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Williamson-Sodus Airport (KSDC) 2023 Airport Sustainability Improvements

There are 4 general areas of improvement that Williamson Flying Club requests be allowed under the grant for this requested scope change. Improvements are:

Obstruction Removal
Building Improvements
Electric Vehicle Charger
Limited Payement Rehabilitation

Obstruction Removal

The approach to Runway 28 contains tree obstructions impacting operations at the airport. While the Flying Club has been trying to work out a mitigation plan with FAA, the situation warrants action immediately. FAA's position has been all obstructions need to be mitigated under a grant, going as far as saying partial obstruction mitigation is not acceptable for a grant scope. A total of 18 land owners are affected by this condition. It may take several more years to reach agreements with 18 land owners. In the interim, the Flying Club has an avigation easement for the approach of Runway 28. The area is a subset of what the Club is trying to achieve with FAA. Even though the area is predominantly within an avigation easement, discussions with 2 affected land owners need to be made. With funding available to undertake removals, the Flying Club will expedite accomplishing a clearing project that will address the most intrusive obstructions. The tree obstructions have resulted in the LPV approach to Runway 28 being unavailable. And recently, FAA has suspended night instrument approaches altogether. Beyond the instrument operation impact, these in-close obstructions need to be removed for improved safety.

Building Improvements

The southerly T-hangar is an open bay hangar with asphalt pads for aircraft parking positions. The asphalt is over 25 years old and severely rutted from parked aircraft. A new NYSDOT grant has been awarded and accepted by Williamson Flying Club to add manual doors to the hangar. Replacing the asphalt pad with a concrete pad, in combination with the door project would be a significant upgrade to the hangar. So much so, that the improved hangar would increase the revenue generation for improved sustainability of the airport. A secondary task of installing LED lighting would further improve the attraction of this building. The three elements combined, doors (under separate grant), a concrete parking position, and adequate lighting would transform this hangar to be competitive with the fully enclosed t-hangars on the rest of the field. And boost much needed revenue to sustain airport operations.

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Electric Vehicle Charger

Installing an electric vehicle charger represents an opportunity for the Flying Club to offer a revenue providing service. EV charging services would be available to airport patrons and the public to charge their vehicle while at the airport. The Williamson-Sodus Airport is located on NYS Route 104. Some folks travelling on 104 may need a charge to make it to the next station. This transient opportunity will be exploited. It makes sense to invest in this technology now as vehicle manufacturers trend to producing electric vehicles. The intent would be to charge a nominal fee for charging through a credit card transaction. The nominal charge envisioned will not amount to a sizeable revenue source but it is a first step towards a service with potential growth.

Limited Pavement Rehabilitation

FAA has severely restricted improvement grants for Williamson-Sodus Airport due to being an "unclassified" airport. Areas of poor condition pavement are starting to appear. The most pressing need for pavement rehabilitation is the airside area east and north of the avgas fuel system. The airside ramp pavement, originally installed in 2007 is heaving from seasonal temperature swings and is also starting to fracture. This particular area has a higher volume of traffic than other portions of the ramp pavement due to it's proximity to the fuel system and the intersection of taxilanes. The airport access road off NYS Route 104 is also in need. Both areas should be partially milled and overlaid with new asphalt. The access roadway lighting would be converted to LED lighting. The lighting upgrade would be a retrofit of the existing fixtures. An asphalt overlay would shore up this critical area for the next 10 years.



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
