


## David Morris and Terry Henderson **Chapter Directors**

## **Target Fixation**

When it comes to road hazards sometimes we have a warning, sometimes we don't. By a warning I mean you can see it coming, like a pothole, something laying in the road, etc. This is when you do not want to become a victim of **Target Fixation**. It is defined as the tendency to steer a vehicle towards an object you are focusing on. When you see a hazard in the road you **MUST** avoid staring at it. Instead, concentrate on

a path around the hazard. Try this little self test that works better on two wheeled motorcycles than trikes. The next time you are on an interstate and you want to change lanes, try staring at the reflectors on the broken white line and steer through the space between them so you don't hear your tires go to tha-thump. Try this more than once and different days on different roads. For me, when I try to avoid the reflectors by looking at them I am amazed at how many times I do hit them. So what do you do if you are in traffic and can't see around the vehicle in front of you looking for hazards? Try dropping back, if you're not able to do that then ride in the wheel tracks of the vehicle ahead of you.

Summer is here and many of us will be traveling. The Chinese proverb, a journey of 1000 miles begins with a single step is true but my take on it is somewhat different. I think it should say, a journey of 1000 miles begins with a single twist of the wrist. Don't you like this one better? I thought so.

## June 2023 FL2-D Safety Message

You might be your own worst enemy!

Motorcycle accident statistics suggest that the most common cause of motorcycle accidents, not involving another vehicle, is the motorcyclist's failure to negotiate a curve. Furthermore, the reason the bike failed to negotiate the curve was excessive curve entry speed.

You may recall from some motorcycle safety training event that the first step in the MSF suggested method for negotiating a curve is to slow down!

## - REAR BRAKE BENEFITS ON TWO-WHEEL MOTORCYCLES

The front brake system on modern bikes provides much more stopping power than they did in the past. Often only a single finger (not recommended by me) is needed on the front brake lever. Approximately 70% of a motorcycle's stopping power is provided by the front brake when properly applied. The remaining 30% is accomplished by the rear brake. Many factors affect this ratio, such as speed, tire grip, road surface, road gradient, and type of motorcycle. Cruisers and touring bikes with long wheelbases benefit from the rear brake to a greater degree than short-wheelbase motorcycles like sportbikes.

Hard braking with the front brake can lighten the rear end so much that it can lessen the advantage of whatever percentage of braking is available by the rear brake. When you brake hard with the front brake it lightens the contact patch of the rear tire. Therefore the rear wheel stopping percentage goes down and the potential chance to skid the rear wheel goes up. The heavier the bike and the longer the wheelbase, the greater percentage is of stopping power to the rear wheel.

So if the rear brake provides us less benefit for stopping, when is it more beneficial to use the rear brake only? The answer: U-turns, slow tight turns, and riding in slow moving traffic. Let's start talking about the U-turn. You should be able to make a U-turn without putting a foot down. (Especially on a 900 lb. motorcycle. You risk the chance on injuring an ankle.) Or worse, having to stop, back up, and take another stab at it. I saw this on a recent group ride. Two of the big bikes stopped right in the middle of a tight switch back turn going uphill. Not a good situation for the motorcycles behind them. The approaching bikes either had to stop or go around them. When you are making a U-turn on a multi-laned road with a median, you should be able to make the turn only using the total area of the lane you started in, the width of the median, and the next closest lane to the median to complete the U-turn. If you venture into any more lanes to complete your U-turn you increase your chances of conflicting with oncoming traffic in the other lanes. During a slow tight turn dragging the rear brake shortens the distance you will be swinging out. If you are driving in slow moving traffic such as at a congested intersection, dragging the rear brake in conjunction with using the throttle and clutch in the friction zone will prevent you from having to put your feet up and down or dragging them on the road.

Let's define "using the rear brake" for slow maneuvers. The method I am about to describe is not natural to us and defies normal logic. To illustrate the process let's talk about how you drive your car, a process that is natural to us. So, what I am saying is to get in your car, put the emergency brake on, and

drive down the street. Right away you will think, "You are crazy, that is not how you drive a car". You would be right, but, that "is" how you ride a motorcycle if you want to improve your ability to perform slow

tight maneuvers. Some motorcycles have a linked braking system. That means that when you apply the rear brake lever, the system will also apply one side of the front brake. That will make the bike squat down. You will have to apply more throttle and use more friction zone with the clutch to complete the maneuver. You will definitely hear the engine working against the braking system, but that's what you want to happen. Most motorcycles have a wet clutch which means you will not damage the clutch during this process. If you have a bike with a dry clutch, this process can still be utilized but you just have to minimize the use of the rear brake against the clutch.




