





Recreation as Industry

"With a ready consumer market, skilled labor, and the means of industrialized production close at hand, it is no wonder that the St. Clair region became to the recreational boating industry what Detroit was to the automobile. Beginning in the 1920s, three of the greatest names in modern wooden boatbuilding had their origins there: the popular Chris-Craft brand in Algonac, the high-performance Gar Wood in Marysville (Mollica 1999), and the luxurious Hacker, "the Steinway of wooden boats" in Mt. Clemens (Barry 2002). In one sense, they followed the Detroit auto boom by couple of decades; in another these maritime communities merely revived a local industry that was over a century old – much older if one considers that among the skilled workers in Chris-Craft's Algonac plant in Anishinaabeg, crossing the river from Walpole Island each day (Nin.Da.Jig 1987, 86: Martin 1971).

This was particularly true during the Secon World War, when there was both a manpower shortage and a need by the military for highly maneuverable, shoal-draft boats that could be built quickly and cheaply - precisely the qualities that had traditionally distinguished the boats of the St. Clair maritime landscape. Moreover, wooden hulls, once a liability, were once again an asset, being less likely to trigger magnetic mines. Chris-Craft produced at least 243 wooden landing craft in its Algonac plant under contract to the US Army and served as the testing facility for an additional 12,000 boats built at its larger Cadillac and Holland, Michigan plants. With Gar Wood contributing an additional 188 units, and Hacker a limited run of high-speed picket boats (Barry 2002, 100), the St. Clair locale's boatbuilding industry was briefly remilitarized, albeit for combat on distant shores."



The Tashmoo Park Timeline by Michele Komar is a chronological compilation of articles, booklets and photos that are mainly about Tashmoo Park, the White Star Line and its properties, people, and boats. Originally estimated to be 500 pages, it turned into 1,916 pages comprised of 4 volumes with thousands of articles and would take 2 ¹/₂ years from start to finish.

There are countless articles from the Detroit Free Press and The Times Herald in this compilation. I thought you might be interested in reading some of these articles from a 100 years ago!

Orphans Get Picnic Candy

The old adage concerning the misanthropic breeze that blows nobody good is also applicable to early morning downpours.

When the time for departure of the Detroit jobbing confectioners on their annual picnic arrived yesterday the heavy rain, caused some hasty changing of plans among the candy dealers and their friends, with the result that at the end of the day the committee in charge of the event discovered they had a large quantity of candy left over.

The problem of what to do with the 3,000 packages was solved when Charles F. Bielman, Jr., general manager of the White Star line, suggested that the candy be distributed among the little inmates of the various orphan asylums of the city.

As a result of the rain that marred an outing, each orphan in Detroit was given a box of candy.

Distribution of the gift will be made through the agency of the Detroit Community union.

DETROIT GROCERS PICNIC WEDNESDAY

More Than 3,000 Expected to Attend Tashmoo Outing.

Wednesday, July 30, many of the groceries of the city will be closed while their proprietors and their families and clerks enjoy their annual excursion to Tashmoo Park. Joseph A. Martin, acting mayor; Richard Lindsay, city clerk; Thomas A. Farrell, county clerk, several circuit judges and other prominent in the city's activities plan to attend.

The grocers' outing has always been the largest excursion leaving Detroit during the season. Last year more than 3,000 attended. More than \$1,000 work of grocery products will be given away in prizes to the winners of the contests and athletic events.

Among the chief events will be a tug-of-war between grocers of the east and west sides, a similar event for clerks, and championship ball games between crack amateur teams, the Risdon Cremery, Grennan Cake, and Skrzycki Pie nines.
