

Applications Now Open for Snapshot Studies 2025 –

Bring Your Innovative Ideas to Life!

The Farmers Club Charitable Trust is excited to announce that applications for Snapshot Studies 2025 will open on 19th May and close on 31st July. This initiative offers a unique chance for individuals within the agricultural and food industry to transform their innovative ideas and thoughts into impactful groundbreaking projects with funding of up to £2,000 available for successful applicants.

Applicants are invited to submit a one-minute video and very short application (through the website) outlining their study concept and its potential impact. To support them, each successful awardee will be assigned a Mentor from the Trust's Board of Trustees, providing guidance throughout the process. Those successful will receive 80% of funding upfront, with the remaining 20% awarded upon satisfactory completion.

Studies must be completed by 31st December 2025. As part of the initiative, successful participants will present their findings in a three-minute video, contributing to a valuable resource bank housed on The Farmers Club Charitable Trust's YouTube channel and website. Previous studies have explored diverse topics, including:

Windsor Leadership Trust Bursaries





The FCCT is offering bursaries for individuals in agriculture to participate in one of Windsor Leadership Trust's prestigious leadership programmes. These residential programmes, held at Windsor Castle and Cumberland Lodge in Windsor Great Park, provide immersive leadership development experiences, incorporating insights from leaders across various sectors, including the military, clergy, charities, business, and civil service.

Vice Admiral Sir Tim Laurence serves as Patron of Windsor Leadership, continuing its legacy of tackling complex challenges through innovative leadership development. The structured programme includes a Part One experience lasting two to five days, followed by a Part Two session up to six months later, allowing participants to reflect and build upon their leadership journey.

Awardees will also gain access to peer-to-peer networking opportunities through the FCCT Professional Forums, ensuring ongoing engagement beyond the programme. Former participant Philippa Wiltshire reflected on her experience:

"DO IT! Embrace the process, be prepared to be nervous but also to be honest. Don't worry about being vulnerable—you will learn a lot about yourself and come away with a network of friends who, having been through the experience together, can help and support you in the future."

AGRICULTURAL EDUCATORS AWARDED OVER £25,000 FOR **GLOBAL STUDY TOURS**

Six outstanding agricultural educators have been selected to receive a share of just over £25,000 to undertake groundbreaking study tours across Lesotho, the USA, Canada, Botswana, and Zambia. Funded by The Farmers Club Charitable Trust (FCCT), these educators will extend their expertise across a diverse range of agricultural themes, enhancing education and innovation in the sector.

The FCCT selection panel, chaired by Mr. Tim Jackson, retired principal of Sparsholt University, alongside Farmers Club Chair Karen Mercer and FCCT Trustees Meryl Ward and Des Lambert, carefully evaluated the applications and agreed to support six visionary projects.

Exploring Global Innovations in Agriculture

Each recipient will embark on a transformative journey, with insights and findings shared through their own teaching platforms and also through the FCCT's social media channels. Final reports and video presentations will be published on the FCCT website, creating a knowledge bank for the wider agricultural community.

Among the award recipients:

- Mr. Gus Cassie Lecturer in applied animal husbandry at the Royal (Dick) School of Veterinary Medicine, traveling to Canada and the USA to explore successful learning environments for teaching livestock skills.
 - Dr. Claire Cresswell University Centre Sparsholt, expanding knowledge on regenerative and sustainable agriculture with a study tour to New Zealand.

Miss Carla Coghlan - SRUC Aberdeen, researching her project 'Cow to Cone,' which aims to enhance agricultural education through the joy of ice cream, in New Zealand.

- **Professor David Rose** Harper Adams University, investigating approaches to improve mental well-being education in UK agricultural universities, with a visit to the
 - Dr. Rosie Everett SRUC, focusing on the sustainable management of upland peatlands during her research trip to Lesotho.
- Professor Prysor Williams Bangor University, visiting research and teaching farms in the UK and Netherlands to strengthen agricultural education strategies.

Celebrating Agricultural Education & Knowledge Sharing

Chair of the selection panel, Mr. Tim Jackson, said he was "delighted to chair the panel and praised the calibre of applications and emphasised the immense benefits the research will bring to the industry."

In such a fast-moving environment, it is absolutely vital that we learn from others and expand our knowledge and understanding," said Awards Ambassador and Trust Secretary Lisa Turner.

Trust Chairman, Mr. Nick Green, reaffirmed the importance of education in shaping the future of agriculture: "Educating the next generation to the highest standard cannot be underestimated. By supporting these studies, we equip educators with the latest worldwide innovations and knowledge they can disseminate to future agriculturalists."
