a bulletin from the Central Mass

In 1958 the first Junior Horse Show was sponsored by the Riding Club, and as you can see from the fuzzy newspaper clipping to the right, 1200 folks attended the show that year! It was voted at this time to put \$600 in a Building Fund for another barn at Felton Field when and if such a project was warranted. Today, the Club continues to fundraise, provide funds to local scholars, promote an interest in horses, and serve as part of the glue that holds the Barre

Fall Trail Ride Highlights

Saturday, October 7th and Sunday, October 8th saw the Barre Riding and Driving Club do its best to pull off their annual Fall Trail Ride from Felton Field. Although the rainy Friday evening put a damper on the traditional potluck dinner, and the dreary (and inaccurate!) forecast for Saturday kept many riders and supporters uncertain, Sunday morning's tentative and misty dawn led to a bright, picturesque fall day perfect for a long or short ride through the exquisite New England trails in Barre.

The annual Fall Trail Ride began at Felton Field, 115 Old Coldbrook Road in lovely Barre Massachusetts, an area where the Barre Riding and Driving Club has operated for 85 years to carry on the traditions started by an original group of dedicated horse enthusiasts. BRDC offered 7-, 11-, 13- & 15-Mile Trail Routes consisting of gravel roads, rail bed, wooded trails and a small amount of pavement.
