

Legislative Recap: Week of January 20th

Legislators returned to begin the second week of the legislative session on Tuesday of this week. Both chambers convened for floor sessions on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. The bill filing deadlines are still several weeks away, but legislators are moving quickly. Over 300 new bills have been filed in 2020 so far. These newly filed bills will begin moving through the legislative process and will be placed on committee calendars in the coming weeks. This week, many committees met for organizational days and to hear presentations. Below are headlines from this week's action on the Hill.

WBIR: Two Tennessee bills seek to compensate college athletes

Two bills filed in Nashville are pushing to pay college athletes. The first, Senate Bill 1636, would prohibit schools from preventing student athletes to use their own names and faces to earn money. It would allow them to have endorsements or sell gear with their names and faces.

Fox 17: Tennessee senators introduce legislation raising state minimum wage to \$15 per hour

Two Tennessee state senators want to raise the minimum wage for workers in the state to \$15 an hour. Senator Sara Kyle (D-Memphis) introduced SB 1788 on Wednesday, otherwise known as the "Tennessee Minimum Wage Act."

<u>News Channel 5:</u> Tennessee lawmaker pushing to make insulin more affordable

Sen. Katrina Robinson (D – Memphis) is pushing to make insulin more affordable for the hundreds of thousands of Tennesseans living with diabetes. With one in four diabetics reporting underusing insulin because of its high cost, Sen. Katrina Robinson has introduced a bill to help change that. The bill would put a cap on the price of insulin for insured Tennesseans.

Tennessean: John Cooper, other mayors press governor, lawmakers to release child care funding

The mayors of Tennessee's four biggest cities are pressing Gov. Bill Lee and lawmakers to release tens of millions of dollars in child care spending before it disappears. Since 2015, the state's Department of Human Services has failed to distribute more than \$214 million in federal funding intended to help low-income working families pay for childcare.

WKRN: Governor Lee defends K-12 education, correction departments

On Monday, Governor Bill Lee defended two of his commissioners after questions have been raised about their departments. From a prison audit where inmate deaths were improperly reported to a K-12 education department with hundreds of educators leaving, Senate Yarbo pointed to areas where he says Governor Lee has no clear agenda yet.

Local Memphis: Lawmaker wants Tennessee hands-free driving law repealed

A Tennessee state law making it illegal to hold your cell phone while driving only went into effect last July, but already one state lawmaker is trying to repeal it. Republican Senator Jon Lundberg, who is from Bristol, believes the new law is doing more harm than good. He says people are still holding their phones when they drive but in a way that's

<u>Tennessean:</u> Gov. Bill Lee loosens requirements for pardons, commutations; defense attorneys hopeful

Gov. Bill Lee's administration took a scalpel to the state's clemency process, making a series of small tweaks that could have a big impact. Lee's legal team made the checklist less burdensome for defendants seeking his consideration for pardons, commutations and exonerations. The changes reflect the governor's views on rehabilitation and criminal justice.

Enacts the "Affordable Rental Property Act," which requires THDA to annually research the availability of affordable rental housing in each county of the state and determine which counties have a shortage of affordable rental housing. Requires THDA, for counties having a shortage of affordable rental housing, to set annual county income limits for the following year that qualify different sizes of low-income households for affordable rental housing and to set monthly rental rates that may be charged. Specifies that the monthly rental rates shall be based on the size of the rental unit and the income limit for the size of a low-income household. Requires THDA to provide the assessor of property in counties with a shortage of affordable rental housing and the state board of equalization with the applicable income limits and monthly rental rates. Requires the state board of equalization, in consultation with THDA, to create an application form for owners to use in applying to the assessor of property in a county in which there is a shortage of affordable rental housing for classification of rental housing as affordable rental property. Specifies other requirements for application process. Also specifies requirements for assessment of property that has been classified as affordable rental property.
