

- Creative (0-1 image)

New members are encouraged to enter photographs.

Digital image files should be no larger than 2048 pixels in the greater dimension and should be submitted as a .JPG file emailed to **stvrainphoto@gmail.com** no later than Friday prior to the meeting **or submit through your own Visual Pursuits account by Sunday at 5 pm**. Late entries will be considered on a case by case basis, but please try to get your submissions in on time. You should receive confirmation that your photos were received through **stvrainphoto@gmail.com** by Saturday evening. If not, please call Lynda Clayton at (720) 468-3085 to confirm that they came through.

No digital entries will be accepted at the club meeting.

Please submit photos each month only after receipt of the newsletter in case there are changes to the category definitions or where to send photos if there is a substitute media person.

Photography Tips and Tricks

Snow – *December* Special Topic

Freshly fallen snow is a beautiful thing and it begs a photographer's creative eye to capture its beauty. However, photographing snow is not as easy as you might think. Here are some things to consider: **Protect yourself and your gear!** Wear appropriate layers, waterproof boots, fingerless mittens or gloves, disposable hand warmers. Keep spare batteries tucked under layers to keep warm, spare lens cloths for fogged lenses, an airtight bag to protect camera from condensation. Put lens cap on when not in use. Use rain cover/plastic bag for your camera if it's snowing or very wet. A zoom lens will give a range of focal lengths without exposing your camera to possible condensation. A UV or clear filter protects the front element of your lens from moisture. A polarizing filter may darken a bright sky or help increase saturation. A lens hood will help avoid lens flare from reflective, freshly fallen snow. When you bring your camera back inside after shooting, bag it to prevent condensation from forming on lens and electronics.

Taking the shot! Shoot in RAW format in Manual or Aperture Priority mode. If you are shooting in Aperture or Shutter speed mode, use exposure compensation button (-/+) to intentionally <u>overexpose</u> by one or two stops. You can also bracket your shots by shooting several frames of a scene adjusting the exposure of each shot using the exposure compensation button. Increase the exposure by one stop before pressing the shutter and repeat until you have 2-3 images that are overexposed. Auto bracketing – select how many shots you want to take and the number of stops you want to add per shot. Press the shutter button 3 or 4 times to get several images with different exposures. If you want snowfall to look more distinct, then use a fast shutter speed (~1/400th or more). To create a blizzard look, use a slower shutter speed (~1/15th sec or less). Snow and snowfall can sometimes confuse autofocus. Switch to manual focus to keep your subject sharp. Sunrise and sunset will give your image some warmth and contrast to the snow. Shoot your winter portraits when it is overcast or the sun is low in the sky. Bring life to your image with contrast and bright colors (e.g. red barn, or colored scarf). Get out and enjoy the winter landscapes! Make white balance and other adjustments at home.

HDR – December Challenge Topic

- 1. Take more exposure brackets than needed. You want to ensure you have captured the entire exposure range and then some (check your histogram).
- 2. Use Mirror Lock-up. This will help reduce camera shake and ensure sharp images.
- 3. Shoot in Aperture Priority mode This keeps your aperture fixed for all images and prevents any change in depth of field.
- 4. Use a tripod or solid surface and cable release if available Prevents camera shake when you press the release on your camera and ensures that your images can be easily aligned by the software.
- 5. Be patient and come to the November SVPS meeting to learn more about HDR from Greg Holden.

The Challenge topic for December is HDR and Greg will answer more HDR questions at that meeting.
