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FATHER'S LETTER

MAKE AN APPOINTMENT WITH GOD

"Now in the morning, having risen a long while before daylight, He went out and departed to a solitary place; and there He prayed." Mark 1:35

Brothers and sisters, our time is so valuable to us. Time is the priceless gift that God gives us because we will never get it back. Today our children are programmed with school, sports, dance, music and so many other activities. Parents have busy work schedules. We are gripped by the use of our cell phones, internet and television. How do we make time to connect with God? And if we do make time with God, how many times do we rush through it as a "chore" or something we can check off our daily list with little to no feeling?

Saint Theophan the Recluse tells us the following:

"Why does haste in prayer occur? It is incomprehensible. We spend hours involved in other things, and they seem like minutes; but just begin to pray, and it seems we have stood for a long time. And then we feel we must hurry to finish as soon as possible. No benefit is reaped in praying in this way. What should one do?"

I rise before the dawning of the morning, and cry for help; I hope in Your word.Psalm 119: 147 147

In my life, I have found that getting up a little bit earlier in the morning is the best solution. Of course, this means going to bed earlier. But it is important that we create and schedule a time in the day to pray. The morning is usually the quietist time, and for this reason, it is best for prayer. The way we start our day often influences our outlook on the things and temptations that come our way in those 24 hours.

One of the problems is that we are constantly on the go. But we want to help others in our household start their day peacefully as well. If we make the effort to set the alarm clock thirty minutes earlier, we can relieve ourselves of the pressured time. Hurried people create hurried environments. If we don't start the day in calmness, then it is difficult to create a peaceful environment around us.

In order to make more time, we need to think about something we will have to eliminate from our day as well. Therefore, examine activities that take up your time. How much time do we spend surfing the internet, watching t.v., or using social media? Recent research shows that a person spends over 130 hours in front of a screen every month. That is not farfetched. If we are on our phones for at least an hour per day, in front of a television for one hour, and on the in-

ternet or on our computer for an hour, that brings us to about 90 hours per month. If we are honest with ourselves, for many of us this number is much higher. This is a prime area to reallocate our use of time. Many of us say, "I don't have time for friends" or "I don't have time to call them" or "I don't have time for church." If we are more attentive to our daily routines, I am certain that most of us could make time to be with friends, to help others and make time for daily prayer, worship and daily serenity.

Perhaps we bring work home with us or check our e-mail throughout the day. Try your best to set a daily time to check this so we can be interrupted by these things sparingly. In today's climate, **our children**, **spouses**, **family and friends need our full attention**. We certainly do not like it when people ignore us, yet we continue to treat God and our family in this manner when we don't make time for them by being consumed with other things. **We need to make time for what matters most.**

Once we have made time, like the exercise, meals and family time we try to schedule, make a commitment to keep a time for prayer. Like any appointment, make a specific time and place to meet Him. Protect it as sacred space and as a non-negotiable. Whether it's the Jesus prayer, or a prayer book (there are some new prayer books in the bookstore), or reading of the scriptures, these things will water our soul and transform who we are and the way we look at our day. Just like when we cut corners to complete a construction project and something always goes wrong, let us not cut corners because of the pressures and stresses of our daily lives. God, in that great day of His second coming, will not be sympathetic to those who do not choose to put Him first.

As the new Church Year begins, and as we do for every New Year, let us make our resolutions to connect with Him on a regular basis. Make that appointment and do your best to not arrive late or cancel it. And even in the case of an emergency, ground yourself in prayer and worship. Unite yourself to the Knower of our hearts so that every day may be experienced as an opportunity to be sanctified.

As we are making our final preparations for classes, scheduling teachers and curricu-



SAINT OF THE MONTH

Saint Kassiani the Hymnographer–September 7th

Oftentimes, the voices of women go unnoticed or unheard. In a positive sense, their voices join together in a communal unison which vocalizes Holy Wisdom in a soft undercurrent, flowing within and without humble families. Not bombastically obvious, but subtly effective. In a negative sense, chauvinism suffocates what murmurs women have left, leaving vessels of wisdom mute and neglected. Then there are those who fit into neither of those categories — the Theotokos, Ruth, St. Helen, Deborah, etc; their voices neither subtle or restrained. They become examples of those who wish to join them and encouragement to those who wish to remain faith-

fully silent. Among these women is Kassiani, known for her hymnographic "voice" within the Orthodox Church.

Born at the beginning of the 9th century, Kassiani grew up in an affluent family of Constantinople and, as a young woman, attended the royal court of Emperor Theophilos. Her sharp intellect and elegant beauty mesmerized the young bachelor, thus placing her as one of the two final contestants in his bridal contest. Between her and Theodora — both equally "fit for the job" — Theophilos decided he would wed the girl who did not exceed his intellect. According to tradition, a golden apple would be presented to the future

empress. Theophilos stood in front of the girls and then walked over to Kassiani. Holding out the fruit, he said, "from woman came the worst in the world," alluding to Eve and her sin. Kassiani did not waste a moment and calmly responded that "from woman also came the best," alluding to the Theotokos. The irony of this situation is that Theophilos offered her a golden fruit of wealth, fame, and power, while referring to Eve, who also offered a golden fruit of knowledge to Adam. He snubs the first Eve - the one who brought death into the world. While not denying this truth, Kassiani reminds him that he must also rejoice in the second Eve the one who bore Life itself into the world. Needless to say, Theodora received the golden apple and it she who is remembered as empress. However, that was not the end of Kassiani's story.

Perhaps her voice would not be used to command, to advise and to encourage a nation, but her voice would be used in an equally important way — to declare the wisdom of the Church through poetry and hymnography. She became a nun and founded a monastery in western Constantinople. Although some say that this was a reaction to Theophilos' rejection, Theodore the Studite confirms that her motivations were of a much purer nature. She only wished to devote her time, talent, and energy toward asceticism and studying the music of the Church. At a time when men dominated the field of liturgical music, Kassiani was certainly an anomaly. Yet, her hymnographic work caught the eyes — or rather, ears — of the Church Fathers due to its blossoming beauty and depth, produced from the roots monastic humility and diligence. Out of an estimated 23 surviving

hymns, the well-known "Hymn of Kassiani," **Kaccia** which is sung on Holy Tuesday evening, became a hallmark of Eastern Orthodox hymnography.

The importance of the hymn lies not in its popularity or in its author, but in its subject. For in it, Kassiani gives a "voice" to the repentant woman weeping at Christ's feet (see Matthew 26:6-16). Not only this, but she gives a "voice" or more precisely, a prayer, to all who also wish to come in repentance to the Lord. It is not a voice of individualism, feminism, or of carnal pride and power, but a voice and prayer which calls people together in communal repentance. And, this is the most meaningful voice anyone, especially any

woman, can have — one that unites others in a common and holy purpose.

Hymn of the Fallen Woman, Mode Pl. 4: The woman who had fallen into many sins recognizes Thy Godhead, O Lord. She takes upon herself the duty of a myrrhbearer and makes ready the myrrh of mourning, before Thy entombment. Woe to me! saith she, for my night is an ecstasy of excess, gloomy and moonless, and full of sinful desire. Receive the sources of my tears, O Thou Who dost gather into clouds the water of the sea; in Thine ineffable condescension, deign to bend down Thyself to me and to the lamentations of my heart, O Thou Who didst spread out the Heavens. I will fervently embrace Thy sacred feet, and wipe them again with the tresses of the hair of my head, Thy feet at whose sound Eve hid herself for fear when she heard Thee walking in Paradise in the cool of the day. O my Savior and soul Saver who can trace out the multitude of my sins, and the abysses of Thy judgement? Do not disregard me Thy servant, O Thou Whose mercy is boundless.

Philoptochos

Dear Parishioners and Friends of Philoptochos,

As fall begins, I am happy to welcome everyone to share the excitement for our new Ecclesiastical year. Once again, St. Spyridon Philoptochos will work diligently to promote the values of our Orthodox faith, traditions and the goals of Philoptochos. Our commitment to philanthropy and helping those in need will again be our priority. In New York this summer, at the Clergy/Laity Meeting, we were reminded that philanthropy goes hand in hand with philotimo. "Philotimo is not easily defined but includes Honor, Integrity, Character, Dignity and Courage. Philotimo is helping and respecting others, not because we expect anything in return, but because it is the right thing to do." For me, it means "doing good and what is right", standing up for the marginalized and incorporating kindness, humility and love in our actions. As we begin this year, I once again ask you to volunteer your time, talents and energy towards our goal of philanthropy. Together in faith and fellowship we can continue to make a difference and incorporate philotimo in our everyday lives and serve as an example to our children.

In August, Philoptochos participated in Operation Classroom, a Philoptochos National Initiative to assist with the educational needs of students. A special thank you to Stella Parhas, Demetria Papadopoulos and Stephanie Collopy who coordinated the School Supply Drive for Operation Classroom. With donations from our community we were able to fully stock 50 backpacks and purchase 16 Texas instruments calculators. As we did last year, we delivered 16 backpacks and 2 TI Calculators to the Kingdom of God church, currently housed in the original St. Spyridon Church in Roseland (this need was based only on new students). The remaining 34 fully stocked back packs and 14 calculators were donated and delivered to "Together we Cope", an organization that is dedicated to helping Families in Crisis in the southern suburbs. Together we Cope delivered over 800 backpacks to families and still has a waiting list for children needing school supplies. As we learned last year one of the most critical school supplies for high school students is the TI calculator (\$100 each). Educators have told us these are imperative for a student to succeed in math and science and are typically not available to poor students. Thank you to all our parishioners for supporting this initiative and for your generous donations.

This year the Metropolis of Chicago Philoptochos has asked each of our chapters to work with our children to help those less fortunate. We reached out to PTA, Handmaidens & GOYA asking our kids to bring a small kitchen appliance or kitchen tools as a donation to help the homeless. On August 27th at the "Back to School Celebration" the children brought in their donations. 
