




Above: A sample of the variety of artwork that will be showcased as part of the South Australian Living Artists

NEW TREES FOR THE GLEBE

Locals may have recently noticed new trees planted on the Glebe Land.

This is part of the recent development of community land through the Mount Barker District Council's Littlehampton Greening Project, and the tree planting has been spearheaded by a very passionate Blakiston local, Gillian Boyce.

Gillian has lived in Blakiston for 14 years and uses the Glebe regularly for her morning walks with her dog.

"When the Glebe was opened up for the community," says Gillian. "I thought, wow, this is fantastic!"

About two and a half years ago Gillian, along with many other volunteers, was involved in the planting of native trees along the top section of the Glebe.

They realised that there was a need for more trees on the Glebe, as the land is very exposed, especially to cold westerly winds. The trees were needed for protection from the weather, as well as for shelter and screening especially along Old Princes Highway and the soon to be housing development to the west.

Gillian has belonged to Trees for Life for over 30 years and saw a perfect opportunity to contribute to the Glebe development, in particular through her love of tree planting.

Trees for Life supplied the seeds, soil, tubs and fertilizer for Gillian to start growing the trees back in late 2020. Gillian grew over 200 trees and then donated them to the community for the Glebe tree planting project.



Gillian worked with MBDC's Haley Irvine, the Senior Open Space & Urban Designer who is leading the Greening Project, to initiate two community tree planting days in June.

Many volunteers from the Primary School, Rotary Club, Community Association and local community came out on Sunday 20th and Sunday 27th June to lend a hand planting.

The trees are a mixture of eucalyptus, blackwood and sheoaks and are all indigenous to the area, meaning they will survive the hot summers and will only need additional watering if a particularly severe summer occurs.

"They have had a great start to life, especially with all this rain we have had since they were planted," says Gillian.

Gillian looks forward to the developments of the Glebe getting underway in the near future, and in particular is looking forward to seeing all the trees grow beautifully.

"I love living here. To have all this space which was given to the community is wonderful."



NEW FOOTPATH FOR MOUNT BARKER ACCESS

The Mount Barker District Council has finished construction of the Childs Road Stage 1 Trail.

This project has delivered an off-road, shared use trail linking the existing tunnel under the Freeway down to the intersection of Childs Road/Hallett Road, near Old Princes Highway.

Planning and design investigations are underway on the Stage 2 Trail which will ultimately link the end of the Stage 1 Trail with Anembo Park in the future.

A safer pedestrian refuge crossing will be built across Princes Highway to support the increase in foot traffic.

KEORIDE ON DEMAND TRANSPORT TO BE EXTENDED

Good news for locals who have been taking advantage of the Keoride On Demand Public Transport, with the service being extended for a third time to June 2022.

The service area of Keoride was expanded earlier this year to include Nairne and Littlehampton.

This has allowed local residents to travel within the operating service areas which may not have otherwise been accessible by alternatuive public transport options.

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) and Keolis Downer, who operates Keoride On Demand, "will use the next 12 months to continue to deliver the most optimal service for the community and look at what steps need to be taken to make Keoride a permanent service."

Keolis Downer has up to 5 vehicles on the road at any one time, and recorded close to 80,000 passengers carried just within the first 12 months of trial.

HAVE YOU REGISTERED YOUR CAT YET?

Cat owners could win a \$70 voucher to spend at RSPCA Petville when they next register their cat through Dogs and Cats Online.

Twenty prizes will be drawn each month until 30 November 2021. In South Australia, you must register your cat in Dogs and Cats Online, the state dog and cat database used by councils, Animal Welfare League, RSPCA and vets to reunite lost pets with owners.

TO RECYCLE OR NOT TO RECYCLE....

With the recent COVID-19 lockdowns and the cold winter weather, residents are no doubt spending more time inside. If you are currently knee deep in an annual 'clean up and clear out,' these rubbish and recycling tips may just help you out.



The Australasian Recycling Label was launched in 2018 and is a great way to identify what part of the packaging can or cannot be recycled. Keep an eye out for the above symbols on your packaging.

These are not recycling symbols, they indicate the type of plastic

A handy tip to remember is that the symbols to the left indicate the type of plastic used, not whether it is recyclable or not:

Polystyrene can be a tricky one! Unfortunately, polystyrene cannot be

put in the recycling bin, and many do not want to see it end up on landfill. But there is an alternative: The Heathfield Resource Recovery Centre now has a dedicated polystyrene recycling service. You can take your clean, white and dry polystyrene packaging to the Centre where it is melted, extruded into blocks and remade into new products.

APPROVAL FOR FITNESS STUDIO IN LITTLEHAMPTON

The Mount Barker Council's assessment panel has approved an application for a new fitness studio to operate in Littlehampton.

The site is located at 87 Old Princes Highway, right, within the Klose's Foodland Supermarket, post office, bakery, pharmacy and OTR petrol station complex.

The gym will be a small-scale operation, with the approval permitting up to 2 staff members and 12 clients at the studio at any one time.

The fitness studio will be restricted to operating only within the hours of 5:30am - 7:30pm weekdays, and 6am - 10am on Saturdays.

In addition to this, the application was approved with the condition of "all amplified music shall be limited to a volume to not have an unreasonable impact upon the amenity of the adjacent residential dwellings to the satisfaction of Council."

SERVICE UPDATE

After a relatively quiet autumn period for the Brigade, we have continued with our training, recruitment, and induction of more local volunteer Brigade fire fighters. You may have seen us out and about in the township training and responding to emergencies in the community. In recent times we have responded in support of SES and partner agencies to more weather related events such as fallen trees, localised flooding and fallen power lines.

At this time of the year we are also focusing the bulk of our training on urban fire fighting with many of our members having received specialised nationally accredited training in urban fire fighting such as compartment fire behaviour, self-contained breathing apparatus, and flammable liquids and gasses.

I would also like to again thank our wonderful local community who through their generous donations, have contributed to the purchase of new PPE storage racking giving our volunteers some extra space to safely store PPE.

As I write this article, we are again in lockdown due to the COVID 19 global pandemic which means that all our training has moved to an online platform and only essential weekly maintenance checks on the fire appliances and equipment can be performed. Rest assured however, that your local fire brigade stands ready 24/7 to respond to any emergency in the community.

Local Artist in Profile: MERRILYN STOCK

Merrilyn grew up in Seacombe Heights and moved to the Adelaide Hills about 35 years ago, with most of that time spent living in Littlehampton.

Her education journey began at O'Halloran Hill TAFE. Merrilyn originally thought that she would like to pursue graphics and graphic design, however, eventually chose ceramics as she felt it was more of a challenge for her to work in three dimensions.

"I use my ceramics as three dimensional canvases"

Merrilyn still does a lot of drawing, decorating and surface treatments, using her graphical approach to three dimensional objects.

She then went on to complete a Bachelor Degree, majoring in Ceramic Design.

From there, she secured a job working for the Art Gallery of South Australia and was lucky enough to travel to Thailand as part of this position. She was involved in excavating 700 year old artefacts at various archaeological digs. Merrilyn's strong understanding of ceramics and ability to draw was useful on the site, as she had to draw each artefact that was excavated.

Merrilyn went on to conduct similar work at archaeological sites in Cambodia.

She also had the opportunity to work in universities in Turkey and thoroughly enjoyed being immersed in hundreds of years of history and ceramics.

"I have been lucky enough to be able to travel so much with my job"

Merrilyn's creative streak has been running in her family for many years. It started with her great grandfather who worked in the movie industry in the mid to late 1800s. He would travel between Australia and New Zealand working in the sound effects department and could play over 150 different instruments, some of which are still in Merrilyn's family today.

Merrilyn's grandfather worked as a printer in a print making business specialising in advertising in the 1940s.

Her father started his career as a stockman, and then moved into carpentry. When he retired, he became involved in leadlighting and painting. He is now 96 years old and still creating.

"I guess you can say that creativity is definitely in the family."

Merrilyn lives in Littlehampton with her husband, and her children still live locally.



The family is currently working on a restoration project of the Old General Store in the Main Street. Many locals may know this house as the white building with the 'Burford's Soap' logo on the side, just past the Brickworks as you come into Littlehampton.

Merrilyn has enjoyed approaching this project like an archaeological dig: finding artefacts in the backyard and uncovering pieces of history.

"We plan to put everything we find back into the building in one way or another so that the history is not lost"

Merrilyn is now working with TAFE as the Head of Ceramics at Adelaide College of the Arts. She has been working for TAFE for 22 years, and originally ran the TAFE Ceramics Department in Mount Barker. This gave her the opportunity to travel within Australia, including 'flying all over the place, from the NT border all the way down to the South East overseeing the different ceramic departments within the Arts.'

Merrilyn is very community minded; she was part of the Littlehampton Community Association for many years and ran the Littlehampton Markets for 9 years. She got married in the Peace Memorial Hall, and she has spent time on the Hall committee.

She is looking forward to the upcoming SALA in Littlehampton event; 'that bringing together of community is hugely important.'

"It is really amazing what people are producing in their own backyards."

Locals can view and purchase Merrilyn's work at the Open Artists SALA event on Saturday 28th August held in the Littlehampton Peace Memorial Hall.

Merrilyn is currently organising an Artists Walk in Littlehampton: a concept that she saw in New Zealand where local artists open their studios up for people to visit. Visitors can walk from studio to studio and see where the work is produced. It is a great opportunity to be able to buy direct from the artists, and not just from a gallery.

The Artists Walk is being held on Saturday 20th and Sunday 21st November 2021.

LITTLEHAMPTON'S CANINE CORNER

Woof! Woof! to all our local fur baby families from the Buddy's Bites Team - Kerri, Matt, Mikayla, Bailey, Oakey & our newest family member Buddy.

Since our last article we have a new four-legged fur baby in our house and store!

Talk about re-education (for the adults), late night toilet trips, keeping things above ground height, out of reach of little paws and jaws!

So! In this edition we thought it fitting to share some simple tips and insights from our experience on introducing a new puppy into your family.

Well behaved dogs do not happen by accident. Time, patience, and love needs to be invested in your fourlegged family member. So where to start?

Socialisation **Toilet Training Feeding & Nutrition** Grooming



Positive Training **Bite-inhibition**

Crate Training



Puppies undergo developmental changes at rapid rates. Critical socialisation begins around 4 weeks and ends somewhere between 14 & 16 weeks.

Short walks are a great during this period. Always use positive reassurance and reward behaviour with small healthy treats. We are so lucky to have some great walking trails around Littlehampton and the surrounding

It is important that you limit your puppy from exposure to dog parks and walking trials with a high volume of dogs until your pup has had its vaccinations. We recommend you discuss with your vet on when it is safe.

Mental exercise and stimulation are the key part of development. Introduce different toys suitable for your four-legged friend. Snuffle mats and LickiMats are both good tools to distract, redirect behaviour and channel anxiety.

Toilet training requires persistence, consistency, positivity, and a plan. Choose the spot: a grassed or lawned area. Remember this spot will become the go to place for your pup. Use cue words i.e. toilet. Using short words and the same words are the best way to train. Use healthy small treats as reassurance to maintain a positive experience for your puppy.

Your pup needs to become accustomed to new sounds around the house and in your yard sooner rather than later. Loud noises like lawn mowers, hair dryers, vacuum cleaners etc. We suggest you give them the opportunity to sniff and experience the sounds with positive reactions.

New experiences like grooming should be introduced from around 8 weeks, do not over bath your baby as it is not good for its skin. Use suitable combs/brushes for your puppy's coat. Ensure you use puppy products that are accredited. We prefer natural. There are several great grooming salons in the area.



Training should be done in small bursts of 5 to 8 mins. Touch, sit, drop and recall are the basic starters. We highly recommend from our experience you and your puppy attend Puppy School. Mount Barker Veterinary Clinic and Nairne Vet both run classes: a great way to start socialisation outside of the home.

Recommendation is to enrol from around 9 weeks of age, first vaccinations are required. These classes are usually 4 lessons, once a week for 4 weeks.

Our biggest tips of having a new puppy, is it should be fun, and it takes time and dedication.

There is a lot of information available, you can research

just about any topic on the internet. Your local pet stores can also recommend and assist.

Councillor's Report

<u>Miels Park and the Glebe</u> – Council staff and their external project manager Craig Lovering have been busy planning, costing and requesting tenders for the work on these two community open spaces. The team looking after this nearly \$1 million project have serious form in delivering excellent open spaces – check out Byethorne and Mick Murphy Park in Nairne – great people doing really good work. Final authorisation will be presented to Council soon and then works proper can commence.

<u>Childs Road Shared Path</u> – This concrete path from Hallet Rd to the freeway pedestrian/cycle tunnel is being well used by people who are looking for a non-vehicle shortcut to Mount Barker. The path has needed extra spec concrete to allow for heavy vehicles entering businesses. Council engineers have prepared plans to continue this path along Princes Hwy in front of Littlehampton Bricks, over the rail line, across the creek and into Anembo Park. To complete the safety and useability of these paths a safer pedestrian refuge crossing will be built across Princes Hwy and the intersection at Littlehampton Bricks will be realigned.

Elector Representation Review – Council is required to consult with electors to review the need to change the ward boundaries due to population shifts ensuring, as much as possible, that each elector's vote is equal. The consultation is now complete and Council will decide on the new boundaries. A smaller number of respondents were in favour of no wards, however the low number of responses indicate that people are comfortable with the current ward system.

<u>Baker Street Stormwater</u> – work is planned to upgrade the drainage pipes later this calendar year; plans are completed and funding allocated.

<u>Anembo Park Playground</u> – the refurbished and updated playground is an important part of Council encouraging a healthy outdoor place for the children to take their responsible adults to. Littlehampton has really good open spaces, it keeps us healthy and adds value to our homes and businesses. As a Councillor I commend staff for the work they do in this place.

2021/2022 Rates and Charges – Rates have been increased by 2%, CWMS 4% and the day to day charges generally matching CPI of 1%. I encourage people to take note of the rate capping rebate available for State Concession Card holders if their personal rate increase is above 4% and all other residential/rural ratepayers if your personal rate increase exceeds 12.5%.

Elections – electoral officials will be flat out next year conducting local, State and federal elections.

If you have changed your address, now would be a good time to contact the Australian Electoral Commission to make sure you are correctly enrolled. If you have thought about contributing to your community in a leadership role, 2022 is the year to have a go.

<u>Totness Commercial and Light Industry Zone</u> – expect to see more businesses setting up in Totness soon. In return for the loss of seriously valuable farming land the district gets better access to goods & services and employment opportunities close to home.

The tranquil sleepy hamlets of a generation ago are lamented by us all but progress is inevitable.

<u>SALA comes to Littlehampton</u> – Well done to all the Littlehampton Community Association members who are curating and presenting SALA 2021 in the Littlehampton Peace Memorial Institute.

Littlehampton and Blakiston have really talented artists living amongst us – come and see a great exhibition in one of the district's best halls.

<u>Councillors</u> – My fellow North Ward Councillors, Harry Seager, Narelle Hardingham and Simon Westwood welcome your views and advice.

We also encourage you to remember the good rains this winter will provide fuel for bushfires this coming summer. Please, start your bushfire planning now. Council has doubled their free green waste drop off days by adding a Friday session – make use of it.

However it is still good to meet with these families and hear of the work opportunities and living conditions of our early pioneers. There were many hardships due to distance etc. but also many simple pleasures from living in this wonderful area.

One fact that was difficult to absorb was that the Davison family took fifteen and half hours on their initial journey to Blakiston by bullock cart when today we are in the city in half an hour. It is impossible to imagine the faith of these folk in seeking a better life for themselves and their offspring. Roads and vehicles have changed our lives so much but somehow we often overlook the struggles of our forebears.

Following history month I gave a talk to school children at Littlehampton Primary school about the history of the area. The children were delightful and full of interesting questions and I have no doubt that the coming generations will learn and create history of their own.

In June we had a pleasant Sunday afternoon to honour the Masters family. It was also the occasion of Thora Edson's (nee Masters) 96th birthday, and to give thanks for the life of faith lived by that family.

We continue to worship on the second and fourth Sundays each month at 8.30am followed by a cuppa and chat in the Hall. Our Fellowship continues to grow and last month we had a lunch at the Great Eastern Hotel where 39 parishioners attended. Ronda Jaensch

A new look for the Glebe Land, Miels Park & Main Street



What's been happening?

The upgrade of Miels Park, the Glebe Land and the Main Street were identified as key priorities in the Littlehampton and Blakiston Neighbourhood Plan 2018. Last year, MBDC was successful for a Places For People \$400k grant funding specifically for improvements on the Glebe and Miels Park. Council's contribution to the project is \$400k derived from the net proceeds of the sale of 2A Fulford Terrace together with

an additional \$40k contribution from Council. **The Main Street Upgrade** received a \$150k grant through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure program. An additional \$450k is provisioned for in Council's Long Term Financial Plan and proposed for inclusion in the 2021/22 budget.

Draft concept plans for the Glebe, Miels Park and the Main Street were put out for a 5 week community consultation period from Sept-Oct 2020.

- What did the community say?
- Approx. 140 people attended 2 consultation Open Days at the Glebe & Miels Park
- 468 visits to the consultation website
- 242 downloads of the draft plan from the website
- 117 people completed the online survey
- 17 written and email responses were received

KEY COMMUNITY

<u>PRIORITIES</u> identified during this consolation period included:

Miels Park: Retaining play equipment/elements; Increasing usable area behind the hall; extension of play areas; relocation of onsite parking/improved interaction with Main Street

Glebe Land: New public toilet; play equipment/elements; establishing a walking loop; off-leash dog facilities

Main Street: Maintain free traffic flow; street trees and landscaping; defined pedestrian environment

How is the money being spent?

Following this community consultation period and cost estimates, the final concept plans for the Glebe, Miels Park and Main Street were presented to the 7 December 2020 council meeting, and were endorsed.

The anticipated cost split between the three projects:

- ⇒ **Littlehampton Greening** (Miels Park: \$300k and Glebe Land: \$500k) = \$800k (\$400k of grant contribution)
- ⇒ **Main Street** = \$600k (\$150k of grant contribution)

When will this be completed?

Where can we find out more?

Work is expected to be completed by December 2021.

The Hahndorf Football Club continues our longstanding relationship with Littlehampton through the Hahndorf -Littlehampton Junior Football Club.

The Hahndorf-Littlehampton Junior Football Club began in 1995. Being in the Adelaide Hills water catchment, Hahndorf's town size and hence population is restricted to current boundaries. As a result, during the mid-1990s the Hahndorf Football Club found itself struggling to field junior teams. As the Littlehampton Football Club had ceased some 30 years earlier, the then Hahndorf Football Club Junior Director, Ken Swain, decided to approach the principal of the Littlehampton Primary School, asking if he could bring over 10 junior footballs for the school and run some training clinics. This association led to many young boys from Littlehampton coming to play football for Hahndorf. The junior committee recognised the support from these Littlehampton families and included the towns name with the junior sides of the club, to be called the Hahndorf-Littlehampton Junior Football Club, which remains today as a formal business entity.

The club has been extremely successful in recent years, winning 22 premierships across all grades during the last 10 years. In 2020 Hahndorf-Littlehampton U12s celebrated a premiership, and the A Grade achieved three premierships in a row, along with the B Grade going back to back. Who knows how much Covid will impact the remainder of the 2021 season, but we have been pleased to field 16 teams this season across all ages, from U8s to seniors, and to provide for both male and female players. We have been working hard to try and establish an U14 girls team to complement our senior women and U17 girls teams and are seeking to upgrade our changeroom facilities to accommodate female and junior participation.



Coppin's Bush

This Littlehampton site is an extremely valuable patch of SA blue gum grassy woodland.

Coppin's Bush is home to diverse native plants and animals. SA blue gum (*Eucalyptus leucoxylon* ssp *leucoxylon*) grows here beside at least 116 other important native species, including many unique lilies and other wildflowers. This diverse woodland provides vital habitat for birds, reptiles and insects.

Caring for Coppin's Bush

Volunteers from the Bush For Life program dedicate their time to care for Coppin's Bush, restoring the native woodland, managing ongoing impacts and removing invasive weeds.

The site contains similar vegetation to adjacent SA Water land and nearby Turners Bush. Together, these sites provide a habitat network for local wildlife.

Protecting our native landscapes

The effects of land clearing in South Australia are severe. In some parts of our fragmented environment only 5% of the original vegetation remains. The consequences of extensive clearing have a dramatic impact on wildlife; 26 plant, 23 mammal and two bird species are now extinct in South Australia alone.

How can you help?

- Attend a Bush For Life workshop to gain knowledge and learn practical ways to care for local bushland.
- Become a volunteer grower and grow native seedlings to help restore the landscape.
- Enjoy spending time in nature with friends and family while valuing the bushland. Remember: take photos, not plants; use the designated walking trails; preserve biosecurity by reporting pests, diseases, weeds or damage; and take rubbish with you.
- Grow native plants in your garden to help create wildlife corridors so wildlife can move between bushland patches more safely.
- Be mindful of the impact human actions have on nature – reduce, reuse and recycle.
