Instructional Tutor (Grades K-8)

Role

Serves as a small-group academic interventionist delivering **High-Impact Tutoring (HIT)** in reading, writing, and/or mathematics during the school day. Tutors reinforce foundational skills, build learning confidence, and address academic gaps—especially in underserved populations—through consistent, structured, and relationship-centered support. Instructional Tutors embody ALA's mission to cultivate academic excellence, character, and holistic development by advancing educational equity through personalized learning.

Authority Level

Implements high-quality, curriculum-aligned tutoring sessions with a consistent group of students under the direction of the Academic Director and classroom teachers. While not a certified lead teacher, the tutor exercises autonomy within the small-group setting to build rapport, monitor student growth, and deliver responsive, targeted instruction that accelerates academic progress.

Responsibilities

Instructional Tutors play a vital role in mitigating learning loss and promoting student success by executing a high-impact, in-class tutoring model aligned with national best practices. These responsibilities are grounded in evidence-based methods proven to improve student outcomes in literacy and math while fostering trust and academic confidence through regular, relationship-driven support.

High-Impact Tutoring Delivery

- Conduct in-school, small-group tutoring sessions (maximum 1:5 ratio) at least three times per week for 30–50 minutes per session
- Work with the same group of students throughout the school year to build consistency, trust, and sustained academic growth
- Reinforce classroom instruction by using high-quality, standards-aligned curriculum and pacing guides provided by ALA and approved instructional leaders
- Focus instruction on foundational literacy and numeracy, including phonics, reading comprehension, number operations, algebraic reasoning, and problem-solving

Targeted Intervention and Support

- Provide scaffolding, guided practice, and academic coaching that help students build confidence and catch up or accelerate learning
- Use structured lesson plans, intervention protocols, and HIT-approved instructional routines to maximize learning time
- Assist students in developing strong academic habits, focus, and perseverance supporting both academic and character development

Data-Driven Progress Monitoring

- Collect and track student performance data through pre-assessments, formative checks, and progress monitoring tools
- Collaborate with classroom teachers and the Academic Director to analyze data and adjust tutoring strategies
- Document learning outcomes and session notes weekly to inform planning and progress reporting
- Ensure that student growth is measurable and aligned to ALA's benchmarks and instructional goals

Relationship Building and Engagement

- Establish positive relationships with students that support motivation, engagement, and a sense of academic belonging
- Foster an encouraging, inclusive learning environment that reflects ALA's focus on character, resilience, and equity
