Survey conducted April 29 through May 1, 2019. 804 African-American likely 2020 General Election voters participated in the survey. Survey weighted to match expected turnout demographics for the 2020 General Election. Margin of Error is +/-3.45% with a 95% level of confidence. Totals do not always equal 100% due to rounding.
