A Thought on Ki Seitzei

"וְרָאִּׂיתָּ בַּשִׁבְּיָה אֶשֶׁת יְפַת־תָּאַר וְחָשַׁקְתְּ בְּהּ וְלָקַחְתְּ לְּךֶ לְאִשְׁה, And you see among the captives a beautiful woman and you desire her and would take her [into your household] as your wife." (21:11)

In this week's Parsha the Torah begins by discussing the Halachos of the אשת יפת תואר, the captive beautiful woman. In short, the Torah describes a unique Halacha about a Jewish soldier who encounters a non-Jewish woman in the midst of a battle. The woman, like many women with not-the-greatest reputation, dressed herself up in the hopes of helping out her military by seducing the Jewish soldier. Instead of restricting the Jewish soldier from even going near her, the Torah actually details the process of which he could approach her in the hopes of marriage. While the conditions for this process are worth learning (see Perek 21, 10-14), we will focus on **Rashi's** incredible thought in explaining this remarkable Halacha.

Rashi says, "הְבָּרָה תוֹרָה אֶלָּא כְּנֶגֶד יֵצֶר הָרַע, שָׁאִם אֵין הַקְּבֶּּר, תוֹרָה אֶלָּא כְּנֶגֶד יֵצֶר הָרַע, שָׁאִם אֵין הַקְּבָּר, תוֹרָה אֶלָּא כְּנֶגֶד יֵצֶר הָרַע, שָׁאִנָּה בְאָסוּר. The Torah is speaking in recognition of man's temptations For if Hashem would not permit her to him as a wife, he would nevertheless marry her although she would then be forbidden to him."

Rashi is teaching us an incredible idea. Hashem understands our challenges. Hashem knows our temptations and what attracts us. Hashem built us. Hashem gets us. While marrying this woman is certainly not a recommended Shidduch for any fine Jew, this test is generally beyond the capability of a normal person. Hashem permitted her to the Jewish soldier - so long as he follows the Torahs's detailed process.

The **Shach al HaTorah** (a student of the **Arizal**) adds a point to this explanation. Part of the attraction that we may have for this

Ohr Shlomo Yeshiva High School is a 501(c)3 Tax Deductible Organization woman is **the very fact that she is forbidden!** "Stolen waters are sweet," says **Shlomo HaMelech**. So long as she is forbidden to us she is very attractive, the moment that the Torah permitted her to us - she becomes **less** attractive. He bases himself on a story in the **Yerushalmi**. Once R. Mana went to visit R. Chaggai who was very sick on Yom Kippur. When R. Mana saw how sick R. Chaggai was and how desperately he wanted to break his fast and drink, R. Mana told him that he was permitted to drink. Immediately R. Chaggai responded that he wasn't thirsty anymore! He explained that it was the very fact that the water was forbidden that had attracted him to it - even on Yom Kippur. Once it was permitted he no longer felt the desire for the water. This is the reason that the Torah permitted a Jewish soldier to marry the non-Jewish captive.

We need to remember: Hashem made us. As the **Ramban** points out, Hashem will only give us a test that we can handle. If he put the test in front of us, then he believes in us and knows we have what it takes. May we make him proud!


