## WALLA WALLA AMATEUR RADIO EMERGENCY SERVICE



If you want to hone your communication skills while offering a valuable service to the community, join the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES).

We provide emergency communications (EMCOMM) for Walla Walla County. We train for EMCOMM operations, participate in local, regional, and statewide drills, and support community events.

We have a regular meeting at the W7DP clubhouse on the third Monday of the month, at 7:00 PM. You need not be a member to attend.

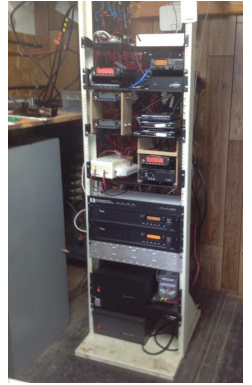
We also have nets twice weekly, Tuesday and Thursday, at 7 PM, on the Lewis Peak repeater (146.960 [-], PL74.4). The Tuesday net is for training, and the Thursday net is for operations. You need an Amateur Radio license to participate, but you can always listen in with a scanner.

## LEWIS PEAK AMATEUR REPEATER ASSOCIATION, K7UH

K7UH, in cooperation with the owner, supports a repeater site that covers much of SE Washington. We have a 2 meter and a 70 centimeter repeater, plus digital repeaters for APRS and WinLink. These are open to any amateur, but membership is encouraged. Annual dues help with operating costs, and also help fund equipment needs of ARES. The dues are individual \$10, Family \$15, and are collected in July.

## WANT YOUR HAM LICENSE?

Becoming an amateur radio operator is simple: study, pay a small fee, take and pass a test. Tests are quarterly in the county, thanks to the Walla Walla Valley Volunteer Examiners. Contact Mabel Babbitt, WB5AVH, at (509) 301-8472, or [wb5avh@msn.com](mailto:wb5avh@msn.com) for location & time.

### STUDY MATERIAL

There are three Amateur Radio licenses: Technician, General, and Extra. Each one requires a broader knowledge of rules and regulations, radio communications, and technology, but offers more band privileges.

Only a written test is required. You can learn from instructors, manuals, and on-line practice exams. The tests are randomly generated from a publicly available question pool that changes every 5 years.

If you are going to buy a license manual, be sure to get the manual covering the current question pool. The ARRL has good ones at <http://www.arrl.org/shop/Licensing-Education-and-Training/>. Extra study material is available, for free, at <http://www.ad7fo.com/training.html>.
