

Check In/Check Out Instructions

NOTE: Khushatta Hills Ranch Camp is eco-friendly. We encourage if you bring it in, take it out with you.

Where to take the trash?

• Each tent has a small trash can in it. Bring your trash to the big trash can at the pavilion.

When you arrive, locate your tent and park there.

Tent Locations:

- Alzade tent is the last one on the left when you enter the security gate.
- Mom Mollie's tent is in the middle, on the left side of the property.
- Aunt B's tent is the one on the right side of the property

Community areas:

- · Pavilion with electricity and water
- 2 restrooms
- 2 showers

What is in your tent?

 Alzade and Mom Mollie's tents: have normal electricity, plug the lights in at the floor on the left.. They have two beds, mini refrigerators, cooking and eating utensils, coffee pot, coffee cups, coffee and creamer, iron skillet, tripods to hang over wood fire for cooking, extra blankets, portable heaters, solar hanging lights, tiki lamp, and two fans.

Aunt B's tent:

 A queen-sized bed, battery-operated lights, two portable power packs, outdoor cooking station with charcoal/wood grill, fire pit area, hanging solar lights, table, cooking utensils, iron skillet, kitchen towels, tiki torch, and two fans.

I recommend bringing with you to Aunt B's tent:

- · extra blankets.
- · portable heater for cooler months.
- generator



The Old Jail Museum is a key tourist attraction for San Jacinto County located at 200 Slade Street, Coldspring, Texas 77331 Hiking - Hiking is a popular way to enjoy the forest and its beauty. The 128-mile Lone Star Hiking Trail, a portion of which has gained National Recreation Trail status, winds through the Sam Houston National Forest.

Double Lake Recreation Area is located on the east side of the Sam Houston near Coldspring, Texas, surrounding a 24-acre lake and includes whispering pines and hardwoods one mile south on FM-2025.

The entire Sam Houston National Forest is designated as a wildlife management area through a cooperative agreement between the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the U.S. Forest Service. This special designation provides benefits to those who use the Sam Houston National Forest, including hunters, and to the wildlife that live or forage there. Extra fees paid by hunters who use wildlife management areas are collected by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and are returned to the Forest Service for use in those areas.
