As we neared finishing our meal, Commodore Nancy Colson introduced Greg Hicks who is the social worker she and Sue Gelineau work with at the Rope Center. It is a facility to care of homeless men and woman in Hudson. He described his personal story and how he came to get an education that he now uses to help others turn their lives around. The statistics for our small area of Pasco County for drug use, homelessness, poverty, lack of food and mental health issues are staggering. A statistic that is increasing rapidly, to everyone's surprise, is the numbers of elderly people being priced out of their homes with nowhere to go. It was an eye-opening discussion.

He gave us some ideas of the things they use at the Center to provide shelter, food and counseling. They need toothpaste, toothbrushes, canned goods with easy open tops, soap, shampoo, socks and other items of clothing. They give them backpacks to keep their things together. They also go out into the woods to the encampments to try to connect with the people out there. The need for help and support is great and he hopes we can donate what we can.

HBYC Kayak Expedition on the Withlacoochee River, Nobleton, Florida

On April 8th, ten members of HBYC, accompanied by a guest, embarked on a memorable kayak journey along the picturesque Withlacoochee River in Nobleton, Florida. Each participant paddled their own single kayak, adding to the sense of adventure.

Prior to our expedition, some of us convened at the Beacon Woods Café in Hudson for a nourishing breakfast. From there, we made our way to the Hog Island Recreational Area. One enthusiastic member had even spent the previous night camping at the Hog Island campground, eagerly anticipating the day's adventure.

Upon arrival at the Hog Island boat ramp, we unloaded our kayaks and then drove our cars to Nobleton Wayside Park, which also boasted a convenient boat ramp. The weather greeted us with mild temperatures in the mid-70s, accompanied by a gentle breeze. Despite the lack of a strong current, the river promised a serene and enjoyable paddle.

Our journey commenced amidst the tranquility of the wilderness, surrounded by the majestic cypress woods. Along the way, we were fortunate to hear and catch sight of two Limpkins, adding to the natural charm of our experience. Approximately one and a half miles into our paddle, we encountered a significant obstacle—a large fallen tree blocking the entire river. With some teamwork and maneuvering, we successfully navigated around the obstruction through a brief bypass along the shoreline, opting not to spend time searching for an alternate water route.

As we approached the takeout point at Wayside Park, the landscape gradually transitioned to include more riverside homes, yet wildlife remained abundant, providing moments of wonder and delight. My GPS recorded our paddle distance at 4 miles, from our starting point at Hog Island to our conclusion at Wayside Park.

After loading up our kayaks, the majority of the group reconvened for a well-deserved late lunch at El Sol De Mexico restaurant in Brooksville, where we were joined by three additional members, bringing a satisfying end to our day of exploration and camaraderie.

As our adventure came to a close, we loaded up our kayaks and reconvened at Swampy's Grill in Dunnellon, exchanging stories and laughter over well-deserved refreshments, capping off a day filled with camaraderie and natural splendor.

Blessing of the Fleet

May 25th @Noon.

We are reinstating our annual Blessing of the Fleet. This event is open to all boaters (sail or power) in the Hudson Beach area. The Blessing of the Fleet is a centuries-old tradition originating in southern European fishing communities. A blessing from the local priest was meant to ensure a safe and bountiful season for the area's commercial fishing community. Over time, however, these ceremonies have evolved into community gatherings that celebrate not only safety but also the camaraderie of seafarers and their families.

Dennis Stow's (HBYC Chaplin) boat will be the Blessing Boat. He will be anchored between the HBYC Start Waypoint (FR1) and Marker 2. That will be just a short hop south of Marker 2.

The ceremony will begin at 1130 and will be broadcast on <u>VHF Ch. 72</u>. Plan to arrive and be in position before 1130. All boats should form a big circle (<u>under power</u>) and motor clockwise around the Blessing Boat. As new



boats arrive, please make room for them to join the circle. Please maintain your position in the circle, don't overtake a slower boat.

Once Chaplin Dennis begins the Holy Water phase, boats will make a tight pass oneby-one staying in their position in the circle to receive the Holy Water. **Do not pass to close!** It is the symbolism not the splash that counts!

As soon as your boat has received the Holy Water please break from the circle.

We have some folks who may want to ride with boats participating. If you're one of those folks or are planning to go, please let me know. You can call or text me at (813) 760-2235.

This will be a great day on the water, we hope you can come out and be a part of it.

RACING REPORT—MAY 2024

Since last month we have had some exciting races. The annual St. Martins race is our longest race of about 20 miles. Conditions were excellent and the first boat over the line was Paper Moon skippered by Captain Shawn Rodel in an elapsed time of 3 hours and 16 minutes some 23 minutes in front of the fleet. After handicaps were applied, the finishing order was Fine Alee, skippered by Dean Perry, sailing a masterful race to finish ahead of Paper Moon by 1 second on corrected time. Second. Place went to Paper Moon, with Airbourne sailed by Steve Polk in third. The multihull winner was Captain Dan Wallace sailing cool Breeze. The after-race party was held at GHYC where a nice dinner and good time was had by all.

HBYC boats also participated in the GHYC spring regatta where points were scored for the racer of the year. We managed to get in 2 races that day under difficult conditions. Boats on the course saw 17 to 20 knots of wind with reports of gusts over 30 knots. Several boats had to retire. A fabulous awards ceremony was held that evening. For the first race the HBYC podium was Paper Moon, followed by Fine Alee and Ventolara, captained by Roger Massicotte. In the second race, Fine Alee took the win followed by Inspiration, captained by Guy Colson, and Paper Moon to round out the HBYC podium. Cool Breeze, captained by Dan Wallace, finished first in the multihull class in the first race and retired due to rudder issues in the second race.

Congratulations to all those participating.

Our next race is scheduled for June 8 for the Scandia Cup. Hope to see everyone there.

The women at the helm, WATH, race has been postponed till fall as Paper Moon and StarGazer are competing in the annual Bone Island race to Key West




