Historic Timeline

- January 31, 1889 -Founded by 5 women as the Women's Art Club
- 1914 After 25 years, renamed National Association of Women Painters and Sculptors
- 1930s over 1000 members opened Argent Galleries on 57th Street
- 1941 changed name to National Association of Women Artists
- **1989** 100th anniversary published 100 Years: A Centennial Celebration of the National Association of Women Artists
- **1991** NAWA Permanent Collection founded at Zimmerli Art Museum, Rutgers University
- 1995 January- Florida Chapter established
- 2013 December- Massachusetts Chapter established
- 2018 November- South Carolina Chapter established
- 2024 135 year Anniversary!

Founded in New York City in 1889 as the Woman's Art Club, The National Association of Women Artists, Inc. (NAWA) Celebrates its 135th Anniversary this year (2024).

The founders of the Woman's Art Club

The founding statement of the Woman's Art Club insisted that art by women was equal in creative achievement to the work of men and that this would be understood only when women proved themselves in the public sphere.

In 1892, the Woman's Art Club numbered forty-eight members. Their third exhibition in 1892, was held in a vacant house at 9 West 10th Street, and marked a successful beginning in the group's struggle to be taken seriously.

First exhibited in 1914. She taught portrait classes on alternating Sundays in the 1920's to the club's members.

Exemplary Women Elizabeth Nourse (1859 – 1938)



Elizabeth Nourse, Cincinnatti's most famous woman painter. gained a reputation for figure painting, and was a member of the National Association of Women Artists.

Exemplary Women Abastenia St. Leger Eberle (1878-1942)

An American Sculptor, who is best known for figurative works that combine realism, with emphasis on the flow of drapery and movement.

- 1930 –1961 NAWA leased space at 42 West 57th Street, NYC
- With over 1000 members and during the Great Depression, many NAWA members were a part of the New Deal Programs, Public Works of Art Project WPA, The Treasury Section of Paint and Sculpture and also the Federal Art Project.



Berthe Morisot (French) was never a member of NAWA but she participated in the 1894 exhibition.

Mary Cassatt was also never a member of NAWA but she participated in exhibitions in 1892, 1894 & 1896, and lent her name to the organization.

- By the end of the Nineteenth Century, the Woman's Art Club held a successful exhibition at the National Arts Club.
- In 1913, the Women's Art Club changed its name to the Association of Women Painters and Sculptors, to reflect the importance of sculpture as part of their annual exhibitions.

Exemplary Women Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney (1875-1942)

NAWA member, Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney, founded the Whitney Studio Club, and supported American artists by providing exhibition and studio space for them, and purchasing their work. This work became the founding core of the Whitney Museum of American Art, founded in 1930.







Between 1928 and 1930 Elizabeth Cady Stanton Blake, granddaughter of the famous suffragette, a portrait painter and arts administrator, served as NAWA President. At this time, pressing financial difficulties led to the sale of the headquarters building, however, it produced the opportunity to lease a space in the midst of New York's Gallery District. A commemorative gavel with Blake's name on it is still housed in the NAWA headquarters office.


Exemplary Women Augusta Savage (1892-1962)

Augusta Savage, was the first African-American Sculptor, to be elected to the National Association of Women Painters and Sculptors, in 1934.

In 1941, the association changed its name to the National Association of Women Artists (NAWA.) During the war years (1942-45), the members helped raise money for the troops, purchase war bonds and volunteer to train disabled servicemen for new careers. They sent sketchograms to relate news from home, and continued with war-interrupted exhibitions.

Theresa Bernstein

- Joined in 1916 and remained committed to NAWA for almost 80 years until her death at 112, in 2002
- Widely exhibited and awarded every decade
- Celebrated in major traveling show, and book "Theresa Bernstein a Century in Art" by NAWA Honorary Vice President, Gail Levin.
- Teacher and mentor to NAWA member Louise
 Nevelson

- Star pupil of Theresa Bernstein in the 1920s
- Joined NAWA April 10, 1952
- 1962 represented US in Venice Biennale
- 2022 *returned* to Venice Biennale with additional "collaborating exhibition" in St. Mark's Square with over 60 pieces
- Whitney Museum retrospective 1967
- Numerous museum collections

Anna Walinska

- During the WPA era: Founded Guild Art Gallery on West 57th Street in 1935, where she gave Arshile Gorky his first solo exhibition in NYC. Served as Assistant Creative Director for the Contemporary Art Pavilion at the 1939 World's Fair.
- Exhibited frequently in group exhibitions, including first American Artists Congress, Metropolitan Museum of Art, MoMA, Baltimore Museum of Art, Bodley Gallery (with Nevelson), Riverside Museum, and numerous annual NAWA exhibitions.
- Solo retrospective at New York's Jewish Museum, 1957; solo exhibition, 1979, Cathedral of St. John the Divine (93 works in response to the HOLOCAUST). Also included a watercolor, *Cain & Abel* that won a NAWA Medal of Honor Award in 1957.

Exemplary Women

Alice Neel (1900-1984)

- Renowned as a painter and portraitist
- Whitney Museum Retrospective 1974
- 1979 honored by Women's Caucus Annual Arts award
- Became involved with NAWA late in her distinguished career
- Served as a NAWA show juror and her family later established awards for painting in her name
- Elected Honorary VP of NAWA
- 2 works exhibited in the NAWA centennial show



Exemplary Women Dorothy Dehner (1901 – 1994)

- Joined NAWA in 1960 and remained committed to NAWA
- Showed new directions in 1970 NAWA exhibition
- A frequent visitor with her studio space in the same building as NAWA
- Became Honorary Vice President in 1984
- Print and Sculpture featured in NAWA 1989 Centennial and 120th anniversary At UBS gallery and Zimmerli Museum
- Widely Exhibited and numerous museum collections



- Spearheaded the Centennial Show and Catalog
