FATHER'S MESSAGE

“COME, FOR ALL THINGS ARE NOW READY”

In last Sunday's Gospel, our Lord tells the parable of a great banquet. The table is prepared, the feast is ready, and the invitation has been sent. Yet one by one, the invited guests begin to offer excuses. None of the excuses are evil in themselves—work, responsibilities, daily concerns—but together they reveal something troubling: **the banquet was not treated as a priority.**

This parable is not only about the Kingdom of God at the end of time. It is also about the Divine Liturgy here and now.

Every Sunday, God invites us to a sacred banquet. The table is set. The prayers are offered. Heaven and earth come together. And the Church announces, in effect: *“Come, for all things are now ready.”*

And yet, many of us arrive late.

This is not about blame or judgment. Life is real. Some must work. Some have genuine obligations. Parents struggle with young children. Emergencies happen. The Church understands this and responds with compassion.

But for most of us, lateness is not occasional—it has become **habitual.**

And habits reveal priorities.

Imagine receiving a personal invitation to a wedding, a formal dinner, or an important celebration. Imagine showing up late every time—after the host has already begun speaking, after the meal has started, after key moments have passed. At some point, we would have to ask ourselves honestly: *What does my lateness communicate about how I value this invitation?*

John Chrysostom speaks directly to this, saying:

“When you come late to the Divine Liturgy, you do not merely miss words—you miss grace.”

When we arrive late to church, we miss more than announcements or hymns. We miss:

- The opening doxology that lifts our hearts to God
 - The prayers that prepare our souls for worship
 - The Epistle and Gospel that shape our faith
- The sense of offering ourselves fully, from begin-

ning to end

Most importantly, we miss the opportunity to **enter gradually and reverently into the mystery of God's presence.**

It is worth asking ourselves a gentle but honest question:

Why is it that we are on time for work, appointments, school events, and social gatherings—but late for the Divine Liturgy?

This is not a question meant to accuse, but to awaken. The Gospel calls us not to guilt, but to awareness. The banquet is not diminished when we arrive late—but **we are.**

The Divine Liturgy is not something we “drop into.” It is a journey we take together. When we arrive on time, we say with our actions: *“Lord, You come first. Your invitation matters.”*

As we celebrate the Nativity of our Lord, we rejoice that God Himself did not arrive “late” to our salvation. He entered our world at the fullness of time, humbly and completely, offering Himself to us without reserve. Christmas reminds us that God always shows up fully—and invites us to do the same.

And as we approach the New Year, perhaps one small but meaningful spiritual resolution is this: to honor God's invitation with our presence. To begin the year by arriving on time—not out of obligation, but out of love. To make Sunday morning a clear priority, offering God the first moments of the day and the best of our attention.

The invitation is always open.

The banquet is always prepared.

As we wish one another **a blessed Christmas and a grace-filled New Year**, let us also renew our commitment to be present—body and soul—from the beginning of the Divine Liturgy each Sunday at **9:30 a.m.**—ready to hear once again the words spoken to every willing heart:

“Come, for all things are now ready.”



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings, I wish you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. This is a joyful time of year, let's ensure we rejoice in the Nativity of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Let us also remember our parishioners, friends, and family, that may be facing difficult challenges, are in need, or ill, and the elderly. Let's pray and show our love and support, especially during this time.

We recently celebrated the Feast Day of our Patron Saint and shepherd, St. Spyridon. We are reminded of his humility and his loving nature to all. His care for the poor and needy, and how he persevered in his life, despite many challenges, and yet he led by example. Let us all aspire to imitate his way of life.

Earlier in the month we had another successful Craft Show weekend hosted by Philoptochos. Many thanks to all of the volunteers and vendors that attended, and we even had a surprise visit by Santa Claus. Fortunately, everyone was on the GOOD LIST.

On December 14th we had our Parish Council Elections for the 2026 through 2027 term. The Parish Council will be sworn in in early January with officer elections in the first Parish Council meeting.

Over the last two years, we have accomplished a great deal. I want to thank Father George for his love, support, and leadership. Transitioning into the President role was not easy. It is a big responsibility, and effectively a second job. With the support of Fr. George, the entire Parish Council, and the community I was able to settle in, particularly in the second year. And together we moved the parish forward.

Our accomplishments included, numerous building capital and maintenance projects to support the future needs of the parish, securing key grants for Greek School, Archangels, and Iconography. We drove growth in Stewardship in both number of stewards and stewardship dollars the last two years. Our parish was blessed with new stewards including catechumens, seeking the TRUE faith. We have added new ministries (Men's, Prison, etc.) and existing ministries are thriving.

We have done all of the above in a fiscally responsible and compliant manner. All building projects were paid for via the Building Fund, which received significant donations over the last two years. People and ministries were moved to donate with the activity and progress, and we will, therefore, continue these effort for years to come. We grew our restricted Roof and HVAC fund by another \$50,000 to \$420,000. And our endowment continued to grow during the last two years via investment and interest income.

In 2024 and 2025 we delivered strong profits, with 2025 exceeding 2024 due to better performance from the festival. We continue to remain dependent of the festival, but if we could increase our stewardship by ~\$150 per steward, the festival profits could instead be directed to other, perhaps more philanthropic needs.

As we quickly approach the end of 2025, a gentle reminder that if you have not made your 2025 Stewardship pledge, please contact the Church office. The 2026 Stewardship drive has also just kicked off as well.

Lastly, I want to thank Fr. George, Presvetera Diana and their entire family, the Parish Council, Philoptochos, and the entire community for your love and support these last two years. I hope that I have the confidence and support of the Parish Council to continue as President.

HIS GRACE BISHOP TIMOTHY OF HEXAMILION



On Thursday, November 20th, His Grace Bishop Timothy of Hexamilion fell asleep in the Lord. It is with deep sadness and hope in the resurrection that we announce his falling asleep in the Lord. A beloved hierarch, devoted shepherd, and tireless servant of the Church, Bishop Timothy leaves behind a legacy marked by pastoral compassion, deep humility, and unwavering dedication to Christ and His people.

Born in Chicago, Illinois in October of 1952, His Grace was the second of four sons of the late Demosthenes and Antonia.

His Grace was raised and spent his childhood and teen years at the Assumption (Panagia) Church of Chicago, where he attended the Sunday Church School and Greek School programs, as well as serving as an altar boy and participating in the youth programs of the parish. He was a product of the Chicago Public School System, where he attended Lane Technical High School for three years before moving with his family to Park Ridge, finally completing high school at Maine Township High School South.

In September of 1970, after being nurtured by his parish priests, the Rev. Theodore Thalassinou, the Very Rev. Kallistos Samaras (later Bishop Kallistos of Zelon), and the Rev. Demetrios Treantafeles, he began his seminary studies at Hellenic College/Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology in Brookline, Massachusetts. With the blessing of His Eminence Archbishop Iakovos of North and South America, His Grace commenced a year of international studies at the Pierce College in Greece. He received his Bachelor of Science Degree from Hellenic College in 1973 and his Master of Divinity from Holy Cross in 1978.

Upon completion of his studies, he accepted a position with the City of Chicago as Northwest Director for the Department of Social Human Services. Through this post, His Grace assisted Greek-Americans and other Orthodox Christians to secure employment, emergency food aid, dignified housing, financial assistance, and other social services from the City of Chicago. On September 14, 1980, he was ordained to the Holy Diaconate, and later, on October 5 of the same year, he was ordained to the Holy Priesthood by His Grace Bishop Iakovos of Apameia (later Metropolitan of Chicago). In 1984, he was bestowed with the rank of Archimandrite.

As a clergyman of the Metropolis of Chicago for forty-five years, His Grace served as the presiding priest of Saint Elias the Prophet Church in Dubuque, IA (1980-1985), Saint Sophia Church in Elgin, IL (1985-1997), Saint Nicholas Church in Oak Lawn, IL (1997-2006), and Assumption Church in Chicago, IL (2006-2019). In addition to parish ministry, His Grace served as President of the Metropolis of Chicago Clergy Syndesmos (1999-2004) and represented the clergy brotherhood on the Archdiocesan Presbyters Council from 1997-2014. His Grace also served as a member of the Archdiocesan Benefits Committee (1997-2006).

In addition to his ecclesiastical responsibilities, His Grace also served as Staff Chaplain for the Illinois Department of Mental Health at the Elgin Mental Health Center (1987-1997).

On September 1, 2019, he assumed the responsibilities of Chancellor of the Holy Metropolis of Chicago.

At the petition of His Eminence Metropolitan Nathanael, and by the recommendation of the Holy Eparchial Synod of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America, the Holy and Sacred Synod of the Ecumenical Patriarchate unanimously elected him Bishop of Hexamilion on October 6, 2020, and was ordained on December 5, 2020 at the Sts. Each year, the Hellenic Foundation awards grants to organizations making a meaningful impact on the Greek and Orthodox community throughout the Chicagoland area. On December 10, 2025, the Hellenic Foundation proudly hosted its 2025 Annual Grant Awards Event, awarding grants to 43 organizations supporting 61 programs — the largest number of grant recipients in the Foundation's history.

They also highlighted our GOYA Outreach Trip in a special video, helping make this meaningful experience more affordable for families. Archangels Academy

The Archangels Academy Preschool of St. Spyridon Greek Orthodox Church seeks to strengthen its Social Emotional Learning (SEL) program, a core part of its curriculum since 2019. Serving pre-school aged children, the SEL initiative teaches empathy, emotional regulation, and problem-solving, essential skills for early childhood development.

The Hellenic Foundation's support will fund the purchase of key classroom tools and materials, including sensory items, whiteboard desks, and a SMART Board. These resources will help reduce behavioral challenges and improve engagement. This Hellenic Foundation Grant insures support of a nurturing, emotionally supportive learning environment for all students.



Iconography School

The Iconography School at St. Spyridon Greek Orthodox Church is the only Orthodox iconography program of its kind in the Chicagoland area, offering specialized instruction in the theology and sacred art of iconography for the past 17 years. The school currently operates with limited resources, meeting only once weekly and enrolling twelve participants. To preserve and strengthen this vital tradition, the program seeks to expand its instruction to youth ages 8-18, increase class offerings, and develop structured curriculum that deepen both artistic skill and spiritual information.

The Hellenic Foundation Grant Award will fund the purchase of program equipment and supplies that are required to expand the program such as new easels, professional iconography supplies, instructional materials, and a projector. This support will allow the school to broaden enrollment, add a second weekly class, and grow participation.



Plutarchos Academy

The Plutarchos Academy of St. Spyridon Greek Orthodox Church is expanding its mission through the "Lifelong Hellenism Program" which will offer adult Greek language classes in both in-person and remote formats. This program is designed to promote intergenerational learning and preserve Hellenic heritage through accessible adult education. The program will offer beginner and intermediate classes both in person at St. Spyridon and remotely over Zoom, making Greek language learning accessible to adults within the parish and in the community.

The curriculum will focus on conversational Greek, foundational vocabulary and grammar, and cultural elements. The Hellenic Foundation Grant Award will help fund the program's technology needs and online learning tools which will enhance the learning experience.

FOOD PANTRY

I once belonged to the church as a youth, but strayed deeply as an adult. I never felt the need for Christ, up until NINE months ago I was lost, but someone asked me to attend a baptism. I went there for the first time in decades of entering a church. I met Father Andrew and found him to be humble enough to return the following week. It was then I met Father George and Dana, I knew then that I needed in me what they had. I needed God. Now I'm on the verge of being baptized.

If you do not know already, allow me to profess to you that Father George is the greatest person around. A humble man who teaches well, what God desires of us. I am grateful that you allow him to come and minister to me and others like me. We love him as well as Dana and I pray you will continue to share them with us.

5. Choose an icon from your church and describe what you see in it. Who is shown in the icon and what story does it tell? What do you learn from looking at this icon?

SENIOR DIVISION TOPICS

Select one of the five following topics:

TOPIC 1

Pick a common icon type that is found in Orthodox churches (for example Christ Pantocrator, Virgin Hodegetria, the Resurrection icon) and explain its meaning and theological significance.

TOPIC 2

Why is the feast of Pentecost important and what does the story of Pentecost teach us about the Holy Spirit?

TOPIC 3

Saint John frequently contrasts light and darkness in his Gospel and letters. Choose one of his teachings about light (such as "God is light" or Christ as "the light of the world") and discuss how this imagery helps us understand our Christian calling and witness.

TOPIC 4

Throughout history, Orthodox Christians have faced persecution for their faith, from ancient martyrs to modern confessors. How does the witness of martyrs, both ancient and contemporary, strengthen and guide the Church today?

TOPIC 5

Orthodox funeral services speak of death as "falling asleep" and emphasize the hope of resurrection. How does Orthodox teaching about death and eternal life influence how we live and how we care for the dying and grieving?

JUNIOR DIVISION TOPICS

Select one of the five following topics:

TOPIC 1

Select a hymn that is chanted in the Divine Liturgy and explain its meaning and theological significance.

TOPIC 2

Choose a Saint who was a child or young person. How did their faith influence their life, and what can we learn from them?

TOPIC 3

Who is the Ecumenical Patriarch, and why is he significant in the Orthodox Church today?

TOPIC 4

Choose an Old Testament story (such as David and Goliath, Daniel in the lion's den, or Joseph and his brothers) and explain how it teaches us important lessons that apply to young people today.



LEARNING HIGHLIGHTS

In Sunday School, our **Middle School students** have been discussing leadership, faith, and the power of parables in the Orthodox Church. A few highlights include:

Design a Patriarch Badge: Students used symbols such as the cross, olive branch, globe, ship, and leaf to represent the Ecumenical Patriarch's role as a spiritual guide for Orthodox Christians worldwide.

4-Square Parable Activity: Groups choose a parable like The Good Samaritan, The Lost Sheep, or The Prodigal Son. Students read the scripture aloud, summarized its meaning, connected the lesson to their own lives, and reflected on how these teachings apply to our world today. Their insights were thoughtful, personal, and as always, inspiring.



Kicking off the Oratorical Festival

Students have been discussing and learning more about this year's Oratorical topics. A few weeks ago, Dimitri Christofer inspired his peers by sharing his experience and participation in vocal chant. Dimitri won 1st place last year! A few of Dimitri's pro-tips included:

Tip #1: Read all the rubrics and guidelines carefully.

Tip #2: Practice about 200 times.

Tip #3: Don't second-guess yourself!

Dimitri's thoughtful reflections encouraged his classmates to explore their own gifts and consider how participating in church traditions can strengthen their faith.

All families of students in **grades 3-12** are encouraged to begin preparing for the Oratorical Festival. The Oratorical Festival will be held on **Friday, March 6**, following the bridegroom services.

Participating in the Oratorical Festival will be a rewarding experience for your children, offering them a platform to share their voice, learn from their peers, and deepen their connection to our faith. We encourage you to support and guide your child through this journey, fostering a family environment of learning and spiritual growth. Parents, over Christmas break, please support your child by guiding them, setting small goals, and encouraging them to unlock their spiritual inner voice; this way, they can feel confident and ready.

STEWARDSHIP

Stewardship: “Rise Up and Build”

By the grace of God, the intercessions of our beloved Patron Saint, Saint Spyridon, and through the faithful love and generosity of our parish family, we have much to be thankful for as we reflect on the life of our community over the past year. Truly, none of these blessings would have been possible without the prayers and protection of Saint Spyridon, who continues to watch over and guide our parish.

In the Old Testament, when Nehemiah saw the broken walls of Jerusalem, he called the people to action, saying, “*Let us rise up and build*” (Nehemiah 2:18). His call was not only about restoring stone and mortar, but about renewing faith, commitment, and unity among God’s people. That same call speaks to us today as we continue to build up both the **physical home** of our parish and the **spiritual life** of our community.

We are grateful to share that we have grown in the number of stewards and have also seen encouraging growth in **financial stewardship**. This growth is a powerful witness to the love and commitment of our parishioners to the life and mission of the Church. Stewardship is not simply about asking, “How much is needed?” but about recognizing that **everything we have is a gift from God**, and responding with gratitude, faith, and generosity.

Alongside this growth, God has blessed us with the ability to **organize and strengthen new ministries**, including our **Prison Ministry, Bible Study, Young Adult Ministry, and Men’s Ministry**. These ministries reflect the rebuilding of the Church’s living walls—hearts formed in prayer, fellowship, service, and love for Christ and one another.

We are also thankful for the many improvements made to our church facilities, all aimed at better serving our parish family and those who visit our community. New **hand railings** were installed in the church to assist parishioners as they come forward to receive Holy Communion. The **pews were refurbished and refinished**, restoring their beauty and extending their life. Through a generous grant from the Hellenic Foundation, a **hearing loop system** was installed, making worship more accessible for those with hearing difficulties. We also installed **new carpeting** in the church. Additionally, through the generosity of an anonymous donor, the exterior **brick of**

the church was repaired and properly sealed to protect the building from moisture damage.

Spiritually, we are especially blessed to have **a dozen catechumens** who are exploring and learning about our beautiful Orthodox faith. Their presence among us reminds us that just as walls can weaken through neglect, faith too must be renewed and strengthened through prayer, teaching, and active participation in the life of the Church.

Our **GOYA ministry** continues to inspire us as well. In May, our youth traveled to Rochester, Minnesota, where they offered loving service through a project at **Philoxenia House**. This meaningful trip was made possible through the generous support of the **Hellenic Foundation**, along with another generous donor. The dedication and commitment of our GOYA were also recognized when they were featured at the Hellenic Foundation Awards Ceremony, a wonderful testimony to the faith, compassion, and service of our young people.

We are also deeply grateful for the leadership and dedication of our Parish Council President, Bill Kilias, whose tireless efforts and steady guidance were instrumental in bringing many of these projects to fruition. His service, along with the cooperation of the Parish Council and the Building Committee, has been a true blessing to our community.

Finally, we give thanks to God for a **recent anonymous gift of a little more than \$95,000**, given as a restricted donation to be used either for building new bathrooms in the gymnasium or for replacing the gym floors. This generous offering will help us continue to plan carefully and responsibly for the future needs of our parish.

As Nehemiah reminds us, rebuilding requires **compassion, prayer, planning, and action**. Before any work begins, we turn to God in prayer, trusting that true rebuilding—whether physical or spiritual—begins and ends with Him. Stewardship is practical and intentional, but above all, it is spiritual: a grateful response to God’s blessings and an offering of our time, talents, and treasures for His glory.

As stewards of Saint Spyridon Parish, and with gratitude to God, we invite each of you to prayerfully consider how you might grow in each area of stewardship in the coming year:

STEWARDSHIP

- **Time:** Consider increasing your time in prayer, worship, and service by even **10%**—whether through more consistent attendance at the Divine Liturgy, daily prayer, Scripture reading, or involvement in parish life.
- **Talent:** Reflect on the gifts God has given you and consider offering **one new gift or ministry**—whether visible or behind the scenes—to help strengthen our Saint Spyridon family.

Treasure: Prayerfully discern whether you are able to increase your financial giving by **1–2% of your income** this year, trusting that God blesses generosity offered with a willing heart.

We are called today to **rise up and build**:


- To build the **walls of prayer**, through daily prayer, Scripture reading, and participation in the liturgical life of the Church.
- To build the **walls of worship**, by being present at the Divine Liturgy and offering our whole selves to God.
- To build the **walls of generosity**, by serving with our time, using our talents, and giving sacrificially from what God has entrusted to us.

To build the **walls of Christian love**, by seeing Christ in one another and serving those in need.

All of these blessings are possible only because of **you—the faithful stewards of our church**. Your love, prayers, and support make it possible for our parish to grow, serve, and glorify God.

We kindly ask that you prayerfully consider what you might be able to offer so that we may continue, together, to *rise up and build*—strengthening not only the walls of our parish buildings, but the living walls of faith within our hearts, our community, and the world.

We are projecting to end the year with 343 stewards, and an average stewardship of ~\$650.

The pie chart above shows the percentage of stewards at various contribution levels.

In 2025, the festival will contribute ~\$90,000 to our financial results. Of this amount, at least \$50,000 is needed for the parish to break-even. Said differently, we will end the year with approximately a \$40,000 profit thanks to the festival.

If we can grow stewardship in 2026 by a handful of new stewards, and increase financial stewardship by ~\$150 per steward (or \$12.50 a month), we could potentially breakeven and not rely on the festival. In this scenario, the festival profits could potentially be directed to other, more philanthropic efforts.

On Friday, November 21st, we enjoyed a fun and festive Family Advent Night. We kicked off the evening with dinner, followed by a short lesson about the meaning and spirit of Advent.

After that, families gathered to decorate gingerbread houses while listening to Christmas music, sipping hot chocolate, and enjoying lots of sweet treats. It was a great time filled with laughter and holiday cheer!

A huge thank-you to Krissy Turloukis and Maria Lazarevic for hosting a wonderful dinner, and again to Maria for generously donating some of the gingerbread houses, and to the PTA for providing extra treats and hot chocolate!

It was such a fun night, and we're so glad so many families could join us!

On Friday, December 19th, the Family Night Ministry hosted a fun and cozy family movie night. Families gathered to watch *The Flight Before Christmas*, a sweet story about a young reindeer learning to overcome his fear of flying.




