SUMMER CAR SAFETY TIPS

Dogs die in hot cars every summer. Even in the shade, the temperature can still quickly soar to dangerous levels. Leaving the windows open has little effect on how hot it is in the car.

10 mins It only takes 10 minutes for the inside of your car to reach a temperature that can cause heatstroke. Heatstroke Symptoms include:



Hard panting, red tongue and/or lips





Lack of coordination



Convulsions & vomiting



Weakness or temors



Collapse, coma & death
