As you may know, your Clear Lake Association provides for more than fireworks. Through your generous donations, in addition to the \$30 annual dues, the board can award contributions to various organizations that support and enhance the lake community. Every September, once we know the resources available to the Association from donations received, the board carefully considers "Request for Contribution" forms that have been submitted over the summer. In 2022, the following grants were awarded: Fremont Fire Department (\$2,000), Steuben County Underwater Rescue Team (\$1,000), Clear Lake Township Land Conservancy (\$2,500) and CLYC Tennis/Pickleball Club (\$1,000). These outreach efforts are in addition to other CLA continuing activities, such as the Buoy Project, maintaining the Free Little Library at Town Hall, and the publication of this newsletter. PLANNING & PERSISTENCE = SAFETY

The buoys are in! Thank you to everyone who helped get them back in the water where they belong. An extra big thank you goes to Kevin and the Clear Lake Marina for allowing us to use their work boat.

The exciting news to be shared this summer is that, after two and a half years of working closely with the DNR and the Natural Resource Commission, Governor Holcomb has signed into law a "Special Boating Zone" for Clear Lake. What that means is that along Point Park Drive, the "Special Boating Zone" extends to 300 feet from shore. When this "Special Boating Zone" goes into effect on June 9th, there will be thirteen new white cylindrical buoys 50 feet from the docks. These will be labeled "Idle Speed," meaning boats must not exceed the lowest speed necessary to maintain control. Keep in mind that all boating zones include boats and anyone or anything in tow.

SHORE + DOCK = 50 FEET + BUOY + 50 FEET = SAFE BOATING

The current yellow buoys are strategically placed such that they are at least 50 feet from legal conforming docks. So, by staying 50 feet from all the buoys around the lake, boaters, and those in tow, will be in compliance with the new and the existing laws. This allows everyone on the lake to enjoy plenty of room to jump off and swim around the end of their docks.

The Clear Lake Association will now begin working on signage and a communication strategy to help everyone understand the "Special Boating Zone." Safety at Clear Lake happens with the commitment and diligence of all lakers: family, friends, visitors, and renters.

MARSHAL'S REPORT

Welcome home! The Clear Lake Police Department is glad to see everyone back and we are looking forward to a safe and fun summer.

The Clear Lake Police Department wants to remind all our residents of an easy phrase: "See something, say something". If you see suspicious activity or something that just does not look right, we encourage you to contact us immediately at our dispatch number (260-665-3131) or 911 in the event of an emergency. We need the help of all our residents to keep a safe and secure community. We also want to encourage our residents to be vigilant and diligent in locking doors and windows, both in your residence and in your vehicles. *Please*, do not leave your keys in your vehicle, as it presents an easy opportunity for someone to steal.



As our community fills with the coming warmer weather, increased traffic will come right along with it. The posted 25 mph speed limit is just that, a limit. There are many places throughout our community where 25 mph may be too fast when pedestrian and bicycle traffic is heavy. Please be aware of these areas and allow the lake life to slow you down and relax. Please also remember:

- When riding a <u>bicycle</u>, go <u>with the flow</u> of vehicle traffic.
- While <u>walking</u>, go <u>against the flow</u> of vehicle traffic.

Bicyclists are reminded they must obey all traffic laws, which include stopping at stop signs.

The Town has purchased two more radar-controlled speed limit signs over the winter which were installed this spring on CR 700 E. These LED signs show motorists their speed as they come toward the sign and, if they are going over the posted speed limit, the sign will remind them to slow down. The goal of the program is all about community safety.

We wish to extend a friendly reminder to check your golf cart registrations for the expiration date. The Town will be sending out reminders in the mail for registrations which will be expiring in 2023. Renewal is quick, easy, and can be completed at the Town Hall or online at the Town of Clear Lake website. If you have a new cart to register, simply stop by or call the Town Hall (260-495-9158) and we will schedule a time to have an officer come out and complete your registration and inspection. THE OFFICE OF THE CLEAR LAKE TOWNSHIP LAND CONSERVANCY

Spring is here and summer is right around the corner! The winter was a time of enormous productivity and our staff, the Board, and committees worked year-round. We focused on two key 2023 projects—the Watershed Diagnostic Study (WDS) and the Aquatic Vegetation Management Plan (AVMP).

Watershed Diagnostic Study

We continue to collect data on our water quality and have multi-year efforts to help keep our lakes pristine. Water samples are collected weekly and analyzed by the team at Ecosystems Connections Institute. Collecting this reliable data will help create a roadmap to work together to enhance and improve water quality.

We were honored and excited to be awarded a grant of \$59,450 by the Midwest Glacial Lakes Partnership for our multi-year Watershed Diagnostic Study. The grant applies to 2024 and 2025 expenses, but we still are responsible for generating over \$50,000 each year to complete the study. We need help funding 2023 and later. Why is this so important? Longtime volunteer, Don Luepke, recently said it's all about "clarity". He and other Water Quality Committee members remind us that Clear Lake's depth clarity (how far down water is clear) is on a negative trend line. We have lost over ten feet of clarity in the past twenty years.

SPRING INTO ACTION

Welcome Spring! Each year we share ways to prepare for the summer season in our beautiful community. We will continue our "clear" legacy only if we become a total **"Community of Stewards"** as we all do our individual part to contribute to the health of our waters.

If you choose to fertilize your lawn and do an early spring application, please remember to:

- Use only phosphorus free materials. The middle number on the bag indicates the amount of Phosphorus. This number should be zero.
- Request phosphorus free fertilizer from lawn application services.
- Leave a strip of unfertilized lawn along the lake edge as a buffer.
- Consider testing your lawn before applying fertilizer to determine what chemicals are needed.

Of all the elements that feed into our waterways, phosphorus is the factor most responsible for accelerating algae and plant growth.



Other Tips for Early Spring Clean Up:

• Clean up your pet's waste. Dog poop does not serve as a free fertilizer and it can affect our waterways.

• Keep leaves, grass, and other yard waste out of the lake and the wetlands/swamps/channels around the lake. Wetlands are the "kidneys" of our lakes and help filter incoming water.

• The Clear Lake Marina will dispose of old motor oil. Call for more details: (260) 495-4915.

- Northeast Indiana Solid Waste Management District (NISWMD) can take care of almost any disposal need including the many sticks and branches down from the windy weather. See www.niswmd.org for locations and hours.
- Consider installing natural glacial rock at your water's edge to break up wave action and capture suspended sediments.

Let's make it our goal this year to become a "Community of Stewards." It is once again time to Spring Into Action!
