Who are farmers and what do they do?


A farmer is someone who is responsible for producing or raising the food we eat. They are called an agriculturalist. Farmers can be both men and women. Farmers live and work on their own farms. Farmers work hard every day. There are no days off in the life of a farmer. Animals must be cared for everyday and there is always work to be done when preparing, planting and growing crops. Sometimes farmers will hire farm hands or laborers to work on the farm with them. There are many different farmers.

Some farmers grow crops like corn, wheat, potatoes and other vegetables.

She grows vegetables.


Other farmers have orchards or vineyards to grow fruit like apples, peaches and grapes.

What's special about Georges Mill: We make all our cheeses by hand with milk from our goat herd. We farm on land our family has owned since the 1750s.


What's fun about farming: Goats! They all have personalities and are a constant source of entertainment.

This is Loudoun County, Virginia Farmer Molly. She raises dairy goats and makes goat cheese and caramel. She also has a farm store that sells items from her farm and other local farms.

Poultry Farmers raise Chickens, turkeys and ducks for their meat and their eggs.

What do you produce or grow: We raise pastured heritage hogs, cattle, chickens and ducks.

Activity Sheet



Family Game night













- This is something that a farmer grows for us to eat.

- 3) It lays eggs for us to eat.




- 1) This is a building.


- 1) This is a tool.

- The farmer might use it to help him plant seeds in his fields.




- 1) This is something the farmer grows for us to eat.
