It represents the disciplined expression of Authority through consistent choices, priorities, and standards of interaction. Conduct determines how individuals or organizations respond to circumstances, manage conflict, and maintain professional or institutional integrity.

Where Authority defines purpose, Conduct defines the behavioral discipline necessary to sustain that purpose.

Capability

Capability represents the operational competence required to execute the system's purpose effectively.

Capability answers the question: How does the system operate?

This domain includes the knowledge, skills, resources, and processes necessary to carry out responsibilities with efficiency and reliability. Capability transforms intention into practical execution.

In the absence of capability, even well-defined Authority and disciplined Conduct cannot produce sustainable outcomes. Capability ensures that the system possesses the practical means to translate structure into results.

Quality

Quality represents the standard and outcome produced when Authority, Conduct, and Capability operate in coherent alignment.

Quality answers the question: Where does the system lead?

It reflects the measurable or observable results of systemic operation, including excellence, reliability, credibility, and sustainability. Quality serves as both the outcome of alignment and the feedback mechanism that validates or challenges the legitimacy of Authority.

High-quality outcomes reinforce Authority by demonstrating that the system's purpose and operations are effective and credible.
