COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

By the time this is read, it will officially be summer! It comes with daylight savings time, warm nights, hot days, cricket and the Fire Danger season. This year the season begins 1st December and finishes on 30th April 2025. Have you done your Bushfire Survival Plan? Does everyone in your home know it? Do you have a plan for your pets/horses/stock? Now is the time to have these things in place because it will be too late on the day.

Also , if you haven't cleaned up in advance of the season, you'll have one last opportunity in 2024 for a free green waste day at Windmill Hill on 6th and 7th December.

Onto more Council type matters. You don't have to go far to see that there has been action on some of Council's projects.

There's been a lot of work on the Glebe to level off the rough ground south of the transverse path. No more twisted ankles there!

The developers at the Parkland Estate, in company with the developer of the Gum Tree Drive housing area have now completed the upgrade of the intersection at Gardiner St/Gum Tree Dve and Old Princes Hwy as was agreed with DIT and the two developers a long time ago. It is now a much safer environment to cross the road there's a great footpath to the Glebe.

I understand that Council is in discussion with contractors to install lighting in the car park at the rear of the Peace Memorial Hall. This is great news. It will make parking there much safer at night and will make it easy to keep an eye on any anti-social activities around the area.

At the time of writing, the November Council meeting had not been held, so any good news from there will be communicated in the next newsletter.

The October Council meeting was held in the Hahndorf Memorial Institute. There was a really good turnout for the pre-meeting forum where questions from the community were addressed or taken on notice. The spirit in which it was held was respectful and collegiate.

I think the best news from that meeting for Littlehampton is about joining Anembo Park to Childs Road and Mt Barker. Council decided to start the process of closing a redundant section of Princes Hwy (currently the car park for the brickworks) so that the shared path can go from Childs Road, around the front of the brickworks, across the old rail line and into Anembo Park – including a bridge across the creek! There's a process to go, but I think the path I advocated for some 6 years ago is going to happen – soon!.

Some other items of interest from the meeting:

Council's Integrated Transport Plan was endorsed. This is the overall plan for transport related matters for the next 5+ years. This includes things Council is responsible for, as well as things we as a community want from other levels of government. There is a Consolidated Action Plan outlining actions for the short term (1 - 3 years), medium term (4 - 5 years) and long term (5+ years) which has been born from the Road Network Management Plan, the Active Transport Plan, the Road Safety Plan, the Parking Plan, the Public Transport Plan, and the Innovation and Technology Plan.

Council staff has taken into consideration numerous and detailed submissions from residents and ratepayers in finalizing these plans and are to be congratulated for the work they have done.

Also endorsed was the Mt Barker "Community Plan 2044". This plan is designed around the vision: "To be the most <u>liveable</u> region in South Australia." To support and enable this vision there are five pillars: "Place", "Environment", "People", "Economy", and "Leadership" under which there are many action plans. As with all living documents of this high overarching nature, there will be changes over time, but it's a great plan which has been heavily influenced by community input and written so that it is easily understood. Our staff are to be congratulated for their work, I think.

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Councillor's Report Cont'd

Both plans will be available on the Council website and are really interesting reading. They show a bright future for our region, despite past State Government decisions (my opinion only of course).

Coming up! On Friday the 13th December there will be a big Community Christmas Market in the Main Street of Nairne with a large variety of opportunities to get those individually crafted Christmas presents, and to enjoy the food, and drinks! And they'll be holding Community Carols on the following night.

THE JEWETT STORY CONT'D

One manufacturer that nearly made it was Jewett, a subsidiary of the Paige-Detroit Motor Car Co.

Harry Jewett was a civil engineer who had made a fortune in mining around the turn of the 20th century. In 1909, Jewett and a small group of Detroit businessmen formed the Paige- Detroit motor car company, and Jewett hired Paige as president. The arrangement didn't last. Jewett relieved Paige of his position in 1910 and after assuming the presidency of the company himself, hired a new engineering team. The Jewett Six were doing so well that the Paige truck line was shut down so workers could focus on the car.

A year later a new factory was built in December of 1921 and Paige-Detroit added a secondary brand and named it Jewett Motors Inc. This new subsidiary developed a six -cylinder-powered companion car to the Paige, which offered a less expensive alternative to the Paige.

Fewer than 40,000 Jewett automobiles were built in five years of production, and only 82 of those models are currently registered. The recently discovered 1924 car, currently for sale, would be number 83-and only the 22nd 1924 model known to survive.

The 1923 automobiles were Model 18-22 Series with a 6-50 Production Designation. A Touring, a 4-door Sedan and a Coupe were available in both Standard and Special models. A standard roadster was available at the beginning of the year and a Special became available in the last months of the year. The Special sedan had a rear seat floor heater and a folding foot rail. The Standard Sedan just had the foot rail. The Standard Brougham became available in September with the spare tire mounted on the left front running board. Disc wheels were available on the Special models at an extra cost and 31 x 4 tires were standard. The rest of the cars retained the same features as in 1922 except the rear mechanical brakes were increased in size to 14".

RAIL RETURN IS 'ON TRACK'

Member for Kavel Dan Cregan says passenger rail is on track for a return to the Hills. 5

SCOTT MURPHY

Member for Kavel Dan Cregan says he is confident that he can bring passenger rail back to the Hills, describing it as key to solving the district's transport and planning woes.

Last week, Mr Cregan told *The Courier* that he was confident headway was being made on the re-introduction of a passenger rail service between Mt Barker and Adelaide, citing the State Government's commitment to investigate a rail solution as part of its State Budget.

Mr Cregan is an independent MP, but has recently joined the State Cabinet as Special Minister for State and Minister for Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services.

A \$10m commitment, split evenly between State and Federal governments, has been allocated to investigating regional rail services including the re-introduction of one between Mt Barker and Adelaide. Other Hills transport options are also being investigated by the State Government as part of the Mt Barker and Adelaide Hills Transport Study, which began in 2022.

Mr Cregan said the re-activation of passenger rail for the Hills was a key component to solving the region's transport issues and that the current State Government was taking note.

"No one is ever going to persuade me that rail to Mt Barker ... isn't part of the solution. It has to be, from my perspective," he said.

"Every government is going to be scared of this idea because of its cost and that's not going to change.

"But what we have gone from is having a Government that wasn't prepared to have the conversation at all to a Government that is prepared to examine the issue and to put money into examining the issue.

"That's a long way from success, but I've always said this is going to be a long, difficult battle (because) it's costly, and the engineering challenges are real." Mr Cregan said he was in a good position to persuade the Government to invest in passenger rail because of both his independence and his position as a minister.

"We have a voice at cabinet, the highest decision making body in the State, and we have freedom to express our political needs on the floor of the House of Assembly," he said.

Despite his optimism, Mr Cregan said a passenger rail service in the region was still "a long, long way" off with some in State Government still needing to be convinced of its viability.

"I can't do it on my own and we're going to need partners in Government who believe that this is the solution as well," he said.

"From my perspective, there is no alternative and we've got a legacy asset there, which our forebears spent blood, sweat and tears to carve out of the side of the hills and we should be looking at using it just like other countries around the world are better using their legacy assets."

Before Malcolm acquired the Jewett, the vehicle was owned by the Vincent family of Verdun.




The Jewett as found in Verdun.

Primary & Preschool


Visual Art at Littlehampton Primary



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Summit Trax 4WD Club – A club for adventurers

Summit Trax 4WD Club was first formed in 2004 when 10 members broke away from another 4WD club to focus on offering more adventurous trips. The Club is based at Anembo Park and currently has 27 members predominantly from the Littlehampton and Mount Barker areas.

The Club President, Toni Crosbie says, "The Club is a group of 4WDers who enjoy getting out and discovering places off the beaten track."

"Trips are planned by trip leaders within the Club," says Toni. "They present their trips at Club meetings and then members and guests can put their names down to come along."

Any Club member can be a trip leader, and the committee is very supportive of them in this role. They run a range of different trips throughout the year, and trips are usually limited to eight vehicles.

Toni explains, "Some trips can range from weekend or long weekend trips to places like Ngarkat, Big Desert, Robe/Beachport or the Flinders Ranges."

Other trips are longer, up to a week's duration, and once a year an extended month-long touring trip is planned. The last extended trip was to Cape York in July.

Trips to Robe and Beachport are some of the more popular locations amongst the members. "Every year the conditions change," says Toni. "It is a great trip for new members to learn about their vehicle on some sand while still being close to civilisation."

The Club has a strong focus on the 'Tread Lightly' principle and encourages the 'take only photographs and leave only footprints' mentality when travelling. The Club takes this responsibility seriously, ensuring they are only travelling where they have permission; staying on marked tracks; and avoiding damaging the track surface. "By looking after the places we love to travel we ensure that they will be available for many years to come," explains Toni.

Anembo Park is the Club's base, and is a great central location for their members, many of whom are local.

"Special interest clubs in a local community are a great place to meet likeminded people who enjoy doing the same things as you," says Toni. The Club helps to connect the community and provides an opportunity to meet new people.

With many exciting trips planned for 2025, including to Robe, the High Country in Victoria, and the Ngarkat Working Bee, now is certainly the time to get involved if you have a passion for 4WDing.

To join, you will need a 4WD with low range, be interested in travelling with a variety of people, and be willing to follow the Trip Leaders on 4WD tracks all throughout Australia.

"You will need to come along to two meetings and an overnight trip with the Club, and then after this you will be invited to join," says Toni.

Club membership fees are \$100 per year with an initial \$15 joining fee.

The Club typically meets on the 4th Thursday of the month (except the December meeting which is held earlier in the month), at 7:30pm at Anembo Park. Meetings usually consist of a short meeting, followed by supper. Drinks are available to purchase at the Anembo Park bar with proceeds going to the Anembo Park Sports and Recreation Association.

The next club meeting is 7:30pm Thursday 19th December.

21 GREAT IDEAS FOR BUILDING NEIGHBOURLY CONNECTIONS

STREET FOCUSSED ACTIVITIES

1. Roaming Gnome: this is a street gnome that roams the street. If the gnome ends up in your yard it is your turn to relocate him in the neighbourhood. You might event dress him up in different themes and get local kids to look out for him.

2. Street cubby building day: Bring local children together to build a cubby together or visit each other's cubby houses. Keep it simple, think cardboard boxes and recycled materials!

3. Dress up your letter box: Have a street project to dress up letterboxes around different themes-Halloween, Christmas, Harmony Week etc. Walk the streets with your neighbours to look at the creative projects.

4. Birthday party for your street: have a birthday party for your street. It does not have to be a true date, just choose a date and each year that date becomes your street's birthday. Celebrate with a children's style birthday party in the street, in a park or on the front lawn. Invite all the households on the street. In place of a present, everyone brings a plate. Go all out and decorate, have games etc.

5. Street Christmas Tree: decorate a significant tree in your street and dedicate it to be a Street Christmas Tree. Have an event to decorate the tree with neighbours.

6. Walking school bus: if your street is within walking distance of the local school, gather parents and kids from your neighbourhood to walk to school as a group, creating a walking school bus.

7. **Dress up your verandah:** decorate your front verandah and post it on Instagram. Check out your neighbours' decorations and start conversations about them. Put the challenge out to others via your community social media groups.

8. Car washing Day: set up an area for the children in the street to wash the neighbours' cars. Kids create a flyer to promote and letterbox drop to invite people along.

9. Community project: develop a community project for your whole street. Example: build bird feeders for the trees in your street, a street library or a street seat.

10. Street cricket: host a game of cricket in yours and your neighbours' front yards. Invite all the children and parents to get involved.

11. Fairy lights: put fairy lights in trees in your front yard and invite your neighbours to do the same. You can even host a get together under the lights once they are up.

12. Street Library: Use a recycled cabinet put in a front corner of someone's property for leaving/ sharing books. Look at Littlefreelibrary.org for inspiration.

13. Photography competition and/or exhibition: invite neighbours to take photos of the things they love about their street. Exhibit the photos in the street and ask a local elected member or other person of interest to judge. Request a donated prize from a local business. Host a celebration for the photography competition.

14. Walking group: start a street walking group – with or without dogs, where children in prams and on bikes are welcome. Set a regular time each week to talk and walk.

15. Have a listening booth: take a bench seat to your location, put up a sign and call it the street listening booth. Take some time out to listen to your neighbours' stories. (Why not see if your neighbours are interested in recording oral histories of your street?)*

16. Selfie booth: set up a marquee with simple props and invite neighbours to come and use the "selfie booth". Ask them to share the photos on the street's social media pages.*

* Note: these activities above might be easiest to be included at another local event where people are gathering, for example the local swap meet, or Farmer's Market. This makes it easier to run this activity with the wider community and a ready audience of participants.

18. Local long table lunches or dinners: Invite every house on your street and ask them to bring a plate. Or consider a progressive dinner-see the how to guide here.

19. Cake Bake-off: Have a street competition to showcase your neighbour's best baking efforts. Invite a local café owner or street celebrity to judge and celebrate over afternoon tea.

20. Group meals: Put a call out to people who like to eat with company and take in turns preparing meals and sharing or eating together.

21. BBQ: Make a regular time for a barbeque in the park and whoever is free comes along.

LITTLEHAMPTON COUNTRY FIRE SERVICE UPDATE

Summer is now upon us and we are well and truly in the Fire Danger season which means we will be subjected to days of elevated fire danger or Total Fire Ban Days. The most common questions we hear often are around the lighting of fires or use of tools outdoors that may produce a spark. It is important that we all understand the restrictions in place during normal days during the fire danger season and days that have been declared a "Total Fire Ban" day. This information can be found on the CFS website at: <u>https://www.cfs.sa.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/restrictions/what-can-i-do-what-cant-i-do/</u>



With the very little rainfall and the subsequent warmer weather, there has been some additional growth and an increase in available fuels. It's critical that we all continue to do our bit and keep our properties in good shape by managing the vegetation, in particular, fine surface fuels such as grasses and weeds. Here are some helpful tips on how you can maintain your property during Fire Danger Season:

- Mowing, raking and weeding to remove fine fuels from around the house.
- Pruning the lower branches of shrubs/trees to separate the foliage from the ground surface.
- underneath (at least 2m lift recommended)
- Reducing accumulated ground debris such as bark, dead twigs, leaves or needles from around the base of trees and shrubs
- Pruning of limbs that overhang buildings and sheds
- Cleaning gutters of built up debris and leaves
- Removing flammable items from beside dwellings and buildings (eg firewood, furniture, loose flammable items)
- Maintaining fencing (it is recommended fencing is non-flammable eg steel)
- Cleaning debris from behind fixtures, such as gas bottles, air conditioning units etc.

More Spring cleaning

St James Anglican Church

As we approach the end of 2024 we look back at a year full of challenges worldwide. This makes us appreciate our homeland even more as we live in relative peace and accord.

I think the year has been good and certainly among the highlights was the celebration of Littlehampton during the May History Festival. It was great to see so many people whom we have known over the years visit again, but especially at the end of May when several busloads of children from Littlehampton Primary school came to learn of the history of the church and area. They were all happy to ring the bell.

The outstanding feature noted by most visitors was seeing our lovely stained glass window as it shone out through the open doors as they came up the hill to the church.

The window depicts St. James on the left panel holding his staff with a shell attached while the right hand panel depicts Jesus as Our Good Shepherd holding a lamb. Above the two panels is a diamond shaped smaller panel with an angel. It is a well known work of Montgomery and Grimbley: a noted stained glass firm which operated from Adelaide and Melbourne. They also completed fine windows in St Pauls Cathedral in Melbourne. However, it was not the original window at St. James, as the first window was similar to the glass panels in the side windows of the church, with blue glass inserted in panels.

This lovely window we now have, was given by the congregation on the 50th anniversary of the opening of the church; so that means this window was installed and blessed in April 1897.

We are looking forward to the season of Advent when we prepare for the celebration of the birth of Jesus. This is such a meaningful time although it often feels lost among all the glitter of decorations and presents, but this really is the reason there is a Christmas.

On Saturday next, December 19th, a Christmas concert will be presented in the Littlehampton Peace Memorial Hall, and an excellent program has been arranged. The services of Mr. Norman Morphett (tenor), Mr. Don Eraser (comedian), and Mr. Gordon Smith (pianist), all of Adelaide, have been secured. The supporting artists will be Mrs. J. L. Currie (mezzo soprano), Miss Madge Wilson-Smith (contralto), and Mies Nina Wylfe (elocutionist). Little Miss Cordelia Crago, of Adelaide, will recite and Mr. Eric Stephenson (baritone) will be heard in solo items, and with Mr. Morphett, will render duets. The Mount Barker Methodist Choir will render "And the Glory" from Handel's "Messiah," also, some Cornish carols.

Another feature of the evening will be community singing and altogether splendid evening's entertainment is promised, and the proceeds of the same are in aid of the Institute library and reading rooms.

Mumps are prevalent in and around the town, many children being away from school in consequence; a good many adults also are suffering."

LITTLEHAMPTON BREAK-UP SOCIAL

The Littlehampton break-up social was held in the Peace Memorial Institute on Tuesday. In addition to the children, a large number of parents was present despite the inclemency of the weather. In absence of the chairman of the school committee, Mr. C. Miels officiated. Items were given by the school children and games were played.

At 2:30 "Father Christmas" arrived and presented each child with a bag containing sweets, nuts, an orange and a handkerchief. The winners of ribbons in the various grades mounted the stage and had their ribbons pinned on by Mrs. Sweeney and Mrs. W. Nadort. Supper was served. The school committee and Mothers Welfare Club were in charge of the arrangements and convened the evening with the assistance of the teacher.

A presentation was made to Mr. H. Hudson, the head teacher, by Don Cameron, on behalf of the children's club. This club was founded by Mr. Hudson. In thanking the children, Mr. Hudson referred to the happy time he had had among the children and said that the light and respect for other people's property and feelings shown by the children would be reflected in their respect for themselves, their home, and their school. Mr. Hudson has been promoted to the charge of the Terowie Higher Primary School. Mrs. Saxon, president of the Mothers Club, and Mr. C. Miels, school committee also spoke. The proceedings closed with "Auld Lang Syne" and the National Anthem.

Winners of ribbons were: Grade I, Jessie Fiora and Maxeen Smith; Grade H, Betty Phillips and May Wyld; Grade HI, Ron Nitschke and Mary Fiora; Grade IV, Phyllis Williams and Valmae Smith; Grade V, Ugo Fiora and Helen O'Loughlin; Grade VI. Don Scott and Darcy Kavanagh; Grade VII, Dante Fiora and Lola Shepherd.

Q.C. Results:

Eleven children sat and all were successful in gaining their certificates. Dante Fiora gained highest marks and Lola Shepherd was second. The others who passed were Don Cameron, Hurtle Inwood, Gordon Jaensch, Ted Orr, Ted Sweeney, Clarence Childs. Nancy Nadort, Florence Bruce, and Beryl Pearson.
