Freighter Cuisine

As the Memorial Weekend "Blow Off Some Steam" Event draws closer, I am becoming more and more curious about life on a freighter. While doing some research in the museum library I found a cookbook. It is a collection of recipes from actual menus from Great Lakes Freighters. I thought, wouldn't it be fun to host a freighter themed party and serve food that freighter crews have eaten too.

Below is an excerpt from the cookbook and a recipe that is easy to prepare and cook.

Ships of the Great Lakes Cookbook – Discover Their Culinary Legends Researched and Written by PK McKenna Published by Creative Characters Publishing Group -2001

"What is it about Great Lakes ships that we find so captivating? These vessels are fondly named, christened, bid bon voyage from docks filled with excited onlookers and welcomed home with equal fanfare. They are photographed, sketched, painted, written about and their passage faithfully followed from shore by millions of loyal ship watchers. They become "ours." When our magnificent ships are retired, we go to great lengths in preserving their memories and their well-earned place in the region's rich maritime history. And rightfully so, as most of the dependable grand ships that sail the unpredictable waters of the Great Lakes.

Equally captivating are the sailors of the Great Lakes . . . a rare breed, and as legendary in their own right as ships they sail. We marvel at their courage, worry for their safety and pray for their quick return. Their loyalty and devotion to their ships and each other form a bond seldom seen between co-workers today. Shipmates become family for over nine months a year, depending on each other for friendship, encouragement, safety and even their lives.

One of the favorite members of every ship's crew has always been the steward. Seven days a week, from sun up to sun down, the steward can be found in the ship's galley preparing meals also legendary in their own right. Fantastic homemade meals, each prepared from scratch and each offering a feast to satisfy even the heartiest of appetites are common fare aboard ships that sail the Great Lakes. The aroma of freshly baked breads and rolls fills the galley early each morning, followed shortly thereafter by the bustle of chickens, steaks and seafood being prepared for the noon meal. Fresh salads and other crew favorites stand ready for the asking. As you will soon discover, Great Lakes sailors eat well!"

Recipe from M.V. Paul R. Tregurtha - Garlic-Rosemary Roasted Chicken (Page 215)

1 (5 to 6 lbs.) roasting chicken1 Tbsp. rosemary, choppedgarlic cloves, crushed

8 med. red onions
2 whole garlic heads
2 tsp. olive oil

Fresh rosemary (optional)

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Remove giblets and neck from chicken; discard. Rinse chicken under cold water and pat dry; trim excess fat. Starting at neck cavity, loosen skin from breast and drumsticks by inserting fingers and gently pushing between the skin and meat. Place chopped rosemary and crushed garlic cloves beneath the skin on breasts and drumsticks. Lift wing tips up and over back; tuck under chicken. Place chicken, breast up, on broiler pan. Cut thin slice from the end of each onion. Remove white papery skins from garlic; do not peel or separate cloves. Cut tops off garlic, leaving root end intact. Brush onions and garlic with olive oil. Arrange onions and garlic around chicken. Insert meat thermometer into meaty part of thigh, making sure not to touch the bone. Bake at 450 degrees 30 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 350 degrees and bake an additional 1 hour and 15 minutes or until meat thermometer registers 180 degrees. Discard skin.

Sharing Stories

Before there was Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, television, film, radio, and the printed word, people shared stories through storytelling. It is in our nature to want to share our history, a happy occasion, a tragic incident, or a common experience. Storytelling part of every family. For generations, families have passed stories by word of mouth. And through time details are lost or added, there is exaggeration, or even embellishments to make a point. Sometimes we are fortunate enough to have a family member who has written down these stories. That is what the Harsens Island Museum is all about . . . capturing those stories before they are lost. No story is too small or insignificant. While we are collecting stories about island events and island families we would also like to hear funny anecdotes. You know, those stories that come out when the family is gathered around the dinner table or the bonfire. They usually begin with "Remember when".

Here is a cute and funny example of an anecdote that was shared on NextDoor, February of 2017 when remembering Andy Wrobel. This was the exchange between Sheila Cates and Mike D'Angelo.



The Story About the Lost Nose

Back in 1971, when Sheila Cates was a little girl, her dad was pulling into the Four Winds with his boat. Sheila jumped onto the land before the boat was tied up. Her dad was really mad at her. He had told her the week before that a guy did that and knocked off his nose right off on a piling! Well, while Sheila's parents were having their libation hour at the Four Winds, Sheila spent the entire time looking on the lawn for the guy's nose. Through the years Sheila thought the lost nose was a scare tactic used by her dad, so she would not jump off the boat. In 2017, Sheila found out the story was true (with a bit of exaggeration by Sheila's dad).

D'Angelo who worked with Andy Wrobel at the Four Winds confirmed the story. What happened was that Andy was tying up a boat, and in order to swing a bigger boat around the canal you had to loop around the springer with one line and then the captain would maneuver a turn with one engine. The line slipped, and the springer came back and flattened Andy's nose. Andy ended up going to the hospital for a few days, and he looked like a racoon, with black eyes and a wrapped nose.
