## Great Lake Freighter Models Donated to The Society

Harsens Island Michigan (August 23, 2016): The Harsens Island St. Clair Flats Historical Society is pleased to announce the addition of two scale models donated to the Museum. The models, donated by Mary Reed-Lewis, daughter of Harry Reed-Lewis, are of the "Atlantic Huron" a Canada Steamship Lines vessel and the Inland Steel Company's vessel the "Wilfred Sykes". These beautifully built scale models are now on-display at the Museum in Sans Souci, Harsens Island.

"It is truly strange how things happen", said Robert Williams President of The Society. "William (Bill) McIntyre Jr., of Grosse Pointe, a friend of Mary Reed-Lewis and husband Brock from Niagara-on-the-Lake Ontario Canada, learned that Mary was looking for a home for some of her father's many scale models. Bill mentioned this to his long-time friend and Society Member Denne Osgood. Denne called me and in short order arrangements were made for delivery of the two models", he continued. "What a confluence of random communication", said Bob, "that a few words connected these models to The Society Museum". "We are grateful for the donation of these beautifully built models", he concluded.

The scale models, built by Harry Reed-Lewis, were but two of the many he constructed throughout his life. Born in Toronto and raised in Windsor Ontario, Harry's interest in model building started at age ten when his father, a civil engineer, built him a model of a tugboat complete with a little clockwork engine, and models of sailboats that he and his brother sailed. Harry started his model building hobby with model-hydroplanes, in the 1950's, he lived in Windsor during the time that Detroit was the 'world-headquarters' for powerboat-racing. His family moved to Oakville, then to Kitchener Ontario where he worked as purchasing manager for Budd Canada.

Harry has built models of the ocean-liner *SS United States*, French vessels and *warships of WWII*. He has built models of the *ESSO Parentis* and Jacques Cousteau's oceanographic-vessel, *Calypso*. Vessels of the Cleveland-Cliffs Steamship Company's fleet, the *SS Cadillac* and the *SS Cliffs Victory*; as well as, vessels of the Canada Steamship Lines'...

### **Explorers find 2nd oldest confirmed shipwreck in Great Lakes**

...The Washington sank during a storm in 1803, exploration team said

The second oldest confirmed shipwreck in the Great Lakes, an American-built, Canadian-owned sloop that sank in Lake Ontario more than 200 years ago, has been found, a team of underwater explorers said Wednesday.

The three-member western New York-based team said it discovered the shipwreck earlier this summer in deep water off Oswego, in central New York. Images captured by a remotely operated vehicle confirmed it is the Washington, which sank during a storm in 1803, team member Jim Kennard said.

"This one is very special. We don't get too many like this," said Kennard, who along with Roger Pawlowski and Roland "Chip" Stevens has found numerous wrecks in Lake Ontario and other waterways.

The sloop Washington was built on Lake Erie in Pennsylvania in 1798 and was used to transport people and goods between western New York, Pennsylvania and Ontario. It was placed on skids and hauled by oxen teams across the Niagara Isthmus to Lake Ontario in 1802 after being sold to Canadian merchants.

The 53-foot-long ship was carrying at least five people and a cargo of merchandise, including goods from India, when it set sail from Kingston, Ontario, for its home port of Niagara, Ontario, on Nov. 6, 1803. The vessel was caught in a fierce storm and sank. At least three crewmembers and two merchants were on the sloop. All aboard died. According to Kennard, contemporary records said portions of the cargo and pieces of the ship were found the following day on shore near Oswego.

The Washington is the oldest commercial sailing vessel found in the Great Lakes and the only sloop known to have sailed on lakes Erie and Ontario, Kennard said. Single-masted sloops were replaced in the early 19th century by two- and three-masted schooners, which were much easier to sail, according to Carrie Sowden, archaeological director at the National Museum of the Great Lakes in Toledo, Ohio, which sponsors the New York team's explorations.

Since there are no known drawings of the Washington, the sloop's discovery will help maritime historians learn more about the design and construction of that type of sailing vessel used on the Great Lakes between the American Revolution and the War of 1812, she said.

"Every shipwreck offers something different that adds to our knowledge base," Sowden said.

The oldest vessel found in the Great Lakes is HMS Ontario, a British warship that sank in Lake Ontario in 1780. Kennard and another explorer found that wreck in 2008.

## 2017 Harsens Island Visitor's Map

The Harsens Island St. Clair Flats Historical Society has received many requests for a map of the Island. In response one will be published in 2017.

The map will include a list of community services and businesses available on the island that are providing services to visitors. All public roads and major waterways on and around Harsens Island and the St. Clair Flats will be shown and labeled, and lighthouses, cell towers, church spires, channel markers and some other navigation aids will be shown for general guidance to boaters. Business members of the Historical Society will have their business address, phone number, email and website referenced and will be eligible to purchase a display AD to provide more information to visitors. The map will be 22" x 17" folded twice down to a finished size of 11" x 8.5" and will be available for \$3 each. Copies of the rough draft of the map and advertising information are available now at the Historical Museum in Sans Souci. Each Historical Society Member can pick one up at no cost. We would appreciate receiving comments and corrections for the map up until November 6.

Any business wishing to become member of the Historical Society to have the details of their business included on the map, or wishing to place a display AD, should contact the Historical Society by that date. If you would like to provide corrections in person or discuss a 'business membership' or AD, a representative will be available at the museum from Noon to 1pm on September 17, October 8 and November 6. The finished map is planned to be available January 1, 2017. This map is intended to inform visitors of all that is available on the Island; and, will provide a record or "snapshot" of the Island as it is now to keep in the archives of the Historical Society.
