The Oratorical Festival provides a valuable educational opportunity for youth to express their faith, gain important skills in public speaking, and to deepen their knowledge about theology and its application to the world today.

The 2026 finalists are eligible to receive a Chrysostom Scholarship to Hellenic College. This scholarship provides awards ranging from \$2,500 up to \$30,000 per year.

All eligible students are encouraged to participate in our Parish's annual Oratorical and Fine Arts Festival.

Winners in the Junior and Senior categories will advance to the Metropolis Festival, which is held on **Bright Saturday**, **April 18**, **2026** Host Parish: **St. Mary's Greek Orthodox Church**, **3450 Irving Avenue South**, **Minneapolis**, **Minnesota**, **55408**.

This enriching event will take place after the Divine Liturgy on **March 6th**, **immediately following the Salutations to the Theotokos.**



The Oratorical Festival is a tradition within our parish, designed to offer our young people a platform to express their faith and explore their creative talents in a supportive and nurturing environment.

Categories include: Speech, Poetry, Iconography, Vocal Chant, and Vocal Solo for students in grades 7-12.

Students in grades 3-6 are highly encouraged to participate. Projects should be rooted in Orthodox teachings.

All projects are due by Sunday, March 1, 2026 to ensure that we have enough time to prepare them for display during the Oratorical and Fine Arts Festival. *Examples of projects: posters, dioramas, icons, drawings, prayer journal, storybook, shadow box.*
