
“WILD ABOUT WESTIES” FUN MATCH AND ANNUAL MEETING

Why Is My Dog Coughing?

The cause of a dog's coughing is for a variety of reasons. However, a persistent cough needs to be addressed by a veterinarian ASAP. Kennel Cough (canine infectious tracheobronchitis) is a highly contagious air borne bacterial infection quickly spread from one dog to another. Dogs that are in contact with other dogs, such as a doggie daycare, frequent dog parks, go to any type of dog classes for training are highly susceptible. A ten-day course of an antibiotic quickly cures the problem. However, dogs can and should be immunized against Kennel Cough especially if their life style is one or more of the above. Boarding kennels require proof that the dog has been immunized against Kennel Cough before they'll accept the dog for boarding.

Canine Influenza is a highly contagious viral infection discovered in 2004. It is transmitted the same way as human influenza by coughing/sneezing and by coming in contact with surfaces that have been touched as this virus can survive up to 48 hours. Unlike Kennel Cough which is a bacterial infection, Canine Influenza does not respond to antibiotics as it is a virus. Common symptoms of Canine Influenza are coughing/sneezing sometimes with a nasal discharge, lethargy, not eating and a temperature over the normal of 101.5-102.5 degrees. Only a veterinarian can positively diagnose Canine Influenza and immediately prescribe the correct treatment. Four out of five dogs succumb to Canine Influenza if not treated within three days of the onset of symptoms. The good news is there is a vaccine now available to immunize dogs against Canine Influenza. NO, dogs cannot catch influenza from humans and vice versa.

Pulmonary Fibrosis, also known as Westie Lung disease, is more serious as there is no cure. The lung tissue...over time...hardens and makes it difficult for the dog to breathe. The first common symptom is coughing terminating with the dog gagging like it is trying to vomit. Other symptoms are lethargy and possibly not eating. A more definitive diagnosis is made by the veterinarian who can hear rales (abnormal lung sounds) with a stethoscope. There are medications that can help prolong the dog's life. However, early diagnosis is essential.

Collapsed trachea is a condition where the normally rigid rings that make up and support the trachea (wind pipe) become weak and cause the trachea to collapse which makes it difficult for the dog to breathe. Some literature claims that this condition may be hereditary and most commonly seen in Toy breeds. It can occur in either sex at any age. However, it is more often seen in dogs six years old or older. The classic sign is the dog has a honking cough much like the sound of a goose. Overweight dogs are at a greater risk. With medications, restricting activity and changing from a collar to a harness to avoid putting pressure on the trachea, dogs can enjoy a long, happy life.

Oslerus osleri, more commonly known as lungworm, are small parasite larvae (eggs) that infects and irritates the wind pipe as well as other associated areas involved with breathing. The dogs can ingest the larvae in many ways, such as puppies licking the mouth of their infected dam. Dams who harbor parasitic larvae are not affected because the larvae lay dormant and only become viable when she has a litter and the puppies get infected mostly through her milk. That is why all puppies need to be de-wormed whether or not they show any symptoms. The greatest cause is dogs that live in a

in a wooded area or roam in fields. Parasite larvae can live dormant in the ground for a very long time. Dogs...as is their nature.... sniff and dig through all sorts of debris while on a walk and are sometimes prone to eating a disgusting tidbit. Deer, squirrels, coyotes, raccoons, opossums, turkeys, foxes and birds all share our space. And yes! They all poop! It's the feces of these animals that deposit the parasitic larvae on the ground. The dog comes along and inhales this delightful smell and along with his/her sniffing scoops up the parasitic larvae. A common indication of a parasitic infection is a dry lingering cough. Occasionally, there is a discharge of mucus when the dog sneezes. The dog otherwise appears healthy, eating and drinking well, no fever, normal stools and goes about its daily routine. But a lingering cough over a day or two should not be ignored. The vet can make a diagnosis of parasitic larvae infection by a simple O&P test on the dog's stool. The cure is also simple. Panacur is the "go to" medication for parasites. It's a powder that is sprinkled over the dog's food once a day for 8-10 days. The vet may also prescribe a low dose of Prednisone over several days to aid in reducing the swelling in the bronchial tubes/trachea. Most veterinarians request a stool sample at the annual visit. The cost of having an O&P, even though the stool looks normal, is well worth it to be sure that your dog is not harboring microscopic parasite larvae.

Chronic bronchitis occurs when the bronchi are irritated by something. It could be a simple infection. A round of antibiotics will quickly take care of this. Bronchial scarring left behind by lungworms can also cause chronic bronchitis. Then there are those irritants that leave us and the vet baffled. When there is no answer to the source of the chronic cough, the best that can be done is to treat the symptoms and hopefully find a medication or combination of medications that will relieve the coughing spells, if not eliminate it.

Dogs sometimes cough/sneeze when exposed to environmental conditions, more commonly household sprays, cleaning chemicals and outdoor pollen. Obviously, we cannot control the air that the dog breathes outside the house. However, we can control what is used inside the house. Observing the dog inside the house and his/her coughing is certainly a clue to stop using it. It is common for a dog to occasionally cough or even sneeze to clear some type of irritant in the air passages. This type of behavior is nothing to be alarmed over if it doesn't continue. However, a lingering cough over a day or two or continued sneezing warrants a trip to the vet's office.

YOU are the only person who really knows your dog! We are entrusted with their overall welfare and are their only advocate. If something doesn't seem right to you....it isn't!

Teach ALL children to respect ALL dogs

Do not Allow:

- ear pulling
- tail pulling
- smacking
- sitting on
- hugging
- hovering over
- etc.

Do not expect a dog to tolerate children's bad behavior.

Keep both your dog and child safe.


Be responsible!

Know the Signs



How to keep your dog cool on hot days

- Restrict exercise
- Never leave in car, hot room or sun trap
- Ensure drinking water and a cool, shaded spot is always available
- Walk early in the morning or later in the evening
- Spray with cool water

Steps to take if you're worried your dog has heat stroke

- Move somewhere cool
- Offer small amounts of tepid water
- Using wet towels, douse with cool (but never, ever cold) water
- Place in the breeze of a fan
- Contact your vet, or after hours, your nearest Vets Now pet emergency clinic immediately.




