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On My Mind

As I begin my tenure as the Vice President of Collections I am reminiscent of the times when prints were the only way to view photographs. Back in the 40's and 50's no one could have imagined that the future of photography would not include photo sensitive celluloid printed on paper and that electrons saved in a digital form would soon become the norm. We used to share our memories by looking through albums and passing along those albums from generation to generation. Later those black and white images evolved into color and eventually transparent slides, which we would share by projecting them for friends and family.

Now in a world of instantaneous image sharing created by the advent of iPhone type cameras, the world today sees an astonishing number of images being taken every single day. In 2017 over 1.2 trillion images were taken. These images are usually only shared digitally, many of which will likely will be lost sometime in the future due to digital files being changed and new and better ways of storing these electronic images evolve. Film was the master of photography for well over 100 years and during this time the evolution migrated from glass plates to rolls of film with as many as 36 images, causing us as photographers to ration our images and thus limiting the number

of images we would take. It was a cost prohibitive issue for many. Future generations will not have the same intimate experience in sharing with their friends, family, and descendants as many of us did. This is why photographic prints are so valuable. I accepted the position of Vice President of Image Collections because I saw a wealth of images from our past that will now be preserved for the future. My responsibility includes not only the archiving of past Photographic Society of America photographer's images but will include the continued collection of images from our current members. Some of our great photographers today only work in the digital realm, where they enter and excel in the different projected image sections of the different divisions. My goal is to capture the best of these inspiring works and preserve them for the future in the Image Collection.

The Photographic Society of America has an extensive collection of prints dating back to the 1930's, with over a \$2 million value in the current collection and more prints being added each year. Each spring a dedicated team of members takes on the daunting task of reviewing the best prints from the past year and makes decisions regarding their inclusion in the permanent collection. This is a time-consuming process and as a team they include the very best of our PSA members. Now with the increase in digital images and because many members never make prints it is the desire of this team to begin to include these digital images in the permanent collection for PSA. We hope that our extremely talented photographers will continue to donate a sample of their best images each year for the collection so that future patrons of photography will have that tactile experience of viewing those images for many years to come.

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On the PSA Website

On the PSA Website: Drop-Down Menus

As websites get ever more complicated and peoples' patience gets ever more shortened, the PSA website has attempted to make individual pages more succinct and user friendly. One great tool we've used is the drop-down, "toggle" menu—a great trick to consolidate a great deal of information on a single web page.

How to Spot a Toggle-Down Menu

All toggle-down menus on the PSA website have a few things in common. The headings appear double-spaced, bold and deep red and usually there are at least three headings listed. To the right of the top heading always appears the underlined words "Show All / Hide All." Those words control how much of the information you want revealed when you use the page.

Show All and Hide All are unique to the individual page and unique to you, the user. If you click Show All on one page, it will only affect that page, not every page on the PSA site and it will reset itself to Hide All as soon as you leave the page.

This is a great feature because information that may have been hidden at the bottom of a long page, can now become your primary focus. For example, if you look at the Current Exhibition list and only want to check out Photojournalism Exhibitions, you can see just that list by clicking the Photojournalism Division (PJD) heading. Finished with that and want to see those of the 3D Division? Just click the title again to hide it and then select 3D Division (3DD).

If you want to see all the exhibitions at once, just click "Show All" and you'll see quite a long web page. It's that easy.

Tricks to Searching

Selecting Show All not only allows you to see everything on a single page, but it also allows your browser search engine to browse the entire page at once. For example, if you want to see every current exhibition that mentions China, select Show All and then choose COMMAND+F or CONTROL+F and it will show you the results from all divisions. If you only want to search a few divisions, then toggle just those divisions down, do your search, and the results will only affect what you are seeing. It's like what you see is what you search. If you don't see it, i.e. you don't toggle down, your search won't be able to see it either.

Other Areas for the Toggle Down

Long lists are the favorite place for toggle downs, particularly the ROPA list, which toggles down by the alphabet. You can also see how toggle downs helped organize the division officers and directors pages, by separating all division directors into those that provide information, run programs for individuals or clubs, or help with recognition and exhibitions. The PSA Members only (My PSA) section also uses toggle downs and these have recently been updated so you can know what to find under each toggle down before selecting it.

We hope the use of this feature cuts down on superfluous information and gets you directly to what you need to know.

Online Courses for PSA Members

PSA Online Courses are a PSA-member benefit, designed to help beginning and advanced photographers improve their skills in a guided manner. The courses are free to all members and usually take place over a period of months. To enroll in a course, visit the PSA website and fill out the corresponding online Enrollment Form. You will be contacted shortly thereafter to set up the course.

Board Report Fall 2017

By Nan Carder, APSA, MPSA, Secretary Nine of the thirteen-member Board of the Photographic Society of America (PSA) met on October 7thth, 8th, and 14th, 2017 at the PSA Annual Conference in Pittsburgh, PA. The Society's Finance Committee and Executive Committee met on April 6th, 2017.

The following PSA Board of Directors were in attendance: Charles "Charlie" Burke,
HonPSA, EPSA (President); Elena McTighe,
FPSA, MPSA (Executive Vice President); Nan
Carder, APSA, MPSA, (Secretary); Dana
Cohoon, APSA, (Treasurer); Greg Daley, EPSA,
(Conference Vice President); Dan Charbonnet,
III, HonPSA, EPSA, (Exhibition Services
Vice President); Janet Bigalke, FPSA (Image
Collections Vice President); Donald Brown,
APSA, PPSA, (Membership Vice President), and
Gerrie Vergona (Public Relations Vice President).

Also attending were the following incoming officer-candidates: Gary Potts, GMPSA, (Executive Vice President); Rich Fisher (PSA Treasurer); Signe Emmerich, FPSA, EPSA, (Chapter, Clubs, and Councils Vice President), Randy Carr, APSA, MPSA, (Exhibition Services Vice President); J.R. Schnelzer, APSA, PPSA, (Image Collections Vice President); Jaci Finch, APSA, (Information Technology Vice President); Larry Cowles, FPSA, GMPSA/G, and Twila Bourlon, Office Manager.

Absent: Roy Killen GMPSA, (International Relationships Vice President), Kah-Wai Lin, EPSA, SPSA, (Chapters, Clubs, and Councils Vice President), Sue Marrugi (Publications Vice President), and Tom Savage, APSA, MPSA, (Divisions Vice President).

Before the meeting, each board member submitted a written report about the committees and activities under his/her area of supervision. At the meetings, each member presented his/her agenda, report and any motions for board action. The board of directors (BOD) also reviewed the reports and recommendations from several task forces during the BOD session on strategic planning. At the board meeting, all the 2018-2020 board members signed the Disclosure Statement.

President, Charlie Burke, HonPSA, EPSA: Acceptance Database: The contract for Phase One (1) of the Exhibition Acceptances Management System (EAMS) was signed in July. Volunteers started uploading EDAS reports last June. Over one (1) million 2016 and 2017 acceptances have been uploaded. PSA is already doing preliminary work on Phase Two (2). The PSA Website continues to grow with over 5,000

webpages. The **PSA Database** now contains over 32,340 member-records. Efforts continue to improve the recording of referrals. **Photo Adventure Tours** continued with a trip to the Rocky Mountain National Park in September.

Executive Vice-President, Elena McTighe, FPSA, MPSA: Elena supervised the following Committees.

Educational Services: The implementation of graduation certificates is now handled by PSA Headquarters. Chairman. Jon Fishback, APSA, has trained 18 Portfolio assessors. As of 2017, the Image Analysis course has had 109 PSA-member graduates. The Enrichment Committee (Critical Action Sub Team #4): This committee is to be congratulated for their work on standardizing the Star Ratings System for the divisions. **Greenhood Scholarships**: Four of the 15 applicants have been selected, and their prints were on display at the annual conference. Historical Research Committee: Laura Davies, HonPSA is the chairperson and keeps PSA's records. Portfolio **Distinctions**: There will be two sessions scheduled for 2018 in Florida and in Washington state. Service Award Program (SRA): There were ten (10) approved Service Awards. Society **Recognition Award:** The first **Sophia Cheung** Volunteer of the Year Award was presented at the PSA Annual Conference in Pittsburg, PA, to Henry Ng, FPSA, EPSA. Volunteer Services: A Volunteer's List of unfilled position is included in the bi-monthly Enews. Webinar Program: The program is ready to go, and PSA needs a volunteer to run the program.

Secretary, Nan Carder, APSA, MPSA: The Honors Committee: Thirteen applications were approved this year for the APSA, and one for HonPSA. The Ethics Review Board chairman for 2017-2018, will be Barbara Kuebler, APSA, MPSA. There were no new sanctions. The Nominating Committee revised the Master Operations Manual. They found replacements for the PSA current and incoming board positions for PSA Treasurer; Conference Vice President; and PSA Public Relations Vice President. PSA Bylaws: Austin Carey will continue in this position.

Treasurer, Dana Cohoon, APSA: PSA has completed the audit. All expenses for conferences will now be in the fiscal year. Donor Registration and implementation of the Levels of Giving is now completed. All contracts must be approved

by the Executive Committee. The Bylaws are now completed with revisions, and a copy is now on the PSA website.

Chapters, Clubs, & Councils (CCCVP) Kah-Wai Lin, EPSA, SPSA: Kah-Wai Lin, EPSA, SPSA, resigned from this positon, and Signe Emmerich, FPSA, EPSA was appointed to the position. The new Arizona Charter was presented to the Chapter at the PSA Conference. Clubs: Pat Gordy, APSA, is the new Newsletter Contest Director. Councils Challenge: Jeff Klug continues as the Councils' Challenge Director. PSA Conference: The Chapters, Clubs, and Councils programs were shown in a three-hour presentation.

Conference Vice President Greg Daley, EPSA: The photo-walks, tours, and workshops went well. The 2018 Conference will be in Salt Lake City, UT, (September 30 to October 6) and the 2019 conference is planned for Spokane, WA (September 22 to 29, 2019). PSA Headquarters will take over registration next year. The Enrichment Committee

is working on ways to revamp future conferences.

Divisions Vice President Tom Savage, APSA, MPSA: Interclub competitions continue to do well. Star Ratings continues to go up yearly. Study Groups: The Projected Image Division provides the Society with most of the Study Groups. There is a need for more Study Groups in the other divisions.

Exhibition Services Vice President, Dan Charbonnet, III, HonPSA, EPSA: The new Star Ratings Director is Craig Parker, MPSA. There have been 407 PSA-recognized exhibitions in 2017. Who's Who: was completed on time this year. PSA International Exhibition: The PSA International Exhibition had a slight increase with more digital entries, but a slight decrease in print entries. Star Ratings: Application Instructions for Star Ratings 1-5 has been standardized and was approved by the board. ROPA distinctions were slightly down.

Image Collections Vice President, Janet Bigalke, FPSA: The print collection will remain at the University of Central Oklahoma. All the PSA book collection has been logged, tagged, and catalogued. Projected Image Collection: The first version of the "PICC Online Digital Image Submission" system was developed by Charlie Burke, HonPSA, EPSA, in early June, who continues to work on the system. The 2015 TOPS program is completed and the 2016 program is in the process. Print Collection: PSA has hired UCO intern graduate Elizabeth Roberts and Jessica Rice to do curatorial services and instruct PSA staff at PSA Headquarters. The print scanner has been moved to PSA Headquarters. The two new contract

employees are scanning images. The 2017 PSA Conference had a selection of 34 prints from the print collection on display. **Travel Aides:** Janet Bigalke will work with the Travel Division to get more Travel Aides for more areas.

International Relationships Vice President (IRVP) Roy Killen, GMPSA: Roy continues to work with the Ambassadors and Liaison Officers. The PSA Goodwill Ambassadors are now under the direction of the IRVP. There was a promotional event to promote PSA membership in Australia with the organizer of the St. George Photography Education Program. There was an annual PSA-APS Print exchange of eight prints this year. The eight prints were on displayed at the annual conference.

Membership Vice President Donald Brown, APSA, PPSA: The Membership Star Program is now under the direction of John Livoti. Membership Milestone Program: This program, with director Christine Wilkins, is current. Webinars: The Webinar Program is ready to begin, but it needs a director.

Office Manager Report, Twila Bourlon:
Accounting System and Audit: A full fiscal
year's financial data was entered in the new
QuickBooks Accounting system. The annual audit
went well. Interclub Ribbons: The office now
has a system to mail out the awards and ribbons
for all Interclub competitions from headquarters.
This project was completed by John Key, Office
assistant. Education Program: The office now
mails all certificates for the Education program,
and this is also done by John Key.

Public Relations Vice President Geraldine (Gerrie) Vergona: Gerrie has been has been developing a social media process which should be implemented by December 2017.

Publications Vice President Sue Marrugi: Sue was unable to attend the board of director's meeting and the report was given by Larry Cowles, FPSA, GMPSA/G. Larry will be increasing the queue of articles for the *Journal*. Larry would like more educational articles in the future.

Presidential Enrichment Ad Hoc Committee—
Project Renew: The incoming PSA Executive
Vice President, Gary Potts, APSA, GMPSA, has
been working on Project Renew. He is working
with PSA members on some of the following areas:
Technology Forum Group, Study of the Annual
Conference, Liaison with Photography Companies,
Educational Programming, New Member Follow
Up, and Rewards and Recognition. ■

Just for Beginners Sitting, Kneeling, and Stooping

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Sitting Down at Kit Bond Bridge, Kansas City

Sitting down on the ground is a sure way to produce an image different from most others. One evening during the golden hour, I sat down on the hard, uneven stones by the side of the Missouri River to take the photo of the Kit Bond Bridge. The ground was my tripod. My camera's swivel monitor made it easy to see the composition.

All my camera club members stood next to

their standing-up tripods. (See them in the far upper right!) Their bridge images were the standard, picture-perfect, close-up postcard view. I joined them and got that shot, too. But my view from ground level showed the riverside setting. It told more of the story.

Kansas is famous for its native tall prairie grasses.

The grasses are also planted by landscape architects for residential and commercial projects. At a friend's retirement community, the streets are lined with planted masses of tall prairie grass. When I was standing there in person, the view looked quite normal.

But when I knelt down on one

knee, I was amazed to see that the scene no longer looked like a street with pavement and sidewalk. I turned what would have been a mundane snapshot into a striking one.

My photo at Unity Village in Kansas City, Missouri, is an example of a meticulous placement by shooting from a foot below eye level. I wanted the emblem on top of the column to have a plain background behind it to make it more visible. This was not the view as I was walking by. That sculptured design was lost in the busy garden scene with two benches and building behind. When I stooped down just a little, I could make the sculptured emblem visible. It's now the first thing you notice. Stooping to put your subject exactly where you want it can give you the result you cannot achieve when photographing at eye level.

Moral of the story: sit down, kneel, and stoop! ■

The Enthusiast's Guide to Exposure: **49 Photographic Principles You Need to Know**

Obtaining the best exposure for the image you're trying to capture is not necessarily a matter of putting your camera on automatic and firing away. The mood you want to create


is often determined by the exposure you choose at the moment of capture. In The Enthusiast's Guide to Exposure: 49 Photographic Principles You Need to Know, the author begins by discussing the definition of exposure and how light affects exposure. He continues by presenting an assortment of guidelines to use in various photographic scenarios that are also dependent on the use of shutter priority, aperture priority, manual, or automatic modes. Greengo devotes chapters to the AEL (Auto Exposure Lock) button as well as the Exposure Compensation feature that are available on most DSLRs as well as the use of neutral density filters and when they are helpful to use. A comprehensive book featuring a

wealth of information about exposure, this is one you'll enjoy keeping on your bookshelf and using frequently.

Aurora HDR 2017 Masters Class by Serge Ramelli



PSA's new Clubs, Councils and Chapters VP (CCCVP) **Signe Emmerich**, **FPSA**, **EPSA**, has provided information about Club, Council and Chapter services elsewhere in this issue of the *PSA Journal*, so I will not try to duplicate it here.

But what I do want to do at this time is highlight the PSA Website contest (co-directed by Jean Roberts and myself). The contest opens for entries January 15 and closes for entries March 15, 2018. some interest in the contest. Does your club enter? Do you know? Do you care? Entries have been declining over the last few years. If your club is like mine, there are lots of volunteer opportunities and not enough volunteers. Being a club webmaster is not easy. It takes time and effort as well as talent. One of the ways club members could pay webmasters back for their efforts on the club's behalf is to help the webmaster gain some recognition from PSA by entering or encouraging them to enter the PSA website contest. It can be helpful for your club's website in interesting ways. For example, at this year's website contest session at the PSA Pittsburgh Conference we heard about new federal regulations that will require governmental entities and certain organizations to be website compliant with the American's with Disabilities Act. While these regulations do not yet apply to club websites it would be good to see what your website could incorporate now to become user-friendly for those with disabilities. We heard that compliance is probably good practice in any case, so clubs should be looking at this issue. Is this a concern for your club? Does vour webmaster know?

Your club can help PSA and the other clubs by adding your input to our knowledge of important issues. The ADA compliance issue was brought to our attention by the representative of a member club who is also a website contest judge. Please have a chat with your club webmaster and join us as we work to improve the way we communicate with our members, potential members and an interested public. Your thoughts are appreciated!



So How Was Pittsburgh 2017?

As a first timer who enjoyed the PSA Conference in San Antonio in 2016, the question that thrust itself prior to Pittsburgh 2107 was: to go or not to go? Would recurring visits to PSA Conferences breed boredom coupled with contempt? A sense of déjàvu? Been there seen it all? Hamlet was of no help in resolving this issue; and Shakespeare wouldn't dispel the doubts either. The logical answer was: quit your stalling and get thine self going!

The after effects of the exhausting 17-hour trip from the Middle East to Pittsburgh were mitigated by the welcoming smiles and cordial assistance of the PSA Registration Desk's staff who handed out the red bag containing booklets with detailed information and assorted gifts.

Named after British statesman, Sir William Pitt, who devised a military strategy to wrest the area from French control in 1758, Pittsburgh subsequently became home to industrialists and masters of fortune such as Frick, Carnegie, Oliver and Phipps. These individuals sought to perpetuate their names by building steel mills and imposing edifices. The divergent architectural styles straddle the Romanesque, Gothic and Renaissance—all executed in intricate, delicate and delectable details. There is even a touch of Venice in Pittsburgh represented by the Bridge of Sighs, which connects the Allegheny County Courthouse, built of rusticated granite blocks, to the prison. The modern buildings, on the

other hand, exhibit flair and imagination in their exterior design as well as uninhibited use of materials such as the all-glass PPG building in neo-Gothic style. Surprisingly, the divergent styles do not clash, but enhance each other.

And then, there are the numerous bridges, this being the city of iron and steel. The Three Sisters are look-alike suspension bridges named after artist Andy Warhol, environmentalist Rachel Carson, and Roberto Clemente.

The Sunset Tour, planned for Sunday afternoon, failed to deliver the sunset which preferred to hide behind softly-drizzling clouds. But nothing will deter hungry photographers bent on getting the picture; and evening shots from the Grandview Overlook facing the convergence of the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers, with the city lights blinking in the background can be no less alluring than sunset shots.

The next day, friends of flora had their heyday in the Phipps Botanical Gardens whose design borrows from Kew Gardens in England. The vast collection of its exhibits, ranging from tropical to desert flowers in all colors of the rainbow, was a welcome respite from the grim and gray skies on the day of our visit.

Then on to the Cathedral of Learning, a lofty, imposing structure fondly nicknamed "Cathy" by students of the University of Pittsburgh on the grounds of which it is located.

Topped by a ribbed Gothic vault, the majestic hall inspires a tranquil, reverential atmosphere of learning and meditation.

Tuesday started with the Youghiogheny waterfall, located in Ohio Park, whose waters, plunging from a 20-foot height, provided us with an opportunity to practice slow shutter speeds to gain those "velvety" shots of the flowing water. From this waterfall we went on with our smiling guide, **Fred Doerfler**, to Fallingwater, Frank Lloyd Wright's masterpiece. I stood in awe in front of this exemplary example of organic architecture and engaged in a delightful dialogue with nature. Here, nature is not kept at bay, but invited inside the house to the point of integrating the surface of a natural boulder into the floor of the living room. This space, surrounded by windows, is practically a glass box resting on the platter of its wide veranda. It looks as if it would slide down with the waterfall's current, an impression intensified by the building's precarious, cantilevered perch. Once inside, the low-roofed spaces illuminated by indirect, soft lighting, create an atmosphere of warmth, intimacy and security in direct contrast with its seemingly insecure overhang. Imagine how exciting it would be sitting in this

glass box, surveying the trees wildly swaying from one side to another during a raging storm!

Other tours catered to lovers of fauna, animals and, naturally, Pittsburgh's bygone steel mills and foundries.

The tours over, Wednesday witnessed the start of lectures and presentations by PSA members and guest speakers, imparting wide-ranging know-how and tips galore encompassing every PSA division. This found attendees dashing from one presentation to another as well as to workshops providing on-the-spot instruction.

Among the guest speakers was **Jozef Aerts**, **HonPSA**, **GMPSA/S**, **MFIAP**, recipient of PSA's Lifetime Achievement Award, who thrilled the attendees with his superb pictures taken over the years, including travel, nature, photojournalism and life in a monastic community.

Another guest speaker was **Nick Ut**, a latter-day Robert Capa, recipient of PSA's International Understanding Through Photography Award (IUTP), who held the audience in rapt attention as he displayed his photographs taken during the Vietnam war, including the unforgettable picture of the little girl fleeing the flames of war which won the

Pulitzer Prize and reportedly swayed American public opinion and changed the course of the war.



Attorney Nancy Wolff delivered a comprehensive lecture entitled Photography and the Law dealing with legislature aimed at protecting photographers' work and preventing infringement and fraud thereof. However, it was made clear that there are also certain other laws aimed at curbing photographers' activities on the street, heralding the end of street photojournalism. What is downright controversial and contradictory is that billions of Smartphone users worldwide are "immune" from these laws and are free to shoot at will in all directions of the compass.


In between the lectures, cordial meetings and delightful get-togethers were taking place between new acquaintances as well as longtime friends, such as former POM Chair Mark Fohl, APSA, (a native of Pittsburgh) and his wife Claire who traveled all the way from Columbus, Ohio to meet and greet and show me around. Another get-together took place in an Arab restaurant at the invitation of my friend Majdi Al Naser from Saudi Arabia who is doing remarkable work promoting photography in the Arab Gulf countries. Majdi also invited Syed Kamal from Bangladesh; Shaikh Amin, FPSA, GMPSA, from Pakistan; Agatha Bunanta, APSA, GMPSA, from Indonesia; Goodwill Ambassador John Davis, HonPSA, MPSA, and his wife Barbara; Ahmad Abdullah al-Shuwaikhat and Ghorfan Abdulhameed Alkhardawi from Saudi Arabia. Four of the aforementioned countries do not maintain diplomatic relations with the country I'm coming from. But PSA recognizes no constraining boundaries, tolerates no political controversies. Friendship is the word.

The festive Honors Banquet, which witnessed honorees receiving their awards with due decorum, concluded the Conference—following which the guests filed out, bidding farewell and hoping to see each other at the next conference. The tables were then gradually cleared, the lights switched off and the curtain came falling down. A tad melancholic; but tomorrow is another day, and Salt Lake 2018 is another conference.

So how was Pittsburgh 2017? Wonderful, if you ask me—which calls for a huge kudos to the organizers. And should any wavering "to go or not to go" ensue prior to future PSA conferences, the unwavering answer will be: Go man, go!

Blind Justice

PSA Portfolio Distinctions—Thoughts on a Successful Bronze Level Portfolio

Dystopia Submitted by Petri Damstén, PPSA, BPSA, Finland

The Statement of Intent for this portfolio was, "When making this series I went through my mental journey in the past years by picturing it as a dystopian society. Right from the start it was obvious that I play the role of a human in these pictures myself. Little human facing a faceless

society was an easy role to play. Looking at the world now, the pictures also work on a larger scale and not just as one man's battle inside his head."

We have to begin with an understanding of the word Dystopia. Depending on the dictionary used it can mean, an imagined place or state in which

everything is unpleasant, possibly totalitarian or environmentally degraded. Webster adds that it may be a place where people lead dehumanized or fearful lives because they are not treated fairly. With that as a basis, this portfolio takes the viewer inside such a world.

Exploring the portfolio, we quickly find that in no instance is an individual fully recognizable as such. Individual identity is suppressed. Most of the players in the images are virtual clones. That which does not conform is denied, punished or otherwise confined until it is removed altogether. Yet even with such a dark scenario, a close examination of the final image shows there may still be a crack in the facade and a small glimmer of nonconformity.

In assessing the portfolio, the Panel felt the author delivered a frighteningly successful glimpse into such a dystopian society. While the overview image was not entirely balanced as to the implied flow of motion within each image, it was exceptionally well crafted in the use of lighting, white and red to provide consistent anchor and balance points. The story flow from image to image also followed a defined path through this imaginary society. The author's use of a frame on the initial image in the overview that did not appear in the portfolio image was discussed. The Panel ultimately agreed that, while risky, it was an artistic element in the overview that was not in violation of the guidelines for the overview image.

The technical quality of each individual image was deemed excellent. The use of lighting and either white or red to control the eye was felt to be very effective. The care used in crafting each image and the attention paid to the many small details provided impact while also maintaining a high level of viewer interest when exploring all of that detail. The eerie similarity between the second image of the portfolio and the cover of the Beatles Abbey Road album was not lost on the Panel.

From conception, as outlined in the Statement of Intent, through execution and presentation, the Panel felt the author delivered a powerful, thematically consistent portfolio that deserved the BPSA distinction. The Secret of a Image

By Dr. Robert C. Wiseman Wait, don't throw away that image the judges just refused to accept. Judging is nothing more than a small group of people looking at an image and making quick evaluations about their opinions of the image. The same image submitted to still another group of judges could find a totally different evaluation of the image. Without question, that has happened to many who aspire to enter the world of art and have their work judged.

There are many different ways of looking at images whether in the form of a painting or in the form of a photograph. What is important is that the image captures the interest of the viewer. Most images become of interest through composition, tonal rendition, color, subject matter, location, size, artist recognition, and possibly a few other such factors. All viewers have special likes and dislikes for certain images, but collectively, all famous images have been judged by a large population of viewers whose agreements are similar.

An excellent article by John Andrew Hughes, APSA, in the November, 2014, PSA Journal revealed considerable information about judging. In the article, Hughes used Leonardo DaVinci's "Mona Lisa" as an example of a masterpiece and what possibly made it such an outstanding image. While it is certainly a great work of art; perhaps we should ask if we are being confused between it being a beautiful image or being influenced by the name of Leonardo DaVinci? What would have happened to this painting had it been presented without the name of DaVinci. As such, it would merely be another image to be judged like that of one anyone of us had produced. I have a painting that is very old. It is a painting of an unknown man, but it has no information about who made the painting. There is nothing special about the person who is the subject of the painting. It is a nice and interesting painting, but unlike "Mona Lisa," it has little value. However, what would happen to this painting if something were discovered that would reveal it had been painted by a person approaching that of DaVinci's fame? The point of this is that "Mona Lisa" is a beautiful work of art, but are we,

the art world, being confused between the image and the maker of the image?

Another article published in Shutterbug magazine was written about a photo show of a rather minor but somewhat well-known photographer, Minor White. In this article, the author published one image of White's entitled "Something Died Here, San Francisco." The picture consisted of the rear one-quarter view of a 1930s Buick car parked by a sidewalk against a wooden building facade. On the sidewalk appeared a non-descriptive design that was easily overlooked. This design was the object of his "Something Died Here." In most judging competitions, this image would have never been given a second look. The question, then, is what makes this image standout as an important image in photography?


There are many other images and collections of images that are considered as outstanding examples of the photographic art. Among the collections, are "The Bitter Years, 1935-41" edited by Edward Steichen. (Steichen) "The Bitter Years" was a development from the Farm Security Administration, which was commissioned to show rural America as seen by many different photographers during the great depression years of the 1930s. The result of this commission was an outstanding group of images created by photographic artists of the period. It is difficult to identify any one of the images as being the most outstanding; however, one that is often reproduced is that of the Migrant Mother by Dorothea Lange. This image shows desperation as well as pride along with grave feelings for the future of her children. Although Dorothea Lange has a number of images in the collection, she does not stand alone. Other outstanding photographers include Walker Evans, Arthur Rothstein, Ben Shahn, and many others of lessor recognition.

Still another collection of images entitled "The Family of Man" and again created by Edward Steichen contains more than 500 images



from many different countries (Steichen). This collection is not only a collection of current images of that time, but also many images from previous periods of time. One of the images from a previous time was that of the Migrant Mother by Dorothea Lange. This inclusion gives recognition to the image as an image having more than cursory interest. Is it possible that the Migrant Mother could become the Mona Lisa of this period of time? Other images from this collection need to be recognized. One image that stands out is the Peruvian Flute Player by W. Eugene Harris. This image is of a smiling young boy in a floppy hat blowing a wood flute. Still another image is The Walk to Paradise Garden by W. Eugene Smith. This is the image of a very young boy and girl holding hands as the walk from the darkness into the light. The boy and the flute show happiness while the two children walking into the light show the beginning of a new life. These images are two of the outstanding images among the 500 images. From among the images in these two exhibits, many images need recognition, but the ones that have been identified appear to be the ones that stand above most of the others. However, with that comment, others will disagree. Therein lies the judging of images.

Judging of images is not an exact science. It is fraught with opinions and perspectives. In the observation of different views of photography, three different preferences in groups who have different styles and thoughts in their approach to photography exist. In no particular order, these three groups are the professional photographers, the fine art photographers, and the hobby photographers. Although these are the three recognized/identified groups, there is considerable over-lapping within all three groups. The professional photographers are represented by the Professional Photographers of America (PPA). This group's primary concern is with selling or making a living through their work in photography, but, of course, many of their images can also be found in the other two groups. The fine art photographers, as generally found in the fine art schools, see their images as telling a story about some event or people in our way of life. The image discussed earlier by Minor White is a classic example of their work. Still other examples will be found in a book by Aaron Siskind who found interest in producing images of paint pealing from walls to paper falling from bill boards as well as many other similar examples. Even more of their style will be found in the quarterly publication Aperture. As a whole, the fine art photographers tend to lean somewhat toward the macabre in the images that tell their stories. Finally, the hobby group of photographers approach photography as a source of personal entertainment. Their enjoyment



is found in competing with other photographers. Their competitions are found in local camera clubs, area wide camera clubs, and international associations such as the Photographic Society of America (PSA). Their work is in the form of "eye candy," travel, nature, and experimental imagery. Their imagery may be either projected images or printed images. These three groups tend to be organized within their particular area but are not limited to the specific area in which they have been identified. In this discussion, it would be remiss to not recognize the totally unorganized photographers who have become a major group of photographers brought about by the digital world. This unorganized group of photographers go about their world using their digital cameras, iphones or ipads to take countless thousands of images of themselves, friends, or any other thing or event that



had grown taller and now hid much of the foreground of the river. Time had changed things in such a way that Adams' image will never be duplicated.

Why are images produced by Adams, DaVinci, Evans, Lange, Rothstein, Shahn, Siskind, Smith, Steichen, White and others considered outstanding? When looking at any of these or many others of similar status they appear little different from some of the images that each of us might have produced. Perhaps, the most outstanding element in their work is that their images have withstood the element of time; therefore, the element of time may well be the secret to a good image and possibly a great work of art.

The image that may have been discarded by the judges could have been one that could have withstood the element of time. Each of us has produced an image that did not meet our expectations and was put aside as having little interest, but at some later time, the image was rediscovered. Upon the rediscovery, the image appealed to our better senses and became one of our favorites. The fact is that the element of time was what changed our view of the image. Within that sense, it is possible that the great images that continue to be regarded as being great went through the same process that ended in their placement to the level of greatness. Who knows, will any of our images be able to withstand the element of time? The image the judges discarded may be such an image. Each of us need to reexamine our images and reconsider their value in future time. All periods of time contain something of value that represents that period of time. Ours will also be recognized; therefore, each of us should save images from our period of time. Not all will become great, but surely some will become recognized in future time.

happens to appeal to their sense of being. With very few exemptions, these images will never be seen other than within a sudden sense of fun or interest between friends.

What makes an outstanding image as those mentioned above? First, it should be recognized that a photo is a slice out of the continuum of time. It can never be reproduced again. It can only be copied. As an example, Ansel Adams' image *The Tetons and the Snake River* was photographed in 1942. On a recent trip to the Tetons, I stood where Adams had stood to take this picture. After taking a picture, I discovered that my image was quite different from the image Adams had produced. This was true from both the perspective as well as the elements. I found that the trees

Nominating Candidates for Society Recognition Awards

The Society Recognition Awards Committee (SRA) needs your assistance in finding qualified PSA members that deserve recognition for their many years of service to PSA. There are eight different categories eligible for SRA awards. There is one new award for 2018, the Sophia Cheung Volunteer of the Year Award. This award was presented to Henry Ng, FPSA, EPSA, in 2017 and he has generously donated the funds for five years for this award. (See qualifications below).

Peabody Award for General Photography is presented to a PSA member who has demonstrated outstanding photographic proficiency and skill in PSA's general divisions, the Projected Image Division (PID), and the Pictorial Print Division (PPD). Qualifications of a successful candidate will include participation in International Exhibitions and TOPS, and presentation of programs and workshops at the PSA Conference and other photography conferences. Consideration may also be given to the candidate's service to the Society's general photography divisions including: organizational leadership, furthering participation in exhibitions, and developing awareness through informational publicity.

Scales Award for Long Term Service to PSA is presented to a PSA member with a record of long and continuing service to the Society. This will include involvement in activities such as judging, lecturing, writing, or serving in a leadership capacity in a division, standing committee, or other levels of PSA.

Kissa Appreciation Award for Teaching is presented to a PSA member for work in the field of teaching photography, specifically in basic photo techniques such as composition and lighting. Methods of instruction may include: teaching classes, presenting demonstrations, seminars, leading workshops, writing articles, and mentoring.

Doscher Award for Traditional Photography is given to a PSA member who demonstrates excellence in photographing a variety of classical subjects such as still life, pictorial, nature,

travel, and portraiture with careful attention to photographic basics such as technical qualities and composition.

Ashbrook Memorial Award for Digital Imaging Instruction is presented to a PSA member who has contributed to sharing a knowledge of *digital* imaging techniques and software through various methods of teaching including: teaching classes, writing articles, presenting demonstrations, and mentoring.

Fallon Membership Award is given to a PSA member who is devoted to promoting and sustaining membership in the Society through recruitment of new members, or the creation and implementation of membership activities and programs.

Early Achievement Award is presented to a relatively new member of three to six years who has contributed significantly in several photographic areas such as: teaching, enlisting new PSA members, creating programs, or demonstrating photographic competency and leadership. A maximum of five Early Achievement Awards may be presented annually.

The Sophia Cheung Volunteer of the Year Award shall be granted annually to a PSA member who has performed outstanding service to PSA in a volunteer role. The emphasis of this award is service. Such service shall be superlative, dedicated, enthusiastic, and effective. Sophia Cheung was the ultimate PSA volunteer. Eligibility: Any PSA volunteer is eligible for this award, but it shall be up to the SRA committee to determine if a candidate's service is sufficient for the award.

Completed forms must be mailed or emailed to Headquarters and to the SRA Committee Chair by March 1, 2018. The SRA Committee looks forward to receiving your nomination package (proposal and two endorsements) for the PSA member you feel deserves Society recognition.

The Pictorial Print of the Year (PPY) competition is an annual invitational competition. All PSA member exhibitors who were awarded medals for prints exhibited in Pictorial Print Division-recognized print exhibitions in 2016 were invited to submit their award-winning prints in the Division's Print of the Year competition. Because we are a small division, the 3DD accepts images that have won any award and special recognition of Honorable Mention or above. If an image won in more than one format, the entrant was required to choose which format the image competed for that year. Entrants must be current PSA members



Lee Cates, FPSA California



Lee Cates, FPSA, of Fresno, California, passed away peacefully on October 26, 2017 at the age of 97. Lee's interest in photography began soon after her retirement.

To pursue her interest, she joined the Fresno Camera Club (FCC) and the Photographic Society of America (PSA) in 1984 and began exploring her love of art and nature through the lens of her camera. Her images were accepted in color slide and nature international exhibitions. One of her images was selected for publication in PSA's 75th Anniversary of the Photographic Society of America Book. The Society honored Lee with her APSA in 2002 and in 2009 she was elected FPSA. She received PSA's Service Award in 2007 and again in 2016. In 2012, Lee was awarded Club Rep of the Year for Large Clubs.

Lee served PSA as an Area Rep and then began serving as Co-Director of Region 11 in 2005, Director in 2007, and then as Assistant CSMD. The Fresno County Fair has a photography exhibit each year. Lee spent many hours at the exhibit and recruited new members for both her camera club and for PSA. The Fresno Fair recognized her volunteer work in the photo exhibit with a Service Plaque. She was Secretary of PSA's Gold Rush Chapter from 2001-2003. Over the years, she served Fresno Camera Club as Club President, Newsletter Editor, Membership Chair, Council Representative, and PSA Club Representative. She served as FCC's Youth Showcase Sponsor from 2004 until 2016. The club's award in 2017 was named the Lee Cates Youth Showcase Award in Lee's honor.

In her community, Lee organized six other FCC members to help photograph police events, including ceremonies honoring officers, Kids Day at Pelco (for the physically challenged), K-9 trials, and "ride alongs" with officers on patrol. Nine of her photographs were published in the department's annual report for 2007-2008.

Lee Cates, FPSA, will be greatly missed by her friends in PSA, FCC, and the photography teachers and Youth Showcase students with whom she shared her love of photography.

Jack was Curator of the Eric Worrell Reptile Park in Australia for 21 years where he took care of all the animals, milked venomous snakes to make antivenom, and he put on the Saturday alligator show. He was the original "Crocodile Dundee"!

Jack joined PSA in 1996 and just attended the PSA International Conference in Pittsburgh. He produced two programs on Australia that were presented at the PSA International Conferences. *The Land Down Under* was shown in Houston in 2003.

Jack was an excellent Nature photographer. He belonged to the Madera Camera Club, the San Joaquin Valley Camera Club Council, the Gold Rush Chapter of PSA, and the Photographic Society of America. Jack wrote three books—Crocodile Man, Shark Attack, and Your Aquarium. His photo of a Platypus is still on the 20 cent Australian coin, and photographs of his Kangaroos were on Australian stamps. He had many firsts. He was the first person to hatch and raise American alligators, and he also hatched deadly blue-ringed octopuses. He was the first person to photograph a Platypus under water with its eyes open.

Jack had a wonderful sense of humor

and many great stories. He loved his American friends. As he would say, "I love America, but I hate their politics!!" Jack will be long remembered by all who knew and loved him. Services will be held in Australia at the Anglican Church later this month.

A Reminder

The Photo Travel Division is one of PSA's reality-based divisions, the others being Nature and Photojournalism. Unlike those who prefer fantasy, these photographers seek to portray the world as close to reality as possible. This is why there is an official definition to provide guidelines for the photographer and for competition judges as to what is permitted and what is not appropriate in a Photo Travel image.

This definition is as follows:

A Photo Travel image expresses the characteristic features or culture of a land as they are found naturally. There are no geographic limitations. Images from events or activities arranged specifically for photography, or of subjects directed or hired for

photography are not appropriate. Close up pictures of people or objects must include features that provide information about the environment. Techniques that add, relocate, replace or remove any element of the original image, except by cropping, are not permitted. The only allowable adjustments are removal of dust or digital noise, restoration of the appearance of the original scene, and complete conversion to greyscale monochrome. Other derivations, including infrared, are not permitted. All allowed adjustments must appear natural.

Don't mislead the viewers! A photographer who strives to capture what he really experienced in his travels can represent the place honestly for those who were unable to share his adventure. However if he cannot resist the impulse to change what he found there, PID (projected image), PPD (pictorial prints) and 3DD (stereo) will welcome his fantasized version and reward his imagination.


International Club Print Competition, Round 1
