Recent studies have demonstrated that spending just twenty minutes, three times a week in the microbiome of green spaces has a beneficial effect on many health conditions including arthritis, fatigue, high blood pressure, depression and anxiety. It's good to know that activities like drinking your coffee or reading this newsletter outdoors are simple ways to improve your health.

Parks also improve the health of a township. They provide fresh air, wind breaks, shade, safe environments for local flora and fauna, retain groundwater and are useful as fire breaks and emergency safe havens.

So whether it be playtime for the children, a barbecue or picnic in the sunshine, a spot of exercise or even an open air birthday party, our parks are there to provide good health options and have something for everyone.




















## COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Well Spring has certainly arrived, and Littlehampton is a hive of activity! I'm pleased to share a fresh round of updates and happenings below with you in this edition of the community newsletter.

If you're a keen gardener like me, you may find you have a little green maintenance to do prior to Summer. Council has two free green waste drop off days scheduled for Friday 12th & Saturday 13th December at Windmill Hill transfer station – just check the Council website for the clean green waste accepted (www.mountbarker.sa.gov.au).

I shall dive right into infrastructure updates around our township, because there are a few since we last caught up!

#### **INFRASTRUCTURE**

- Have you noticed the lovely new roof adorning the <u>Littlehampton Peace Memorial Hall?</u>
   The hall is getting some well-deserved love with roof renewal and a replacement dressing room (located at the back of the hall) well under way. These two projects commenced in July and are estimated for completion late 2025.
- The <u>Miels Park mixed-use courts</u>, home of our wonderful Littlehampton Netball Club, are included in Council's 2025/26 Annual Business Plan for a refresh. This project involves renewing the playing surface and new line marking, and commences late October with a scheduled completion date of late November.
- There have been sections of footpaths earmarked under the <u>Footpath Renewal program</u> for Littlehampton in the 2025/26 financial year (some projects already commenced). These include sections of: Smeaton Crescent, Gum Tree Drive, Benjamin Gray Drive, Saint James Drive, and West Terrace. For further information, please see Council's emaps page on the website.
- Under the <u>New Footpath program</u>, the Junction Road footpath has been delivered extending from the roundabout down to Benjamin Gray Drive, with a connection through to the existing footpath on Benjamin Gray Drive. And I have to say, it looks pretty good now that the pedestrian bridge has been installed!
- Miels Park toilet facilities I've had several enquiries on this one, and just to update you,
  Council is aware of the vandalism/damage that has occurred at these facilities over
  the past few months and is taking steps to deter the anti-social behaviour occurring.
  Prevention measures have included adjusting closing times, working with SAPOL, and
  increased site visits/ checks by staff.

These facilities are cleaned 7 days a week.....unfortunately we just have some very poor behaviour happening at present, which is disappointing. If residents do find the toilets in disarray, please call Council asap on 8391 7200 as they can action Rapid Response & Cleaning Teams to attend the site. We love our beautiful town, hopefully we can get on top of any further anti-social behaviour!

#### **HALLOWEEN - BAKER STREET**

Are you as excited as I am – my decorations are out and we're ready to go! Across Littlehampton we have some amazing residents who go all out on Halloween for the kids, with a special shout out to the residents of Baker Street, where this delightful impromptu event attracts over 1000 people to the street annually. For an unofficial event, it's a whole lot of fun! This year, I have asked if Council are able to provide street signage advising motorists of this community event, so that we can keep all our little (and big!) people safe. The Littlehampton Community Association (LCA) have graciously offered to coordinate the signage, and will also be running a BBQ on Baker Street for hungry trick or treaters!

#### **PLANNING MATTERS**

A number of residents have enquired with me on the development occurring on the far side of The Glebe, with regard to housing density and allotment size. Just to reassure the community, the new land parcels on Compson Rd, Alston Road, and Fulford Tce sit within the Rural Living Zone and as such must maintain a minimum allotment size of 8,000sqm. So blocks will be on the larger side, in keeping with surrounding properties within this planning zone.

#### **ADVOCACY**

As we head into a state election period early next year, Council continues to advocate for state infrastructure and services to be delivered commensurate with growth. In the lead up to the 2026 State Election, Council administration will be undertaking a sustained and targeted advocacy approach. Council now has an Advocacy & Lobbying report in each monthly agenda to keep the Elected Members and wider community updated on continued advocacy efforts.

Advocacy has included wastewater and road infrastructure, permanent Keoride service (plus expansion to other townships) ....... and the big one; progressing discussions for a joint structure plan for Mount Barker's growth area to address orderly development of Mount Barker, including proactive planning for required social and civil infrastructure. Monthly agendas can be found on the Council website.

So if you own a 4wd and would like to explore more of our great state and country, why not come along to our next meeting on 11th December.


Our meetings in 2026 will be on the 3rd Thursday of the month at ANEMBO Park, starting at 7:30. We're always welcoming new members.

## PARKS FOR EVERYONE

## **MIELS PARK**



Right in the centre of town, Miels Park is a short walk from home for many Littlehampton residents. It's excellent facilities include a playground, sheltered seating, rotunda, barbecue, toilets, netball courts, lawns and a unique, colourful mural. It is perfect for a family picnic, rest stop or simply soaking up the sun. Being right next door to shops and a cafe you don't even need to bring food from home. Filtered water for drinking, filling bottles and for your family dog is also provided. There is ample parking at the rear of the Peace Hall. The Littlehampton Community Association is justifiably proud of their involvement in the development of the park over the years. The Miels Park War Memorial is the site for the annual Anzac Day and Remembrance Day services. The dawn service on Anzac Day is a particularly moving ceremony and well worth attending.



## THE GLEBE

The large open spaces of the Glebe make this park unique. The word glebe means church lands. It is dominated by a huge, shady

climbing tree and a large grassed area for picnic rugs and ball games. The fully fenced, minimalist nature playground has a range of climbing and balancing obstacles, ropes, basket swing and sandpit. There are also toilets and a sheltered picnic table. Outside the fence there are bike ramps, a dog walking area and a pond. The park sits next to the restored Saint James School and Heritage Gardens so you can also soak in some Littlehampton history. The Glebe is a new development and many trees have been planted but as yet some areas are a little short of shade, so hats and sunscreen are a good inclusion in your outings kit. The Littlehampton Community Association, with the help of the Mt. Barker Council has strived to develop the park to meet the needs of everyone. Plenty of quiet space, nature and excellent amenities make this a great space for the whole family.

## **ANEMBO PARK**





If you are looking for a park with lots of space – 29 acres in all - the Anembo Park Sporting Complex is the place for you. The complex has playing fields for various sports and tennis courts that are home to the Littlehampton Tennis Club. There are also club rooms with bar and canteen facilities that are open during sporting events and can be hired for private functions. The recently refurbished playground includes fabulous climbing equipment, slides, swings, playhouse and a flying fox. And with all that space you can pack balls, scooters, cricket gear, kites - anything that requires a little more room than your backyard - and make a day of it. There is also a bike track for the speedsters. The park has a barbecue with tables and seating, toilet facilities nearby and plenty of shady trees to throw out a picnic blanket. Ample parking is available around the grounds and playground.

## GREEN SPACES

Even though they don't have the same amenities that our parks do, green spaces in Littlehampton provide the same benefits for our environment and residents.



## COPPINS BUSH FLORA RESREVE & TURNERS BUSH

This is a very special green space designed for walkers to amble through native bushland. It is a very real reminder of what Littlehampton used to look like before settlement. It is 4 hectares of low blue gum woodland with over 46 native species of flora and one of the last areas like this left in the Mount Barker Council district. The development of Coppins Bush began in 1978 when the Littlehampton Community Association, Littlehampton Primary School and Mount Barker Council joined forces and applied for a grant to preserve this piece of bushland. Through the hard work of students and community members over the ensuing years, Coppins Bush Flora Reserve has become what you see today. A recent collaboration between the primary school students and local artist Taylor Summers has resulted in a unique entrance sign that displays the features of Coppins Bush and visitor guidelines as to

how to respect and preserve this special place. Its take only photos, leave only footprints message will protect this area for future generations.

Similarly, Turners Bush provides walking trails through open blue gum woodland and is an official 'Bush for Life' reserve with 45 recorded species of native vegetation growing within its boundaries. It is also home to two species of rare skinks that are known to only exist in this type of habitat. In spring, Turners Bush is a delight of wildflowers, including native orchids, and is considered to be one of Littlehampton's unique treasures. It is accessible from both Hallett Rd and Blundy Way.



## **WILLOW PARK**

The gateway to our town is Willow Park. It is the setting of the welcome signage and information bay as well as the unique 'Splash' sculpture. It is a serene spot filled with oak, willow with seating gumtrees for quiet reflection. It was for many years the Littlehampton cricket oval. Once again Littlehampton Community the Association has had a major hand in its development and they are adding a weatherproof shelter over the picnic table in the very near future.



These are not the only parks in Littlehampton as housing developments have been thoughtfully planned with open areas providing lawns, trees, walking paths and water features. So spend your summer leisure time outdoors in your local green spaces and make use of what our special town provides to residents and visitors alike.



## THE WAR YEARS 1939-1945

Although Littlehampton was far from the action of World War II, its residents still played a role in the war effort for the six years of hostilities.

In 1942 all of the town's men between the ages of 18 and 45 were called upon to present for a medical examination at the Wayville showgrounds. Those exempted were men considered to be essential workers such as food producers, engineers, and postal staff. Many of Littlehampton's healthy, young men subsequently volunteered for the military and served overseas. Those that made the ultimate sacrifice are memorialised on the Honour Roll in the Littlehampton Peace Memorial Hall. After the Darwin bombings by the Japanese, all residents of Littlehampton were required to dig slit trenches or, if they were able, a full air raid shelter in their backyards. Even the local primary school children were involved in digging trenches in the school's vegetable garden. Regular air raid practices became part of the school curriculum. Windows were required to be blacked out at night. If a glimmer of light happened to

escape you would receive a sharp knock on the door from a patrolling air raid warden. Car headlights were partly covered and the street lights were turned off. Gas producers were fitted to cars to relieve the fuel shortages from severe rationing.

The ladies of the town joined the Mount Barker Red Cross before forming an auxiliary branch in Littlehampton in 1940. That same year the "Fighting Forces Comfort Fund " was established with Mrs. Jean Reddy as its inaugural president. The members knitted socks, gloves, scarves and balaclavas for the soldiers as well as raising money to purchase comfort products to be sent to them overseas. They ran fetes, raffles, amateur hours and street stalls, all patronised by a grateful public. When Auchendarroch House became a convalescent



home for wounded soldiers, the married ladies visited regularly to cheer the soldiers with gifts, reading, writing letters and activities. However, the single ladies were kept at home lest they be exposed to unsightly injuries, rough language or "over friendliness" from the lonely men.

School children joined the "School Patriotic Fund". They participated in the knitting, wrote letters to overseas soldiers and collected tins, rags and bones to raise funds for the war effort. In 1941 the school contributed £51.02.10p to the organisation by purchasing 41 War Savings Certificates .That was an amazing effort from just 45 students. In 1943 those same students planted 30 pine trees around the school in honour of the men from the district who had enlisted.

From 1942 all residents of Littlehampton were seconded to billet and feed the soldiers who had just returned from North Africa and the Middle East. The old bacon factory, by then a

cheese maturing plant, was also used as a billet. Because of the lingering smell of ripening cheese the soldiers dubbed the building "The Green Mould Hotel" and the name stuck for many years. The army requisitioned the Littlehampton Peace Memorial Hall and erected a large marquee on the western side that was used to store weapons, ammunition and training equipment. The hall itself



became an administration centre and canteen. Billeting a soldier meant extra rations for the household and some families had as many as five military guests. The army and the locals organised periodic social events including indoor and outdoor dancers, picnics, cricket matches and concerts. Sadly, one casualty was recorded in Littlehampton. Private Harry Burke was on guard duty on a particularly cold winter's night and tragically died of exposure and pneumonia during his watch. The whole town was deeply shocked by the incident. The clock in the Littlehampton Peace Memorial Hall was donated by the billeted soldiers in gratitude for the hospitality and kindness shown to them during this time.

During the war years, Littlehampton's residents performed their patriotic duties with willingness and cheerfulness. Like everyone in Australia, they wanted their boys to come home safely and were committed to supporting their soldiers while those in the military served their country.

## LITTLEHAMPTON COUNTRY FIRE SERVICE UPDATE



This year's Annual General Meeting brought several changes to the Brigade's leadership team. The Brigade took the opportunity to acknowledge and thank Frank and Natalie Regan for their outstanding dedication and service over many years, along with other Officers who chose not to re-nominate for their positions.

Their commitment and leadership have driven many positive developments within the Brigade, including the replacement of all fire appliances and a significant increase in urban firefighting equipment and capability.

#### **SEASON PREPAREDNESS**

The Littlehampton Brigade has recently participated in several hazard reduction burns led by Council staff, involving several other agencies and brigades. These activities serve as a timely reminder that the **Fire Danger Season** is approaching. Now is the perfect time to review and update your **Bushfire Survival Plan** in preparation for the summer months.

Within the Brigade, members have also been focusing on their own preparedness—conducting survival drills for potential vehicle burn-over situations and completing seasonal readiness updates.

With the wet and windy weather continuing brigade members have been maintain chainsaw skills and visited the Mount Barker State Emergency Service inspecting their equipment and discussing the different skills and equipment that each service has to assist the community.

As we move into the Fire Danger Season, it's important to remember that some outdoor activities may have **restrictions**. Examples include the use of **angle grinders**, **welders**, **oxycutting tools**, **and other gas-fired appliances**. The key requirements are:

- These tools can only be used outdoors when there is no Total Fire Ban in force. Even then,
   a 10-metre cleared area must be maintained, and a knapsack or water extinguisher must be on hand.
- Dampen down the area with water before starting work as an added precaution.
- On Total Fire Ban days, a permit from your local council is required.

It can be easy to overlook these requirements, especially for a quick job—but it only takes one spark or hot ember to start a fire. Illegal use, or failing to have the required safety equipment, can result in **fines of up to \$5,000 for a first offence.**

An awareness of incidents occurring around your immediate area or friends and family in other parts of the state can be obtained from a number of sources. One of the applications that can alert you early is Alert SA.

The **Alert SA app** is the official mobile application of the South Australian Government, designed to provide timely information on various hazards such as fires, severe weather, and floods.

- Users can create up to 10 watch zones to receive notifications about hazards occurring in areas of interest.
- The app utilizes your mobile device's GPS location and requires an internet connection to function effectively.
- It features an intuitive navigation bar for easy access to alerts and warnings.

For more information, you can visit the official website or download the app from the Google Play Store or Apple App Store.

It is important to remember that you should not rely on one means of keeping you informed regarding fires and other emergencies. Other means that you should remember or utilise are portable AM/FM radio, Facebook, CFS Website and the Emergency Alert messaging over the land line and on the mobile phone networks.

Many of us rely on digital devices and technology in our daily lives to stay connected but not everyone understands how they work. As part of your preparedness plan, you should get to know your devices, applications services and understand how they work, including their limitations and vulnerabilities. This will help you plan for an alternative communications means in the case of telecommunications or power outages.

You should familiarise yourselves with these symbols and those for other hazards.

**Advice (Yellow):** An incident has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes.

**Emergency Warning (Red):** An Emergency Warning is the highest level of warning. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk.


have imprinted their love of their Hills country lifestyle into the cafe.
