- The reasons for the increase in net profit from the May 2025 show were:
 1. All tables were sold and nearly all of the tables were occupied. We had two tables unoccupied due to the death of one of the dealers. Another dealer occupying three tables left early on Saturday due to a family emergency. Refunds were issued in each of these cases.
 2. From a review of the attendee records, it was determined that only 2.07% of attendees who missed three or more shows in a row preceding the May '25 show actually came back to attend the May '25 show. Therefore, postcards were only mailed to individuals on the list who had attended at least one of the previous three shows (May 25, Dec 24 , May 24). This resulted in savings of:
 - \$823.20 postcard stamps
 - est. 242.00 production of postcards
 - est. 14.00 printing of mailing labels
 - \$ 1,079.20 Total
 3. Additional revenue was collected on dealer table rentals by charging a \$50 fee if the dealer used a corner table as part of his / her setup. \$950 (19 x \$50) was added to dealer table rental income

- The reasons for the decrease in net profit from the December 2025 show were:
 1. The cost of renting the gymnasium at the Gallatin Civic Center rose \$849. (\$2,192 to \$3,041). The original bill was \$3,441, and I asked for a reconsideration. The reason given for the increase was "they were using a different way of inputting the data to determine the total charges".
 2. We had one unpaid no-show (\$65) and another unsold table (\$130).
 3. A last minute cancellation by dealer, Jim Everett, resulted in the deferral of \$410 in revenue to the Dec '26 show.
 4. One dealer (G. Walker) requested and was given a second table but he left the show without paying for it. He owes the Gallatin Coin Show \$140.
- For the upcoming December 2026 show, we have already collected \$5,355.00 in table rentals from 29 dealers.
- There was another no-show at the May 2026 show (Vass). He did pay for his table but the reason he did not setup for the show is not known. There will be no deferral of revenue to the next show.

- Other issues that emerged during this show included:
 1. Dealers in two of the rows complained about there being no gaps in the spacing of the tables to move through before and during the show. Jim Viken suggested moving the end tables further out into the aisleways while Terry Hess suggested removing one table from each of rows #2, #3, #4, & #5.
 2. I was told by the Civic Center's front desk that their PA system was down for the entire show. The winning numbers in the hourly drawings had to be announced by shouting them out from the middle of the gymnasium. Kevin Skeith reported that the front desk was using the PA Thursday evening and it was working well then!
 3. The gymnasium's air conditioning was working overtime. On Friday, numerous complaints were received from both dealers and attendees (the high on that Friday was 70). The employees at the front desk said they have no control over the temperature in the building and could do nothing for us. Saturday's high was in the low 80's and it was warmer in the gymnasium.
 4. Although the Board of Directors decided we should check picture ID's at the registration table before allowing attendees into the gymnasium, we had too few people at the registration desk to handle taking this extra step.

- Weightman invited any living signers of the Declaration, including John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, to attend.
- Both gentlemen replied that their health was too poor for them to travel, and in an odd confluence of events, they passed away within hours of each other that July 4.
- The celebration on July 4 continued with a dinner and party.
- A memorial service to both Adams and Jefferson was then observed in Washington on July 8, 1826.

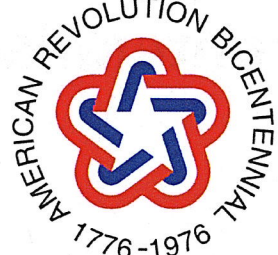
