~A Word from the Minister~

"Can We Go Against the Flow?"

I recently read an interesting article by the Rev. Joyce Borger, editor of the *Reformed Worship* magazine (Pentecost 2025 issue). It was somewhat alarming. Here is what she said:

If you pay any attention to denominational reports, you will find the same statistics – churches and denominations are getting smaller. According to a national survey, FACT 2020, the average weekly attendance in the United States has dropped over 50% since 2000 and half of all congregations in the U.S. have 65 of fewer people in worship on any given Sunday. In the United Kingdom, attendance went from 11.8% of the population in 1980 to 5.0% in 2015 according to research by the Brierley Consultance. A 2001 survey in Canada found that only 20% of the population were attending worship weekly. No longer can churches depend on birthrate and generational commitment to a particular denomination.

Here are my observations. I would concur with what Rev. Borger said. I think it's true. I believe the COVID 19 pandemic accelerated the trend that was already starting to happen years before 2019. Many older folks stopped attending their mostly mainline churches because of the pandemic (while younger folks ignored the warnings about the pandemic), and a number of the older folks never started attending again when the pandemic was over! You would think when COVID was mostly over there would be a flood back to the mainline churches, but no, there was not. Because there is no brand loyalty, the younger folks, (and some older folks) left to attend "nondenominational worship centers" that ignored the pandemic and welcomed those whose churches were closed. By the way, they are not really nondenominational. If you look closely at what they do and say they are close to what many other churches are saying and doing anyway. But it's stylist these days to call yourself "nondenominational!" This continuing trend in the past 25 years did not happen to all mainline churches. The church I pastored in Wayne grew from an average attendance of 140 in 1999 when I started, to 208 by 2007 when I left. It was a slow, steady increase. What happened? No magic. We offered helpful options for families during Sunday School and worship time. We would have the children's sermon early in the service, then the children

would be dismissed to Sunday School. This schedule does present some problems, but the convenience of having worship and Sunday School at the same time, worked for these parents. The grandparents then attend where the children and grandchildren attend. The transition took some time, energy, and work by people to make it all happen. The churches I see growing right now are churches with established programs. They already have momentum in that direction. One need only step in and get your family involved.

Rev. Borger is correct. Overall, attendance in churches is down, with less than 65 on a Sunday in half the churches. Where did the people go? No. They aren't all attending a large "praise" church. But the tendency is for more and more people to attend fewer and fewer churches where there are established programs. Yet, overall, fewer people attend worship. I believe the trend needs reversed if Christianity is to attract a larger demographic.

What is the solution for the church, overall, and for Wickliffe, specifically? It's easy to feel hopeless. But with God all things are possible. One thing we can quickly do is eliminate one word from our language. "No." "No" never did anything, nor make anything happen. Leave open possibilities with a "Yes!" "No" has gotten more churches in trouble than any other word or attitude of which I can think. "No" to this, "no" to that, and soon enough nothing happens. We need to remain faithful in what we do and say and plan. Many worry about the shame of failure. If we are worried something won't work, it doesn't matter. Our success is not up to us, it is up to God. We are just called to try and do the best we can. That's all. Later, we'll talk more on what we can do!

The **Fourth of July**—also known as **Independence Day or July 4th**—has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the <u>American Revolution</u>. On July 2nd, 1776, the <u>Continental Congress</u> voted in favor of independence, and two days later delegates from the <u>13 colonies</u> adopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by <u>Thomas Jefferson</u>. From 1776 to the present day, July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with festivities ranging from <u>fireworks</u>, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues. The Fourth of July 2025 is on Friday, July 4.

Did you know New York City has the biggest fireworks display in the United States and that three U.S. presidents died on July 4?

When the initial battles in the <u>Revolutionary War</u> broke out in April 1775, few colonists desired complete independence from Great Britain, and those who did were considered radical.

By the middle of the following year, however, many more colonists had come to favor independence, thanks to growing hostility against Britain and the spread of revolutionary sentiments such as those expressed in the bestselling pamphlet "Common Sense," published by Thomas Paine in early 1776.

On June 7, when the <u>Continental Congress</u> met at the <u>Pennsylvania</u> State House (later Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the <u>Virginia</u> delegate Richard Henry Lee introduced a motion calling for the colonies' independence. Amid heated debate, Congress postponed the vote on Lee's resolution, but appointed a five-man committee—including <u>Thomas Jefferson</u> of Virginia, <u>John Adams</u> of <u>Massachusetts</u>, Roger Sherman of <u>Connecticut</u>, <u>Benjamin Franklin</u> of Pennsylvania and Robert R. Livingston of <u>New York</u>—to draft a <u>formal statement justifying</u> the break with Great Britain.

Did you know?

John Adams believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American independence, and would reportedly turn down invitations to appear at July 4th events in protest. Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died on July 4, 1826—the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence.
