#### LITTLEHAMPTON COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**


Hello fellow residents of Littlehampton.



## <u>Littlehampton Primary School</u> <u>Report</u>

### Message from the Principal

During 2023, we began working with the Department for Education's four Areas of Impact: Learner Agency, Effective Learners, Wellbeing and Equity and Excellence.

The learning capabilities described in these Impact Areas are a natural part of how children are at school: how they learn, build independence and confidence, get along with people, solve problems and influence their world. These capabilities are already part of what has always happened here at Littlehampton Primary School, and we will continue to build around them in coming years. These Impact Areas will become more familiar to families as children work with them in 2024

I value children developing a sense of place in their community and beyond. I want children to belong, to feel that they can influence what happens here and to enjoy their childhood as they learn and thrive. I will continue to work hard, together with children, staff and families to do this important work even better.

## **Coppins Bush Visit**

On Wednesday this week a keen group of Year 5/6 students interested in the local environment all visited Coppins Bush with Barb O'Connor (Teacher Librarian), and Julie Claridge one of Littlehampton's retired teachers who is an avid bird watcher and naturalist. The students explored the paths and took photographs of the environment and animal habitats. Julie was able to identify the sounds of different native birds including the Grey Fantail, Striated Pardalote, White-plumed Honeyeater, Grey Currawong and the New Holland Honeyeater. The students took a few minutes to be silent to listen to the call of the birds before departing. Suddenly the bush erupted in sound as the birds created a ruckus with their different bird calls. Julie explained this was a warning to other birds that a predator was in the area. Sure enough a bird of prey, a Brown Goshawk was patrolling the sky, possibly on the lookout for young rabbits seen in the area. The joys of being in the Australian bush!



#### **Swimming Weeks**

During the first term students in Reception to Year 5 took part in our swimming program at Woodside Pool. The students participate in this program each year and enjoy this experience. Swimming Instructors from the Woodside Pool teach all of our students the importance of water safety as well as build their confidence for swimming.



## Year 6 Aquatics Day

On Friday 1st March our Year 6 students took part in an Aquatics Activity Day up at the Murraylands Aquatic Centre. The weather was perfect and the students all enjoyed the day greatly. The students all under the guidance of the instructors gained knowledge and experience in a variety of water sports activities, such as Knee Boarding, Canoeing, Skiing and Sailing.

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## Courier Cup Competition

On Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> February a group of students represented Littlehampton Primary School at the Courier Cup Swimming Competition which was held at the Mountain Pool in Mount Barker. Leading up to the event they also attended a few early morning training sessions. The day was a great day and we are proud of all of them for representing our school in this competition.

A council report released this month said Mount Barker had officially become the 2nd biggest city in SA. The district (which includes other townships) has a population of 44,772 people.

Mount Barker has experienced faster growth than previously anticipated with 2023 achieving the "greatest rate" of population growth ever seen in the Hills town.

The council predicts the district will grow by nearly 8000 people over the next two years, and exceed 53,000 by 2031.

Originally, council models predicted the district would grow to have a population of around 55,000 by 2036. These models now predict this to be nearly 58,000 by 2036.

In its latest report, the council said this growth was due to the region's affordable housing and liveability including the SE freeway providing an easy corridor to the city, and that the rapid growth had (and will continue to) put a "strain on existing assets" in the town.

"This growth is set to continue, with the district population expected to exceed 64,000 by 2046, an increase of over 40% in the next 20 years."

Most of this growth is expected to be in residential developments around the Mount Barker township.

"Most population growth will be in new developments, which means that Council is acquiring new assets with new asset management needs," it said.

### Littlehampton UK on the Big Screen

In 1849, Littlehampton was given its name by one of the town's founders, Benjamin Gray. Gray chose the name Littlehampton after his native town back in England.

Littlehampton (UK) is located in the Arun District of West Sussex, approximately 80km from London, and has a population of around 19,000 people.

Last year, Littlehampton (UK) and other neighbouring towns, were transformed into movie sets for the filming of the black comedy mystery film, *Wicked Little Letters*, starring Olivia Colman and Jessie Buckley.

The story is based on a real-life incident that played out in the town of Littlehampton (UK) many years ago.

"A 1920s English seaside town bears witness to a farcical and occasionally sinister scandal in this riotous mystery comedy. Based on a stranger than fiction true story, Wicked Little Letters follows two neighbours: deeply conservative local Edith Swan (Olivia Colman) and rowdy Irish migrant Rose Gooding (Jessie Buckley). When Edith and fellow residents begin to receive wicked letters full of unintentionally hilarious profanities, foul-mouthed Rose is charged with the crime. The anonymous letters prompt a national uproar, and a trial ensues. However, as the town's women - led by Police Officer Gladys Moss (Anjana Vasan) - begin to investigate the crime



themselves, they suspect that something is amiss, and Rose may not be the culprit after all."

The movie is set to be released in Australia on 21<sup>st</sup> March 2024, and is screening at Wallis Cinemas Mount Barker. For movie session times and further information head to <u>https://wallis.com.au/films/</u><u>wicked-little-letters/</u>

## **Councillor's Report**

We are very lucky in the North Ward of Council (Totness, Littlehampton, Nairne, Callington, Brukunga, Harrogate, Dawsely and surrounds) to have probably the best part of the Council in which to live, and to have really good representation in Council.

In Littlehampton, Councillors Jessica Szillasy, Harry Seager and I are always open to enquiries from the residents of Littlehampton and will undertake to follow up on any query. Our details are published in this newsletter.

There has been a lot of recent action around the area, with the development of the Parkland Estate bordering Gardner St, Fulford Tce, the Glebe and Old Princes Hwy impacting on traffic on Old Princes Hwy and Gardner St as vital infrastructure is installed.

At the same time, Council workers have done a great job constructing an overflow on the dam at the Glebe, ensuring that in the winter months, any excess water from the dam won't impact the walking paths around it.

Recently Council staff sought input from sections of the community into the location of a bike 'pump' and skills track at the Glebe. The event was a great success with some really helpful information which will be used in the construction of the track – coming soon!

Other things happening include maintenance activities along the main street garden beds and creek lines.

The footpath on Benjamin Gray Dve is being renewed and a new footpath on Junction Road from Old Prince Hwy to Benjamin Gray Dve is being started soon.

Planning for a path from Childs Rd to Anembo Park is continuing, and I hope to bring some good news soon on this one as it's been a long and complex process.

The backstage section of the Peace Memorial Hall, sometimes referred to as the 'lean to' is still in the planning stage to work out the best way to deal with it in consultation with the Hall committee, whether it be restoration, renovation or replacement, taking into consideration its historic properties. The replacement of the roof of the hall is also still in the planning.

One of the most common comments/queries I get from residents is, "How long does it take to..." generally referring to projects like footpaths or other infrastructure items. I understand the question and sometimes the frustration.

The explanation I can give is that Council has hundreds of competing projects in different stages at any one time. All have to be prioritized, carefully planned to ensure that the risk to all (Council and the public) is minimized or eliminated. Then the money needed to make them happen has to be allocated from the budget, and then resources (either within Council or outsourced) need to be organized, and THEN work can start.

And this is all dependent on all the other projects going to planned timelines and budgets! And then there's the weather to consider.

It can be frustrating and sometimes appears nonsensical, but there is nearly always a reasonable and practical explanation – but if you have concerns – let us know so we can help.

## LITTLEHAMPTON COUNTRY FIRE SERVICE UPDATE

Summer is almost done but the outlook from the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) is for a warmer a dry end to Summer, and a warmer autumn period with little rain. The Littlehampton Brigade is gearing up for a potentially dangerous end to the Fire Danger Season which ends on the 30<sup>th</sup> of April. The Brigade is continuing to focus on rural skills training and has welcomed some additional new members.



With the early summer rains and the subsequent warmer weather, there has been additional growth and an increase in available

fuels. It's critical that we all continue to do our bit and keep our properties in good shape by managing the vegetation, in particular, fine surface fuels such as grasses and weeds. Here are some helpful tips on how you can maintain your property during Fire Danger Season

- Mowing, raking and weeding to remove fine fuels from around the house;
- Pruning the lower branches of shrubs/trees to separate the foliage from the ground surface underneath (at least 2m lift recommended);
- Reducing accumulated ground debris such as bark, dead twigs, leaves or needles from around the base of trees and shrubs;
- Pruning of limbs that overhang buildings and sheds;
- Cleaning gutters of built up debris and leaves;
- Removing flammable items from beside dwellings and buildings (eg firewood, furniture, loose flammable items);
- Maintaining fencing (it is recommended fencing is non-flammable eg, steel);
- Cleaning debris from behind fixtures, such as gas bottles, air conditioning units etc.

## Adelaide Hills Hand Spinners & Weavers Guild

#### A Love of Fibre

My mother taught me to knit when I was seven; I taught myself to crochet later, in my teens. I made a lot of my own cardigans and jumpers, and most of the family have one of my crocheted blankets. My sister married a farmer (sheep and beef) so of course she learnt to spin, and one of my favourite creations was made with her handspun yarn.

I moved from New Zealand to Australia in 1983 and life became dominated by study, then work, and the chores of house and home, and learning to spin got pushed to one side. Retirement gave me the time to pursue my hand crafts again.

A bit of social networking seemed like a good idea in retirement so I looked for groups that would help me develop my skills and give connection with like-minded people. I came across a Facebook post about the annual open day of the Adelaide Hills Hand Spinners and Weavers Guild. My partner and I went along to see what the Guild was about, and to explore my idea of learning to spin.

On entering the hall, we bumped into a neighbour who promptly offered to lend me her spinning wheel. Then we found a stall with stunning handwoven scarves – previously I hadn't even thought about taking up weaving. Some friendly conversations encouraged me to give the Guild a go. Three years later there are two spinning wheels and two weaving looms in the house, with a floor loom about to be added, and I am in my third year as the Guild secretary.

The amount of information on the internet is mind-blowing, and I have drawn on many YouTube videos to sort out problems of technique, but sometimes you just need a personal touch or to be pointed to a particularly good source of information. The knowledge and expertise available through the Guild is amazing. I love the display table at each meeting where people display their latest creation, or sometimes an interesting piece found in an op-shop. It is an endless source of inspiration and encouragement.

The Guild's open day is for people who like looking at handcrafts; it is for people who want an interesting hat or scarf for themselves or as a gift, or perhaps a hand woven basket for a new fruit bowl; it is most definitely for people who want to buy fleece, fibre or dyes for their next project. Admission is free, but bring a bit of cash for morning tea, and maybe lunch. Most of our traders accept card payments, but some prefer cash. And you need a bit of cash for a raffle ticket – prizes are hand made items donated by our members and half the proceeds go to a charity. You may not love fibre as much as I do, but I guarantee you will find something of interest at the Guild open day.

From 1 April our church will again have flowers at the altar which will have white hangings to celebrate the Easter resurrection.

It has been much better weather at the Garden over this summer than in the last couple of years. For the last two years, the raspberries growing along the fence near Gum Tree Drive have produced abundantly and have been enjoyed by many who walked by! Although the strawberries initially were a little slow to ripen they certainly came into their own during January and early February. The zucchinis, pumpkins, rhubarb and lettuce have done well whilst the tomatoes also were a little slow at first but are now producing well.



Perhaps the big winner this summer was the stone fruit. Thanks to two local volunteers we were able to net the trees.

This allowed people, rather than the local birds, to enjoy the peaches, nectarines and plums. The apples will be ready early autumn and it's good to see developing fruit on the lemon tree. It is easiest to access the netted area from the side facing the garden beds - just lift the netting and walk under (please ensure that the netting is flat on the ground when you leave to stop bird access!





The mowing undertaken by the younger members of the Christadelphian community (who own the Garden site) has been going well and we

are grateful to these enthusiastic volunteers. Quite a lot of manure has been donated to

the Garden and this has been utilised around the fruit trees and also added to the compost. The raised garden beds have

benefitted from a generous topping up of this rich compost. If anyone has additional green waste then please drop it close to the compost bins so that it can be easily added.






