No more than a total of **four** digital images may be entered in the following categories:

- Special Topic of the Month (0-1 image)
- Challenge Topic (0-1 image)
- Open category (0-2 images)
- Creative (0-1 image)

New members are encouraged to enter photographs.

Digital image files should be no larger than 2048 pixels in the greater dimension and should be submitted as a .JPG file emailed to <u>stvrainphoto@gmail.com</u> no later than Friday prior to the meeting. Late entries will be considered on a case by case basis, but please try to get your submissions in on time. You should receive confirmation that your photos were received by Saturday evening. If not, please call Lynda Clayton at (720) 468-3085 to confirm that they came through.

No digital entries will be accepted at the club meeting.

Please submit photos each month only after receipt of the newsletter in case there are changes to the category definitions or where to send photos if there is a substitute media person.

<u>File Type:</u> Please submit .JPG files only <u>Naming Convention</u>:

- Photo title (blank spaces are allowed)
- Photographer's name (blank spaces are allowed)
- Category CODE: (SPEC for Special, CHAL for Challenge, OPEN for Open, and CREA for Creative)

General example: [Title]-[Photographer]-[Category].jpg **Specific example:** Bridal Veil Falls-Ansel Adams-OPEN.jpg

Photography Tips and Tricks

Historic – October Special Topic

When photographing something historic, consider the fact that the building or object has existed for a long time and likely photographed many times in the past. Here are a few tips to get your best shot:

- 1. Do Your Research why is this building or object considered historic? If you learn about its history, you will better understand the key elements that you may want to highlight in your photos. Consider the best time of day for this subject and which direction you need the light to be coming from.
- 2. Select Your Viewpoint Most people settle for the traditional eye level shot. Consider experimenting with different perspectives to give you a more unique photo. Experiment and look around for places to shoot from that others may not have thought about. Take multiple shots from different angles.
- 3. Think About Conditions Perhaps the golden hour of a sunny day is not the best way to get good results. The direction of light may not be right or the light produces harsh shadows. Consider photographing in cloudy conditions or with some early morning mist. Think about how you want it to look and plan accordingly.
- 4. Zoom In Often the details of an historic building or object are missed in trying to capture the full picture. Take a step closer and keep your eyes open for interesting details that will give a unique view of the historic site. Be patient. Take lots of photos until you get your best shot.

The Color Red – October Challenge Topic

Introducing color into photography creates a new element of composition. It has long been thought that various colors of the spectrum influence us subconsciously.

- Red passion, desire, love, danger, determination, strength, power, energy
- Yellow joy, happiness, intellect, growth
- Green harmony, fertility, safety
- Blue trust, loyalty, wisdom, confidence, intelligence, faith, truth
- Purple wealth, wisdom, dignity, independence, creativity, mystery
- White goodness, innocence, purity, cleanliness
- Black power, elegance, formality, death, evil, mystery

How can you use the color RED?

- 1. The color RED may act as an invisible leading line. It may attract the viewer's eye to a particular subject or it can lead the viewer into and around the photograph.
- 2. Red enhances color contrast. The eye will go to the largest red object first.
- 3. It creates a focal point, an anchor. Something red, that isn't the subject, can anchor and support the subject.
- 4. Red can create a point of interest when there isn't one. Red often becomes that special element that provides a focal point and gives interest to an image.
