

The Tashmoo Park Timeline by Michele Komar is a chronological compilation of articles, booklets and photos that are mainly about Tashmoo Park, the White Star Line and its properties, people, and boats. Originally estimated to be 500 pages, it turned into 1,916 pages comprised of 4 volumes with thousands of articles and would take 2 ¹/₂ years from start to finish.

Interesting facts about some of the buildings and grounds at Tashmoo Park.

Tashmoo Park - Bathhouse

The two-story bathhouse was built early in the park's history and featured the signature cupolas on the roof. Both floors had changing rooms and a large veranda across the front for viewing the river and the bathers.

Extra towels were available for five cents each, a bathing cap for 10 cents and stockings for 10 cents. Modesty was important and both men and women covered up. The 1920s saw a relaxation of the social conventions and many women dared to show their knees.

The beach featured a sandy bottom and was ideal for wading on a hot summer day.

Tashmoo Park - Refreshment Pavilion

It is possible that this structure was originally the dance pavilion. A 1904 newspaper article stated that a refreshment pavilion would be built to the left of the dance pavilion. It would be designed by renowned Detroit architect, A. C. Varney. It was 46 x 78 feet in size. The picture above is clearly the refreshment pavilion as the dance pavilion had rounded gazebos at the four corners. Perhaps the final design stage changed and the original dance pavilion would be utilized for refreshments and the new structure became the dance pavilion.

During the early years of Tashmoo Park, it was used exclusively as a picnic area and could accommodate hundreds of people. Steam tables were incorporated and hot food could be served. Over time, other features were added. Arcade games such as pinball, skeeball and iron claws were popular.

By the 1930s, a radio for the seniors who wanted to listen to the Detroit Tigers play ball and a small refreshment stand that sold drinks, candy, cigars and cigarettes were included. During winter months, park benches and tables were stored indoors and heavy wooden shutters were placed over the openings to keep out the weather.

The structure still exists today and is used for boat storage at Tashmoo Marina.

Tashmoo Park - Dance Pavilion

Dancing was an extremely popular pastime, and all the resorts, hotels and excursion boats boasted of having a dance floor. A live orchestra was employed to entertain both on the boats and at the park. Zickel's Orchestra had this contract for the first few years, but Finzel's Orchestra took over musical duties in 1903 and held that contract until the mid-1920s when the park declared bankruptcy.

The building had a 15,000 square foot maple floor and a raised area in the center for the orchestra. Structurally, the roof was supported by trusses that started at the floor and curved over the top and back to the floor on the other side. During the 1940s it was said that teenagers dared one another to climb the trusses from one end to the other. The structure still exists today and is used for boat storage at Tashmoo Marina

Tashmoo Park - Grounds


Initially the 60-acre park consisted of the dance pavilion, a couple of baseball fields and a walking/bicycle track, a small picnic area and a few trees. By 1900, there was a children's nursery, bathhouse and a small safety pond for the tots to splash in. Lily ponds were scattered about the property.

A key figure in designing the landscape of Tashmoo Park and Sugar Island was Miss Greta Rice who at the time was the only known female horticulturist in Michigan. Her father, L. B. Rice, ran a nursery business in Port Huron. Hundreds of poplar trees were planted to create picnic groves and line the grand walkway from the dock into the park. Miss Rice supervised the layout of groves and groups of flower beds and shrubs. It is known that she favored geraniums along the walkways

Other buildings not mentioned in this section included men and women's restrooms and a building that housed the steam engine that provided steam for the cafeteria and powered the dynamo that provided electricity prior to 1923. The merry-go-round was at the park from 1915 until the mid-1940s. Other rides were added after Sugar Island was sold in 1925 such as a Ferris wheel, whip and airplane ride. There were swings and a slide for children. Small concession stands sold hot dogs, candy and cold beverages. When the park went up for sale in 1948, the acreage was down to 20 acres having sold off plots of land in an effort to downsize. Offered for sale were fine shaded picnic groves, 2 ball diamonds, athletic track, steamer dock, dance hall, pavilion, cafeteria, merry-go-round building, 7-room caretaker's home, new 9-room owner's residence, large cottage, 3 concession stands, toilets, workshops and various other buildings.




