

MONTHLY PHOTO SHOWCASE SUBMISSION RULES

No more than a total of five (5) digital images may be entered in the following categories:

- Special Topic of the Month (0-2 images)
- Challenge Topic (0-2 images)
- Open category (0-2 images)
- Critique category (0-1 image) (New category-feedback from members)
 (Visual Pursuits will allow for up to eight (8) images just because you can
 doesn't mean you are following Monthly showcase submission rules.)

 Please enter up to five (5) images only!

<u>Category Code</u>: <u>Images must be placed in the proper Visual Pursuits</u> <u>category</u>. Default is SPEC for Special, and an alert will be triggered if too many images are entered. CRIT is for the <u>new</u> Critique category. Please double check the category for each image entered before leaving Visual Pursuits to ensure proper placement.

All members are encouraged to enter photographs. SVPS members will provide constructive critique to photos in the critique category.

Submit photos to Visual Pursuits by the Sunday prior to the meeting at 7 p.m.

NO late entries.

NO digital entries will be accepted at the club meeting.

While changes don't happen often, submit photos each month *after* receipt of the newsletter in case there are updates to the category topics and related definitions.

<u>File Type:</u> Submit .JPG files only

<u>Maximum digital image file size</u> is 7680 pixels wide x 4320 vertically to allow for the best possible resolution.

<u>Photo Title</u>: The name of the image is all that is required (blank spaces are allowed)

General example: Image Title.jpg **Specific example:** Bridal Veil Falls.jpg

Tips on Bird Photography by Vicki Braunagel

Birds can be tricky creatures; they are often small, move quickly and ALWAYS seem to fly as soon as you get them in focus but BEFORE you start shooting! These tips may help, but nothing beats practice and taking lots and lots of photos.

Camera settings:

- 1. Use continuous focus (AF-C for Nikon, AI Servo for Canon) with as fast a shutter speed as you need to freeze motion. For slow moving birds, like cranes or herons, 1/500 sec may work, but for fast moving hummingbirds you may need 1/2000 sec. I generally use spot metering, particularly if shooting into the sky.
- 2. **Use a wide open aperture.** You may lose some depth of field, but you only really need the bird's eye and head to be sharp and the benefits of increased light and lower ISO are worth the trade-off. If you are photographing in bright light you may be able to increase the f-stop and allow more of the bird to be in focus.
- 3. **Use continuous shooting to nail any action shots.** Continuous shooting allows you to fire off a burst of photos, but be mindful of your camera's buffer. A camera's buffer can fill up quickly so it's good to have an idea of the camera's frame per second capability.
- 4. **ISO Setting**. In low-light conditions or shooting into dark areas, try auto-ISO while keeping the shutter speed high. You can set a maximum ISO in your camera settings, but newer cameras can handle a fairly high ISO with much less noise. I generally set my camera to shoot in manual, with an aperture of f5.6 (or wider depending on how fast my lens is), a minimum shutter speed of 1000 and see what ISO that produces. I will use auto ISO if the light conditions are varying.

Birds in flight:

- 1. **Position yourself** with both light AND wind to your back, if possible. Birds prefer to land and take-off into the wind.
- 2. **Minimize the number of auto focus area points** to the lowest number of focal points on your dynamic-area of settings (it actually helps keep the focus on the bird(s) as they fly).
- 3. Try **to grab focus on the bird** as it flies but track it and "bump" the focus from time to time as it gets closer, shooting it as it begins to fill the frame. But don't hesitate to shoot when you have the best opportunity and crop, crop, crop.
- 4. You can **pan with the bird if it's flying** across your view, but waiting too long to press the shutter, it's easy to end up with only the back half of the bird in the shot!

Have fun and remember for 100 shots if you have 10 keepers and a couple of ones you really like, that's success! ~Vicki
