Welcome to Our New Social Media Manager

NAWA SC welcomes Francie Klopotic as our new Social Media Manager, following Rhian Swain's move to NAWA SC PR Manager. Francie is a NAWA Associate Member and an Augusta, Georgia based artist whose professional art career began in 2018 when she picked up her pencils after a long hiatus. She initially focused on drawing photorealistic portraits of popular musical icons using graphite, charcoal and colored pencils.

Francie Klopotnic is pictured with Robert Johnson. Robert is the great-nephew of Dr. S.S. Johnson pictured in Francie's painting, titled: *My Home is Your Pharmacy.* This art piece is exhibited in the *A Thousand Words* Exhibit, in Augusta, GA. Dr. Johnson was not allowed to practice medicine at the local hospital, so he set up a pharmacy for the Black community out of his home.



Francie works in multiple mediums including acrylics, graphite, watercolors, colored pencils, oils, and oil pastels, creating brightly colored portraiture and abstract artworks. She creates art that is inspired by musicians and artists who have influenced her life since childhood.

In 2021, Francie was invited to join the Augusta artist collective, Artzilla, where she painted live during the ArtsCity Festival. In 2023, a public art jury selected her to paint one of Augusta's iconic pianos for the Jessye Norman School of the Arts. In 2024, she was guest curator for the Voices of Augusta II show at Augusta & Co. Gallery and juried into the Augusta Handmade Fair and the Euphoria Arts Festival. Her art is now on exhibit at the Lucy Craft Laney Museum of Black History, in Augusta, GA.

Francie has recently been juried into multiple group exhibitions in the Atlanta area and is currently creating bodies of work for an upcoming solo show. Her work can be found at the Art on Broad retail gallery in downtown Augusta and is presently on display at the Lucy Craft Museum of Black History, Augusta, GA.

This exhibit reclaims and reimagines the labor, creativity, and resilience of women who shaped the cultural and economic landscape of Colonial America.

Submissions are handled through https://client.smarterentry.com/nawasc. This is a juried exhibit. You may submit up to 2 artworks. Submission does not guarantee acceptance. Entry fee \$35 for up to 2 works of art.

A prospectus was emailed to members earlier this summer. Please read the prospectus carefully. It has been expanded to include all 13 colonies and the time period of 1774 - 1781. NAWA SC Chapter Featured Artist -Rhían Swain, August, GA

Rhian Swain has a BFA from the Atlanta College of Art. She is a painter,

photographer, designer, illustrator, writer, and former talk show host.

She owns RedWolf Advertising, an ad agency in Augusta, GA that provides marketing services to national and international clients.

Rhian also volunteers with our NAWA SC Chapter Board, having served as our Social Media Chair and now as our Public Relations Chair. She is past President of the Greater

Augusta Arts Council and currently serves on their Board. Rhian has recently been appointed as Co-chair of the PR Committee for NAWA National in New York.



For 40 years, Rhian has been exhibiting and selling her artwork. She works in varied mediums, including acrylic, oils, watercolor, multi-media, and digital (non-AI) painting. She loves to infuse symbolism into her pieces. Humor and bright colors are often found in her work. Her recent creative explorations have included working with and merging figurative and abstract techniques to evoke an emotional impact. Rhian draws inspiration from the human figure. By painting them in their bold, uniqueness, Rhian brings the vivacious qualities of the human spirit to life.

Rhian presently has two ongoing exhibits, one at the Augusta & Co. Gallery through October 2, 2025, and a second at The Lucy Craft Laney Museum of Black History, Augusta, GA through August 31, 2025. The first exhibit, titled *People*, is a collection of her infamous "festival people", which has become synonymous with the Arts in the annual Heart Augusta Festival.

Rhian's second exhibit is titled *A Thousand Words*, where her art tells stories about a part of Augusta's Black history and culture that was often overlooked. The

Museum's Executive Director and Program Manager, provided oral history and historic photos from the Georgia Archive and the Museum's historic archives, which provided inspiration for Rhian's art on display.

Deborah Rosato's Upstate NY surroundings fueled her interest in art. After exploring all 2D mediums, watercolor became her favorite; then she progressed to pastels. Pastels, combined with watercolor underpainting, have become the perfect combination for painting historic architecture to landscapes and everything inbetween.



Deborah's innovative technique, of painting with watercolor on rice paper, creates a batik effect with the use of wax resist. Using pen and ink to outline and pastels to add highlights to the finished work, she creates unique mixed media art forms.
