

LITTLEHAMPTON BONFIRE NIGHT TO SUPPORT MENTAL HEALTH

Littlehampton residents turned out to the Rotary Club of Blakiston's Bonfire Night on Saturday 10th October.

The event was held to raised community awareness of mental health problems, especially after such a challenging year with the recent bushfires and the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Rotary Club of Blakiston, along with help from the Mount Barker Rotary Club, raised \$700 towards 'Lift the Lid on Mental Illness,' which is Rotary Health's national annual fundraising day for mental health research.

Under the supervision of the Littlehampton CFS, the bonfire was lit by Dan Cregan MP, State Member of Kavel. Mr Cregan has been recently appointed as the Premier's Advocate for Suicide Prevention and Community Resilience.

RESIDENTS HAVE THEIR SAY ON LITTLEHAMPTON GREENING PROJECT

The past few months have seen the Mount Barker District Council (MBDC) working closely with Littlehampton community groups, businesses and residents as part of the Littlehampton Greening Project.

Following a 'Places for People' grant successfully obtained by the MBDC from the State Government, the Littlehampton Greening Project has been focusing its attention on improving a number of spaces within the town.

Community consultation opened on 21st September, with MBDC staff organising two consultation open days for residents to provide their ideas, thoughts and feedback on the development plans for Miels Park, part of the Main Street, and the Glebe Land.

There was a good turnout at the first consultation open day on 26th September held on the Glebe Land. The Rotary Club of Blakiston kept everyone warm with





a free sausage sizzle on the day.

For those who may have missed the first Open Day, MBDC staff held a second Open Day at Miels Park on 17th October with local coffee van, *The Butler's Pantry*, providing free cake, coffee and tea for those who attended.

Residents also had an opportunity to complete a survey via the MBDC website, and provide their feedback and ideas directly to MBDC's Senior Open Space and Urban Designer, Hayley Irvine.

Community consultation closed on 23rd October.

Littlehampton Country Fire Service

As we head into the nicer spring weather it is now the perfect time to ask ourselves the following questions, Am I bushfire ready? Do I have a bushfire survival plan? With the challenges that 2020 have brought this year with the COVID 19 pandemic, the last fire season and all the devastation that it brought, in some ways seems a



long time ago. The most critical piece of advice I can offer is to direct you to the CFS website at www.cfs.sa.gov.au where you can do your "5-minute plan". Just click on the tab "prepare for a fire." There you will find everything you need to know to prepare for this coming fire season including preparing your home or property. NOW is the perfect time to start your preparations. If your plan is to leave if a fire threatens, then you will need to enact that plan early and not leave it to the last minute as making a choice when a bushfire threatens is too late. Most people who die in bushfires die leaving their homes at the last moment. Leaving late is a deadly option so please visit the website and get all the correct information to start your preparations today. Please contact the Station Duty Officer on 0437 230 309 if you need some assistance with this.



The October long weekend also marked the beginning of daylight saving. It is also the time both fire services here in SA provide the key message to make sure you change the batteries in your smoke alarm and check it is working properly. A properly installed and working smoke alarm is one of the best ways to protect you and your family in the event of a fire in your home. Further information can also be found at the CFS website.

You may have also noticed that the building works have been completed

at the Fire Station. We are proud to have just been handed the keys to our new ablutions facility which incorporates a Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus recommissioning area which will give our crews more storage room and a dedicated area to clean and recommission equipment after an incident.

As always, I would like to close off by reinforcing and recapping on some key safety messages:

• Now is also the time to plan for the coming fire danger season. We as a CFS Brigade are preparing and training hard to keep our community safe, so we would like to remind everyone that fire safety is everyone's responsibility. The catastrophic fire season most of southern, western and eastern Australia just experienced seems a world away with everything that has occurred since. Rest assured this fire danger season will be with us very soon so we need to start our preparation now. This may include cleaning up around our properties, removing any rubbish, making sure our property is accessible to CFS fire appliances in case of an emergency, and most importantly, doing your "5-minute plan". For more information please visit the CFS website at www.cfs.sa.gov.au. You can also call past the fire station on any Monday night (except public holidays) to collect some literature.

• Daylight savings means check and replace the batteries on smoke alarms. A properly installed and working smoke alarm saves lives.

Councillor's Report

Bushfires – act now!



MOUNT BARKER DISTRICT COUNCIL

Last December this community barely dodged the Cudlee Creek fire due to the courage and hard yakka of Emergency Services per-

sonnel, Department of Environment employees, MBDC staff and other volunteers. If that wind had not changed in the afternoon many of us would have been in a lot of trouble.

Now is the time to clean up your surrounds, use the Council's free green drop off days – these have been extended to the Friday and Saturday, please check the Council website for the times and dates. Please make sure you cover your load, SAPOL have and will explate people not doing the right thing. A few minutes and a tarp could save you hundreds of dollars.

Have a bushfire emergency plan; ensure all your family are aware of it. The safest place to be on a catastrophic fire danger is not here. Leave before a fire starts. Attend a bushfire safety community meeting run by CFS, go to the CFS website. Be guided by the CFS; they are the fire safety experts.

Last year's fires proved that trying to leave the area through known traffic bottlenecks once a fire starts is problematic.

Littlehampton Infrastructure

Littlehampton is looking a lot tidier now that many of the stobie poles have been removed. The roundabout will be reinstated to its former neat appearance soon and streetscaping will happen soon after. The makeover will be really good for the aesthetics and utility – a tidy town is a happy town.

The Littlehampton Greening project and Littlehampton Netball Club's new "home" will entail around \$900,000 of expenditure by the Council in Littlehampton – this generational input of money to the Glebe and Miels Park will make a tremendous difference to the parks and sporting facilities in the town.

Council has conducted a far reaching consultation process; I acknowledge the great work put in by Hayley Irvine, Maddie Walker and Kristian Wohlstadt in presenting a thorough plan that all people have had the opportunity to comment on.

Council want to hear from you

The Mount Barker District Council is here to serve the residents of the district; they do their work cheerfully to the best of capability with the resources they have.

If you have an issue that is concerning you please contact Council staff by email or telephone, they will issue you a CRM number and endeavour to assist you as soon as they are able.

Staff will attend to the most important tasks first, and if your problem has not been fixed within a reasonable time please get back in touch with staff for an update. Councillors are also available if you have a matter that is still concerning you after following this process or if you have a matter that is really urgent or that you wish to raise in confidence.

Council staff live and work in our community, like all of us they appreciate a kind word and encouragement after a job well done. Staff genuinely welcome being made aware of items that need attention, Council are the responsive level of government that affects us in our daily lives.

This has been a tough year for many people and we have been fortunate that we have not been impacted as much as some other communities. As we head into summer please look out for your neighbours who live alone, especially the senior folk. Leave a bowl of water out for the feathered, scaly and furry critters that live amongst us.

As always, the North Ward Councillors, Harry Seager, Narelle Hardingham, Simon Westwood and I are here to listen and advise.

Coppin's Bush

This Littlehampton site is an extremely valuable patch of SA blue gum grassy woodland.

Coppin's Bush is home to diverse native plants and animals. SA blue gum (*Eucalyptus leucoxylon* ssp *leucoxylon*) grows here beside at least 116 other important native species, including many unique lilies and other wildflowers. This diverse woodland provides vital habitat for birds, reptiles and insects.

Caring for Coppin's Bush

Volunteers from the Bush For Life program dedicate their time to care for Coppin's Bush, restoring the native woodland, managing ongoing impacts and removing invasive weeds.

The site contains similar vegetation to adjacent SA Water land and nearby Turners Bush. Together, these sites provide a habitat network for local wildlife.


Protecting our native landscapes

The effects of land clearing in South Australia are severe. In some parts of our fragmented environment only 5% of the original vegetation remains. The consequences of extensive clearing have a dramatic impact on wildlife; 26 plant, 23 mammal and two bird species are now extinct in South Australia alone.

How can you help?

- Attend a Bush For Life workshop to gain knowledge and learn practical ways to care for local bushland.
- Become a volunteer grower and grow native seedlings to help restore the landscape.
- Enjoy spending time in nature with friends and family while valuing the bushland. Remember: take photos, not plants; use the designated walking trails; preserve biosecurity by reporting pests, diseases, weeds or damage; and take rubbish with you.
- Grow native plants in your garden to help create wildlife corridors so wildlife can move between bushland patches more safely.
- Be mindful of the impact human actions have on nature reduce, reuse and recycle.

SHADY GROVE UNITARIAN CHURCH



Shady Grove Road, Littlehampton



Shady Grove has been closed for gatherings during the Covid 19 shut down, as have many other places. Meanwhile there has been a burn off in the bushland surrounding our buildings, leaving a quite blackened scene, which is finally beginning to rejuvenate with Spring orchids are adding to the excitement of new growth.

Because their work has been outside, enabling people to be well spaced, bush carers have continued to work enthusiastically at Shady Grove.

Since things have opened up more, we have enjoyed two services at Shady Grove under Covid rules, and on the long weekend, although restricted by cold wet weather, a modified Spring bush gathering was held, with some picking of freesias in order to halt their seeding, followed by a guided walk in the bush to enjoy the orchids, with a bush themed service to follow.

On Sunday November 1st at 11am there will be a combined service at Shady Grove.

The services on Sunday December 6th at 5 p.m. and Christmas Eve (December 24th) at 5pm will be led by Rev. Jo Lane.

All Shady Grove services are subject to the weather being safe for the area. Numbers gathering inside are also limited due to Covid rules.

ST JAMES ANGLICAN CHURCH

235 Old Princes Highway, Blakiston

Despite the restrictions of the Covid pandemic we are still able to worship regularly at St. James.

Which means that there is a Holy Comunion service at the church on the 2nd and 4th Sunday of each month. Due to Covid, communion is only taken with the "bread of life" whilst the priest has the wine; there is no sharing of the chalice.



In the grounds of St. James there is a belltower on the eastern side of the church. This structure was given to the church in 1911 by the family of Octavus and Ann Weld following the death of Ann Weld.

Both Dr. Weld and his wife Ann are buried in the St. James cemetery. The belltower is built of Littlehampton bricks and the louvred roof is tiled (this has recently been restored and the weathered wooden beams replaced). There is room inside the tower for the bellringer.

Octavus Weld was a doctor who came to South Australia in about 1860. On arrival he practised as a physician at Nairne for 11-12 years before moving to Mount Barker where he lived and practised medicine for the rest of his life.

While living at Nairne he married Miss Ann Johnston of Delaware, Canada, in the St. James church .

He was also an early trustee of the church and was keenly interested in the British and Foreign Bible Society. Both he and his wife were conscientious members of the congregation.

They took a keen interest in gardening and gained much pleasure from the choice blooms grown. The historic rose society have noted the Octavus Weld rose which still grows on their grave.

He was truly a good citizen and brought comfort to many early settlers often travelling some distances to bring healing wherever possible. He built as his home the building which is now the Mount Barker RSL. in Hutchinson Street.

The bell which rings out prior to the services at St. James was acquired in 1847 and rehung in the belltower in 1911. We have been unable to discover whether this actually hung in the space on top of the church itself.

While this history is so relevant to the church today we must however look to the future. The pandemic has introduced a new way of worshipping for people who are unable to attend the service. The weekly Eucharist at Christ the King at Mount Barker is available online for anybody to watch and share. The service at St. James is at 8.30am on 2nd and 4th Sundays with the online service available each week at 10am.

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Preschool Activities: Sustainability and looking after our environment is a big focus in our Preschool. We are passionate about caring for the environment and we all learn together about what we can do to better look after our world.

Through our learning we found that plastic pollution is a growing problem in the world and as a preschool we have been looking at the effects that this can have, particularly on our oceans.



We have set up a mock ocean habitat which shows the children how it

can affect the oceans and the creatures that live in it. The children have been collecting plastic waste they have found in and around the school and been placing it in the mock ocean to see what happens.



Here are just a few of the other sustainable things we do:

Recycling and Sort Rubbish Station: Blue is for landfill, red is for soft plastics, yellow is boxes, bottles, yoghurt tubs and green is for fruit/veg scraps, weeds, plant waste.

Worm Farm: Fruit and vegetable scraps used in our worm farm creates worm juice which is then used to fertilize our garden to grow vegetables that we then use for cooking.



Enrichment Programs: Throughout their time at Littlehampton Primary School, students may be identified as candidates for one of our Enrichment programs by their teacher.

During Semester One this year a number of students worked towards completion of various stages of the Lead Learner course, which was developed in conjunction with the Department's Gifted and Talented Policy. Enrichment teaching and learning is designed to add depth and breadth to curriculum areas as taught in our mainstream classes. A topics based approach is used to foster engagement and learning is programmed with reference to: Effective Learner Profiles and Visible Learning: more broadly, the Positive Education PERMAH framework, the Site Improvement Plan and the General Capabilities of the Australian Curriculum.



This semester, our Stage 1 and 2 Lead Learners focused on reading comprehension and number sense in maths - whilst our senior students in Stage 3 discovered more about global humanitarian organisations, economics and business. It has been inspiring to see the ways in which students have referred to the SOLO Taxonomy to demonstrate their higher order thinking skills.



Winter Woolies Fundraiser: Our school held a Winter Woolies Fundraiser organised by some of our senior students. We would like to say thank you for your donations, both coin and items of clothing which we then donated to a charity, Catherine House. They were very grateful for our support.

Readers Cup Experience: This year we have 5 teams enrolled in the "Readers' Cup Experience" where avid readers form a team, read six books between the members and participate in a fun "quiz afternoon" to answer questions that challenge their understanding and knowledge of the various books. Our students were invited to attend Uraidla Primary School for the quiz morning on Tuesday 22nd September where they all represented our school admirably. Well done to all teams.

Kitchen/Garden Classes: With some restrictions lifted we have now been able to commence our Kitchen/Garden classes once again as well as having our parent volunteers coming to support our students. Over the past weeks in the kitchen we have been designing our menu around rainbow chard, silverbeet, cabbage, broccoli, cos lettuce and cauliflower as the garden is overflowing with these vegies at the moment. The classes have created fried rice in lettuce cups, coconut dahl with cauliflower and silverbeet, a delicious silverbeet corn and feta torte and a spicy silverbeet, potato and tomato curry. It has been fantastic to see the students trying some new vegetables and flavours for the first time. The garden is



flourishing with all this beautiful spring sunshine, so we are looking forward to harvesting the produce in the coming weeks and creating some more delicious meals in the kitchen.



Art Show 2020: Our Art Show which raises money for our Kitchen Garden program was held during the last couple of weeks in Term 3. This year was a completely different format due to COVID restrictions, but our students still enjoyed creating canvases and framed art pieces which were then open for bidding at our online Silent Auction. Parents and families had an opportunity to place their bid for these amazing art

work created as a class activity. We also held a community raffle to raise further funds and we would like to thank the wide range of local businesses and artisans for their support towards this major fundraiser.

As a club we did not meet until August when we had our first meeting. It was a pleasure to catch up with the members after our lockdown. Holes were dug for posts to support the climbing roses that trail along the wires towards the School.

TENNIS, FOOTBALL AND COMMUNITY SPIRIT

An afternoon chat with past Littlehampton resident, John Mullins, uncovered quite a few interesting stories of our town.

John grew up with his family in the small town of Native Valley, a cluster of farmhouses and a post office located between Nairne and Kanmantoo.

In the early 1950s John, along with his mother and brothers, moved out of the region and started farming around the state including down in the South East, and the Coorong town of Coonalpyn.

John worked for the Australian Government for the Department of Primary Industries for 23 years. He was a meat export inspector, and then moved to become a Company Inspector at Strath Meats.

In 1979, John moved to Littlehampton and fell in love with the town.

"We had vacant blocks opposite and alongside us. Kids could ride their bikes and dogs roamed the streets."

John had five children, and they all played in the local tennis club at Littlehampton. Because of this, John became heavily involved with the club from the early 1980s.

When John first joined, the club was in a quite poor state with no seniors team. And, the club's only courts, located behind the Littlehampton Hall, had a number of holes in them and were in urgent need of repair.

In 1983, John became the Senior and Junior Secretary, a position he held until becoming President in 1989.

During this time, John was involved in obtaining a \$12,000 grant from the Mount Barker Council to build two new courts next to the existing courts in Miels Park. He was also one of the driving forces behind gaining valuable loans from the Littlehampton Hall committee and local townspeople including Keith and John Nitschke, to get these new courts.

From here, the club grew so much that they had to hire courts in surrounding towns to hold all their games. 'I had a lot of good people around me to help turn the Littlehampton Tennis Club around,' says John.

John remembers how many juniors and seniors in the town had their first hit on the original black asphalt courts behind the hall.

John finished at the club in 2000, just before they moved to Anembo Park.

'From those little black courts, you now have twelve at Anembo Park. What a history they hold!'

But it wasn't all just about the tennis matches. The Littlehampton Tennis Club had a very strong social side.

'We did a lot of bottle drives around the town on a Sunday morning,' says John. Residents would give the club members their bottles to be recycled, which proved to be quite a money spinner for the club.

'It was the greatest social experience that the kids could get,' having to knock on such a variety of people's doors for fundraising.

Progressive dinners were also a big hit, and a great social occasion.

John soon became involved in the Littlehampton Hall, as Vice President from 1989 to 1999.

'The Tennis Club had borrowed money from the Littlehampton Hall to help build the new courts in Miels Park,' says John. The Hall requested a tennis club member to be on the Hall committee, and John was appointed to this position which he held for ten years.

During his time at the Hall, he saw the start of the Old Style Dances, as well as the hall undergo an interior repaint in 1998.

John also attended the first meeting of the Littlehampton CFS in 1984.

With his children attending Littlehampton Primary School, it was inevitable that John would become involved with the school in the 1980s.

John remembers the school being far smaller than it is today, with only 80 pupils. He sat on the School Committee (Governing Council) for 5 years, with Jim Maher as Chairman.

John started and ran the Under 10s Modified Rules Football Team; a group of boys from both Littlehampton Primary School and Saint Scholastica in Mount Barker (now Saint Francis de Sales College). Viv Maher, wife of Jim Maher, cleverly named the team *Little Saints*.

Little Saints would compete against teams from Mount Barker, Echunga and Hahndorf, with many games played on the Littlehampton Primary School oval.

One star player on the *Little Saints* team was Matthew Liptak. Matthew went on to play over 100 games of AFL for the Adelaide Crows in the 1990s.

'We won the first Lightning Carnival,' said John proudly.

The team played for three years until the different football clubs in the region took them over.

John, along with his family, lived at 12-14 Baker Street, which back then was right next to the Primary School, and is now the Preschool. John's granddaughter attends the Preschool, and proudly tells everyone that, 'my granddad used to live here!' John sold his house in Baker Street to the school in 2003, and moved to Mount Barker. These days, John is still involved in his community. His passion for music led him to play the piano for residents at Sash Ferguson, and he played the organ for many years at Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church in Mount Barker and Saint Pauls Lutheran Church in Hahndorf.

John also volunteered at Vinnies by collecting donated furniture and delivering it to struggling families.

John is a passionate traveller, and loves visiting his children and grandchildren.

Littlehampton Tennis Club 1980 –2000

For over 60 years, the Littlehampton Tennis Club called Miels Park home. Below is just a small extract of the Club's trials and triumphs which ultimately contributed to forming the ever-growing and strong club that it is today.

1980/81: A difficult year for the club. President Mort Daly resigned, causing a big upheaval within the club with many players leaving. The black asphalt courts in Miels Park were in a bad state and requests to get the courts repaired went ignored for some time. This also contributed to many players leaving.

1981/82: The two courts behind the hall were finally rebuilt and refurbished in Febru-

ary 1982 with the total costs for repairs of \$9276.00. Mount Barker Council contributed \$3000, Littlehampton Hall \$1376 and the Tennis Club \$1500; they were the main contributors. The Club was unable to nominate a senior team due to lack of numbers.

1982/83: Mid week ladies competition began for the first time

1983/84: Two attempts made to get enough numbers to hold an AGM. An intense letter campaign was made and resulted in 11 people finally turning up. There were 14 apologies and no one keen to be an official. The club nominated a Senior Team for the first time in 3 years. A fridge was installed for the first time in the clubrooms, and the tennis courts were painted each year with a paint brush and 2 nailed parallel boards. Littlehampton had two senior teams.

1985/86: The Association decreed that tennis nets are to be held down with a centre strap. Prior to this, no centre straps had been used by Littlehampton and most other clubs. Littlehampton had no method of ancoring the net strap, so an icecream carton filled with cement was used to anchor the strap, which was an old car seat belt obtained from the wreckers. This satisfied the Association, but sometimes a rush to the net could result in a toe being stubbed on the net anchor, with painful results.

1986/87: The first application for a grant to build two new tennis courts was made to Mount Barker Council. Additional courts were needed as one senior team and three junior teams had to hire courts elsewhere to play matches. The application was not successful.

1987/88: 15 people attended the AGM and new people came onto the committee. Applied again to Mount Barker Council for a grant, as well as to SA Department of Recreation & Sport to build new courts. Both applications rejected.

1988/89: The first bottle drive was made and became a very successful fundraiser for the club. The Mount Barker Council awarded the club a grant of \$6000 which allowed the cub to begin building two new courts in Miels Park adjoining the current courts.

1989/90: A further \$6000 was granted to the club from the Mount Barker Council to complete the new courts. The new courts were opened on 9th February 1990 by ex-councillor Ron Norris and Mayor Joan Zanker with 80 people in attendance. The new courts stimulated a strong club growth, which meant the club still had to hire some additional courts to play on.

1991/92: Lights were installed on all four courts, which attracted a lot of night tennis. Trees were planted around the courts, and two courts were resurfaced. Littlehampton entered their first doubles team.

1993/94: Due to units being built at the back of the courts, the netting at the back had to be heightened to stop balls going over. New lights were installed at a cost of \$8500.00. Application was made to build 2 courts on the Glebe Land, however this was unsuccessful.

1995/96: Two lower courts resurfaced. The club was approached by Anembo Park management to see if they were interested in sharing a 12 court synthetic grass complex with the Hockey Club and Nairne and Mount Barker Tennis Clubs. Nairne and Mount Barker Clubs pulled out, which forced the Littlehampton Club to withdraw from the deal. It was later realised that synthetic grass courts were not acceptable, according to the Hills Tennis Association.

1996/97: Club obtained a quote to rebuild the old clubrooms at the rear of the hall, however the hall committee voted against this due to the cost of the rebuild. *Historical information provided by John Mullins*

HISTORY OF LITTLEHAMPTON TENNIS CLUB AT ANEMBO PARK

Littlehampton Tennis Club was established in 1927 with the first courts being dirt and situated opposite Anembo Park. In the 1930s the two courts behind the Littlehampton Hall were built. In 1952 lighting was installed. Another two courts were established in 1990. The club continued to grow and in 2001 after much fundraising and planning, the tennis club built 6 courts at Anembo Park along with a small clubhouse.

In 2011 the District Council of Mount Barker, Anembo Park Sports and Recreation Association. Littlehampton Tennis Club along with the assistance of Tennis SA and Hills Softball Association, completed the Anembo Park Lighting Project. This enabled the club to play all of its night tennis matches at Anembo Park and has seen our night tennis competition evolve into a year round competition enjoyed by many with all 12 courts in use every Tuesday night. Night tennis has proven so popular that tennis is now played on Wednesday nights as well.

In December 2013 an additional 6 courts with lights were completed at Anembo Park. With 12 courts in the one location Littlehampton Tennis Club is now recognized as a Regional Centre.

Having 12 tennis only courts in one location enable



the club to be able to host Tennis Australia Junior ranking points tournaments at Anembo Park. The first was held in December 2014. This was a first for tennis in the Hills. This was a great event with over 160 players participating. The club has continued to host a Junior points tournament each year with ongoing success.

The club also hosts the HTA senior traditional grand finals each year, along with trials for Foundation Cup and Hills and Barker SAPSASA days and Tennis SA development squad days.

The club has made many improvements to the area around the courts at Anembo Park. These include 6 free standing shelters, paving, landscaping and lawn around the courts, installation of a rainwater tank, tree planting, a new clubhouse with veranda and conversion of the old clubhouse into a storage area.

The club has installed the 'Book A Court' system at Anembo Park. This allows members of the public access to the courts via an online booking program. The courts can be hired from as little as \$8 per hour. Bookings available via the club's website.

"Be home for tea at 5pm, or else!"

Stories of a childhood in Littlehampton, by Wayne Reddy

Wayne Reddy is a long time Littlehampton resident and has been part of numerous local projects and organisations over the years. Recently, Wayne volunteered as the Project Manager for the newly built Littlehampton Entrance Statement.

Wayne has a strong connection to Littlehampton and is full of stories and memories from his childhood growing up in the town.

'My childhood in my home town of Littlehampton,' by Littlehampton resident Wayne Reddy.

This one is for the kids of today...

As kids, we all knew each other in the town, and all our mums and dads too. I could easily name all the families in the town as a kid. We could leave our houses unlocked all the time. There was no need to worry about graffiti or property damage back then. Mum would just say "Be home for tea at 5pm or else!"

I had friends like John Stevens, Darb Miels, Trevor Freer, Barry Eves, Keith Davis, Robert Fladrich, 'Twinkle Toes' Terry Rule, Boomers, Garwoods, Halls, Gums, Boltos, Bonetties, Linds, Watts, just to name a few.

We were very self-sufficient with our own vegetables, chooks, fruit trees and grape vines, plus we would catch rabbits too. I would trap them in the back shrub near Hallett Road and the Brick Company quarry also up on Foggit's Hill with my mate Laurie Delamina's dogs. The dogs would catch a rabbit; I would skin it and they had half each to take home to eat.

Dad could call foxes with a metal toy train wheel blowthrough and they would come out of the bushes on Foggit's Hill, also called Brewery Hill. He would shoot the foxes and got money for their skins.



We also had great fun on Foggit's Hill. We made a ride out of a barrel rib with a strap on one end to put your feet in and a small piece of wood for a seat. With soap on the bottom and the dry grass, we would fly down that hill like a rocket. However, we did have to jump off at the bottom before we hit the blackberry bushes!

On the hill to the left over the railway line up Cleggett Road, we went for billy carts rides. We had to turn quickly at the bottom of the hill though, otherwise we would end up in the creek!

Up by Foggit's there was a concrete weir across the creek damming the water. Alan, my brother, and us kids would throw quinces at model sailing boats we made and floated on the water.

We would swim in the water holes in the creek near Foggit's, although we would need cigarettes to help burn the leeches off our skin after a swim! We would make fishing rods out of sticks and



cord with a hook. We managed to catch small mud fish and Alan and his friends would cook and eat them (this was not really my thing).

We would also swim in the pool just out of town on the Balhannah Road (now Junction Road). This pool was just a concrete weir across the creek, but it did have change rooms and a platform to sit on across the shallow end.

We had a big railway station where sheep carriages would be left at the station and we would drive the sheep along the line to Foggit's factory. My mates and I would shunt the carriages back and forwards with a steel lever with a metal wedge base.

A chap on horseback would come up the main street, Princes Highway, cracking a whip and calling out, "Shut your gates," as they drove cattle down the street from Mount Barker Junction Station to Foggit's.

Steam trains would deliver wood and coal to the Brick Company, which is still there today, and then load up with bricks to take to Adelaide.

Talking of trains, we used to put a half penny on the rail and the heavy steam trains would flatten them to the size of a penny.

Sunday School picnics were held near Howard's Corner in a paddock on the left towards Nairne. Us kids would get on a flat top horse drawn wagon with hay bales to sit on. So much fun!

There used to be a small dam up in Coppin's Bush. It's filled in now, but I remember how it was always full of yabbies; yum!

Alan and I would also catch water rats, we got lots of money for their skins (not these days of course, because they are now protected).

Top of Hallett Road, near the pine trees, was the perfect spot for mushrooms.

When I was a student at Littlehampton Primary School, Baker Street had pine trees along both sides of the road. One day, a young lad on his bike got knocked out by a magpie hitting him in the back of his head!

It is sad that my brother and I have lost a lot of friends who have passed away over the years.

Gum Tree Community Garden

Corner of Old Princes Highway and Gum Tree Drive, Littlehampton

People pass this site all the time but have they ever stopped to see what's on offer? The answer may well put a smile on their faces – FREE fruit and vegetables growing in a delightful, serene environment!

The Christadelphians (which just means brothers or sisters of Christ) have for decades met in the Littlehampton Peace Memorial Hall. In 2013 they purchased this large tract of land along Old Princes Highway. They thought that it may well be a great site to build a meeting place that they could call 'home' surrounded by safe, functional areas and beautiful gardens.

It was obvious that the western end of the site needed to be kept for the purpose of catching water that, in heavy and sustained rain, gathered in the retention basin. However, in 2016, some of our very enthusiastic younger members decided to make the raised areas surrounding the basin useful for the local community. So Gum Tree Community Garden was created!

A good garden needs water, sunshine and good soil for produce to thrive. The site was right (when the sun shone) so it was up to the 'doers' to establish the rest. Members sought help to provide these other elements. A pole for a solar panel was donated by Henstock Technologies (Lobethal) whilst AZZO donated the control panel to power the irrigation system that was supplied by Reece Plumbing (Mt Barker). All of this was installed by local tradies who donated their time. Bunnings supplied the materials for the raised garden beds, whilst Mount Barker Landscape Centre helped out with garden mix and gravel and the Littlehampton Clay Bricks and Pavers with the

paths.



This generosity from local businesses inspired many others. People have donated wire, pallets, poles, netting, second hand tools, garden seating and tables, fruit trees, strawberry & raspberry plants, flowering shrubs and seedlings.

Since then more garden beds have been added (there are now about 14 beds plus perimeter planting). Compost bays have been constructed. Plant signs have been painted for ease of identification and it is intended to add attractive, educational signs to help people's horticultural knowledge.

There are no gates so anyone can walk in anytime and pick what they need. Or, if people have excess to their own needs, then they can just leave it near the sign at the front (off Gum Tree Drive).

Volunteers can often be seen during the week weeding, mowing or planting but the 'official' working bees are held on Fridays 10-11am or Sundays 4-5pm. This is a great time to work in the garden or to just catch up for a chat.



Currently we are transitioning into summer vegetables. So if anyone has time and would like to donate... just pop in and pick the produce or plant the next crop for others!

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

Weather Report

The Adelaide Hills have seen average temperatures for September and October. September saw a slightly above average rainfall compared to 2019. October is looking to finish up with rainfall well above last year's which is good news for most growers. The long-term outlook is looking promising with temperatures hanging around the mid to low 20s until December, and an above average expected rainfall by the end of the year.

Wine Report

The Adelaide Hills wine region saw more struggle this year with the Cudlee Creek bushfires impacting 761ha of vineyard plantings in the region. However with a good rainfall during January and early February, we saw the fruit ripen in time for harvesting. The Adelaide Hills reported crushing 12,049 tonnes in 2020 which is down 25% compared to the 2019 crush of 16,021 tonnes and is the lowest recuse rate reported since 2002. The average crush for the Adelaide Hills (up to 2019) over the past 5 years is 24,809 tonnes, this makes the 2020 crush 51% down from the 5 year average.


Fruit Report

Orchard growers have seen it tough these past couple of years with the Cudlee Creek fires destroying 25ha in Lenswood, Woodside, Cudlee Creek and Lobethal area. The Adelaide Hills is the biggest apple producer in the state and we produce upwards of 80% of the state's 30,000 tonnes of apples and 93% of the state's 5,000 tonnes of pears annually. Despite the fires, growers are saying that crops did a lot better this year because of the absence of hailstorms that severelly affected the 2018/2019 crop, and this year produced a high quality crop despite harvest being down 10%. Apple & Pear Growers Association of SA CEO Susie Green said the fires were just one of a number of factors for the reduced crop this season. "We actually had a really cold spring around flowering time and for some varieties that meant that the fruit didn't set perhaps as well as we would have liked," she said. "Then the long hot, dry weather meant that some of the fruit hasn't grown as big as it could have and obviously the bushfires have had some impact as well so it's a combination of lots of little things." Despite slightly lower volumes Green said the good quality of fruit this year would attract much better prices and lead to increased revenues. "It's a great opportunity to support the local industry after a couple of tough years."


Hay Report

Silage in the Adelaide Hills has been cut and with slightly above average rain has made it ideal. Hay season is still about a month away and is expected in November. Remember to keep an eye on your grass and get ready to cut it when it starts to go to head. Weeds are a major problem when it comes to hay as this can downgrade your hay. Capeweed is a major problem at the moment in the Adelaide Hills. If you own rural land you should spray to prevent further spread of this weed and to ensure it does not get in your hay. If you own residential land and have capeweed growing in your garden don't let it flower and try and remove it by either pulling it out or spraying it. By removing weeds from your garden that can affect farms is one small step towards better farming.

Put mince, onion, breadcrumbs, apples, herbs and seasoning in a bowl and mix together with your hands. Make 4 patties and place in fridge for 1 hour to firm up. Brush patties with oil and fry over a medium heat for approximately 20 minutes turning frequently until cooked through. Mix together honey and mustard and spread onto cut burger buns.
